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## Context

- 1. In response to the weather events in February 2023, Cabinet agreed to establish an extreme weather event recovery visa [DEV-23-MIN-0014].
- 2. We recently provided you advice on options to close the Recovery Visa and provide further tailored immigration pathways for workers for the rebuild phases following Cyclone Gabrielle (2223-3717 refers). You agreed, based on that briefing and a subsequent note, that:
  - the Recovery Visa will be closed;
  - onshore Recovery Visa holders will be able to apply for a three-month extension to support their transition to another work visa, they plan to continue working in New Zealand; and
  - the Construction and Infrastructure Sector Agreement (full list of current roles is at **Annex Two**) will be expanded to include further roles likely to be needed in the rebuild, meaning migrants will be able to be recruited for these roles at a lower wage threshold of \$26.69 per hour.
- 3. A draft Cabinet paper outlining this proposal is attached at **Annex One**, to circulate for ministerial consultation subject to any changes you may wish to make.

#### Feedback received

- 4. We have discussed the proposal with sector and union representatives, and agency colleagues. The primary point of tension relates to the expansion of the occupations on the Construction and Infrastructure Sector Agreement.
- 5. Civil Contractors New Zealand (CCNZ) have provided an extensive list of occupations to be included, noting that labour demand in these roles is expected to rise as the rebuild ramps up. The Amalgamated Workers Union New Zealand Free and frank opinions oppose adding occupations to the sector agreement to reduce the required wage rate. Free and frank opinions
- 6. The Ministry of Social Development and the Treasury both expressed concern that expanding the list of roles on the Sector Agreement could displace New Zealanders, and prefer waiting until the labour needs to support the rebuild are clearer.
- 7. The Treasury also noted their concern with the decision to refund successful applicants of the Recovery Visa extension. They acknowledged that the rationale for the initial visa being free was to facilitate an immediate labour market surge for the cyclone response, but do not agree with the rational for the extension. They noted that while Immigration New Zealand (INZ) has been able to find underspends which could fund the extension, funding this will be a trade-off against other priorities in the immigration sector.

#### Options for additions to the Construction and Infrastructure Sector Agreement

8. If you wish to proceed with expanding the list of roles on the Sector Agreement, there are two possible lists of occupations that could be included:

- 9. Most of the roles on the above lists were suggested by CCNZ, with the short list being a prioritised version of the long list per CCNZ's advice.
- 10. If you wanted to add the long list of occupations to the Sector Agreement, we would recommend some minor amendments to the list provided by CCNZ:
  - Removing 'Labourers not elsewhere classified (n.e.c)', as this description covers a lot of roles outside the construction and infrastructure sector.<sup>1</sup> This would mean that some construction labourer roles will need to pay at or above the median wage (currently \$29.66) to recruit migrants for the role. The impact of this is mitigated as there are other labourer roles already on the list (e.g., a builder's labourer, a drainage/sewage/stormwater labourer) the roles currently on the Sector Agreement are attached at Annex Two.
  - b. Adding Backhoe, Bulldozer, Excavator and Grader operator roles: these roles feature on the Green List alongside the Earthmoving Plant Operator (General) and Loader Operator roles. All six roles are treated interchangeably for the purposes of the Green List, as there is significant overlap between the roles in New Zealand. Adding them to the long list would ensure consistency of approach. It is also reasonable to assume that the already-acknowledged labour shortage in these roles which warrants their inclusion on the Green List will expand with the rebuild, and that this demand will be across skill levels (including roles paid below the median wage).
  - c. Adding Paving Plant Operator: this is a roading role that is similar to those proposed by CCNZ and has been included to ensure there is no gap in labour supply.
- 11. If you would like to pursue additions to the Construction and Infrastructure Sector Agreement, we recommend limiting additions to those on the short list. The labour needs to support the rebuild are still some months away from being fully understood, and each addition to the list does risk displacing New Zealanders from employment opportunities. We have not had the opportunity, nor is the information yet available, to thoroughly analyse how sizable a risk this is, so recommend limiting additions as much as possible until that work can be undertaken.

- 12. We also recommend two minor amendments to the short list provided by CCNZ:
  - a. removing 'Labourers not elsewhere classified (n.e.c)' for the same reasons noted in paragraph 10(a); and
  - b. removing 'Drainage, Sewerage and Stormwater Labourer' as it is already on the Construction and Infrastructure Sector Agreement.
- 13. High level analysis has been undertaken to determine the existing demand (based on the number of people issued an AEWV under each occupation) and current market rate (via a tool developed for MBIE which uses publicly available data from 2022) for the occupations we recommend you add, and is included in the table below:

- 14. All occupations on the list above appear to relatively low skilled and low earning, with a wide range of people in these occupations coming through the AEWV to work in New Zealand. With this in mind, it's difficult to predict what impact providing a below median wage pathway will have on the supply of migrant labour in these roles.
- 15. Furthermore, the Sector Agreement applies nationally there is no way of guaranteeing migrants entering under the Sector Agreement will be coming to work on the rebuild. Further consideration of possible mitigations would need a better understanding of the rebuild labour demand, which is still some time from being confirmed.
- 16. We have drafted the Cabinet paper at Annex One on our recommendation that you agree to propose the short list of additions.

### Next steps

17. Subject to any changes you request, the attached Cabinet paper is ready for circulation to your Ministerial colleagues. We are proposing the below timings for taking this paper to Cabinet:

18. This timeline does only allow for one week of Ministerial consultation, to allow Cabinet decisions by end of June. This is necessary to ensure transfers of identified 2033/23 underspends in the Recovery Visa are accounted for by the end of the 2023 financial year.
