			Callaghan Innovation Chief Executive spoke about their role in supporting the startup ecosystem. He highlighted that their role encompasses four main components: Provision of research, development and innovation funding/grants, upskilling, commercialization (access to deep-tech problem solving and scientists) and		
			approach to funding in current economic conditions. NZTE Chief Executive shared reflections on New Zealand's early-stage ecosystem. He noted that NZTE currently focuses on innovation and growing value-added companies across the three significant export sectors of manufacturing, FBCG (Food and Beverage Consumer Goods) and tech and innovation. 80% of NZTE's resources go into the 1400 Focus companies. He also noted some of the challenges and opportunities, including the need for a consistent approach to framing strategic objectives, and gave his perspective on the weaknesses of the ecosystem in areas like strategic intent, followership, and collaboration.		

The proposed strategy seeks to lift productivity, support a carbon-neutral economy, enhance equity and diversity in the sector, reduce income inequality, and create capital pathways for startups and higher-paying jobs. Council members reflected on the proposed strategy and associated vision and purpose statements.
