Anticipated workforce needs

 Emergency response and safety roles, including emergency services, transport providers

- Infrastructure stabilisation roles, including network technicians, water services workers
- Risk and loss assessment roles, including insurance assessors, engineers

Comment: it is unclear at this stage the extent to which the domestic workforce can meet these needs but there are known gaps

Longer term needs are unclear at this stage and will emerge as the immediate recovery work goes ahead. At a minimum we expect there will be demand for:

- Clean-up roles, including labourers
- Construction and infrastructure repair and rebuild roles, including engineers, surveyors, builders, plumbers, drainlayers, machine operators, telecommunications engineers and technicians, electrical network engineers and technicians, electricians

Existing mechanisms

Domestic workforce

- Includes workers displaced by Cyclone
- Includes onshore migrant workers (already have visas)
- Can change roles by established Variation of Conditions (VOC) process



Offshore migrants

- Purpose Visa (SPV; granted for up to three years to deliver specified event or purpose
- Checks health and character + role offer
- \$700 fee

Offshore migrants

- Enter on an Accredited Employer Work Visa (granted for up to three years, for roles paid at or above the median wage unless covered by a sector agreement)
- Requires employer to be accredited + a Job Checked role
- Process Job Checks in 10 days + migrant applications in 20 days
- A range of relevant roles are covered by the *Construction and Infrastructure sector agreement*, which allows recruitment at rates below median (currently \$25 p/h, \$26.69 p/h from 28 February)

Options to adjust existing settings, and considerations

For onshore migrants

- (what) agree that a temporary relocation or role variation with the same employer will not be considered a breach of visa conditions
- (why) better enable either displaced migrants to find alternative temporary work or to allow employers to redeploy migrant labour to support clean-up, as it removes the need for a VOC

For offshore migrants

- (what) facilitate access to SPV for cyclone response, with bespoke eligibility criteria and visa conditions
- (*why*) more streamlined process which can be clearly communicated to employers

For offshore migrants

- (what) remove the need for a labour market test for identified roles
- (why) will reduce the burden on employers for AEWV applications
- (*what*) expand the roles covered by the construction and Infrastructure sector agreement
- (*why*) a wider range of skills may be needed to support the longerterm rebuild, meaning a below median wage rate is appropriate
- (what) extend the duration of the current wage rate (\$25 p/h) for the construction and Infrastructure sector agreement
- (why) enables employing a wider range of skills to support the rebuild
- (what) job attraction and facilitation functions
