The Manawatu- Wanganui Bio-forestry Alliance ("The Alliance") #809 NZ Bio Forestry Ltd (NZBF) Manawatū- Whanganui/H orowhenua	NZBF's project aims to deliver high value plywood, bioplastic raw material substitutes for petroleumbased plastics and bark based bio-fuels. PGF funding of NZS has been requested to undertake testing to validate the technical approach and science. The key items upon the completion of the Investment Information Memorandum are testing: • the NZ radiata pine logs can produce plywood, with acceptable specifications and economics, on modern plywood mill technology (Japanese equipment). • the NZ radiata residues can provide the feedstock to produce PLA/PHA from fermentation of the cellulose in Pinus radiata (Taiwan equipment). The technology is based on research from the Institute of Nuclear and Energy Research (INER) in Taiwan, which now operates a large pilot plant. • the blending with coal as a fuel for industrial boilers for heat, power generation that would have applications particularly in Japan. There is considerable public benefit in the successful investment in and commercial operation of the new plant that would be reflected in significant additionality and potential spillovers for NZ wood processing industry from: • The introduction of new export products and wood	The project is being completed under strict confidentiality to protect the commercial interests of the investment group. This proposal has developed from the feasibility report completed October 2018 and has wide regional support including TPK. Waikato-Tainui, Te Wananga o Aotearoa, Te Waka (Waikato Regional Development Agency), Te Humeka (Waikato Māori Business Network), Wintec, Tainui Waka Tourism, The Mighty Waikato (Hamilton and Waikato Tourism). The PGF has previously received a number of proposals to fund similar centres for Māori innovation and entrepreneurships. These have been from national organisations (e.g. Commercial Information) looking to expand their reach across regional NZ. Wairarapa Community Water Storage (Wakamoekau) #850 Wairarapa Water Limited Kāpiti/Wairar apa	This proposal is for the development and construction of water storage and distribution infrastructure in the Wairarapa (this application relates to the prefeasibility phase of the project). There has been a change to the Greater Wellington Regional Council's (GWRC) water allocation policy for the Wairarapa. In light of these changes, previous studies relating to potential water storage options need to be updated. These studies were carried out with support from Crown Irrigation Limited. Project sponsorship has been adopted by WWL, and the project has been reframed at a strategic level, to better align with PGF water storage investment criteria. The prefeasibility study will be followed by a feasibility study, then the commitment phase (collectively the pre-construction phases), then construction. Water supply resilience is a key driver of this project. This proposal identifies and addresses a risk to the region's long term ability to develop primary sector industry. These industries are already a major employer in the region and further development will create additional opportunities.	At this stage, WWL is only seeking funding for the next phase (prefeasibility), and it is expected that WWL will seek further support from the PGF should the outcomes from the prefeasibility phase be positive. The expected total amount of funding expected to be sought from the PGF is ~\$Commercial Information. The Project has received support from the IAP. The IAP was consulted as this initial grant would only be sensible if the PGF was prepared to continue funding further phases and aligns with the Wairarapa Regional Economic Plan, with water being one of the three key areas of focus.
