SROs supported the Dunedin/Otago package that is due to be announced in September/ . October, and approved each of the applications therein. sRosnoted that conditions would exist that forbade the sale of items purchased by applicants with these funds, and that, if any items were sold, the PGF grant would have to be repaid. It was noted that many of the applications were for items that would increase the applicant companies' revenues, and would reduce barriers to growth and productivity. 4.1 PGF	Portfolio Analysis (Nerissa Wallace)

Discussion	<ul> <li>Nerissa Wallace, Manager of PDU's Monitoring and Reporting team, briefed SROs on initiatives in reporting, and Michelle Ewington, Manager of Cross-Government Coordination for PDU, discussed the benefits of this in light of the more focused programme of works in the second half of the life of the PGF</li> <li>Michelle updated SROs on upcoming applications and future expectations for applications, noting that fighter criteria may be applied nearer the end of the life of the fund. It was agreed that messaging to applicants would be realistic and accurate at all times, but that the fund still had money available for good applications.</li> <li>Nerissa discussed the work of her team, noting the transition from high level reporting to a nore granular approach in the second half of the life of the fund, with numbers now being available on a project by project basis. It was noted that reporting was available on funds committed, contracted, approved and paid, with projects being tracked weekly to ensure figures were always up to date. Nerissa also reported on the focus on getting contracts signed within 60 days, and that this was tracking well, with a total of 20 contracts unsigned, down from 41 in June. It was noted that forward payments were being reported on as well, and that, overall, a far clearer picture was being provided.</li> </ul>
	SROs were asked to consider what reporting they would find useful and it was agreed that Nerissa would circulate examples of reports for consideration. It was noted that an indication of what projects were coming up would be useful, as well as regular information on funds remaining and spent. It was also noted that information on cancelled projects would be useful, and the importance of exiting projects well if they were not working out was noted.
	The importance of SROs having an overall strategic lens was noted.

5.2 Muri	whenua Mānuka Oil Application (Paul Swallow)

Discussion	<ul> <li>Privacy of natural persons <ul> <li>Al took the chair.</li> </ul> </li> <li>SROs approved \$524,400 funding from the Provincial Growth Fund irom Aupouri Ngāti Kahu Te Rarawa for Muriwhenua Mānuka Oil to allow for the planting of mānuka, harvesting of wild mānuka and for community-owned mānuka oil distilation facilities, subject to clear milestones being adhered to, and PDU assuming a formal coordination and oversight role in the project.</li> <li>Paul discussed the background to the project and explained the time constraint being due to another agency having been approached for funding originally, and the need to get plants in the ground without delay. Paul reported that the plants were healthy and ready to plant, and that some wild harvesting would also be carried out. Paul also discussed the work of the applicant in the area, including their contribution to local employment and their positive use of Māori land assets.</li> <li>The meeting noted that this application succeeding would provide employment where it is needed, and would use land in a way that is considered suitable and sustainable. The value for money of the project was noted. It was agreed that, to manage the risks, close oversight of the project would be advisable.</li> <li>Ben returned to the room and resumed the chair.</li> </ul>
5.3 Prior	ities Work Programme (Jane Frances)

Discussion	<ul> <li>Jane updated the meeting on a number of upcoming matters, including relating to Northport, and the shifting focus towards the delivery and execution of projects in the second half of the fund's life. It was also noted that some applications would inevitably take longer, such as those received under Whenua Maori involving multiple-owner land, and it remained important to be realistic when dealing with applicants. Jane reported on an upcoming paper on initiatives to deal with the drug methamphetamine ("P"). The impact of this drug on regions was discussed by the meeting, including the role of the PGF to assist with the provision of alternatives to the drug economy in the regions. Jane also discussed action on Digital Hubs; waste, notably plastic and, to a lesser extent, food waste; and energy, particularly hydrogen and the possible investment in its generation and transmission. Applications for the primary sector, engineering and manufacturing; water storage and airports were also discussed.</li> <li>Bryan discussed a possible application for a Hawke's Bay project involving a water tower and Jane indicated that such a project could potentially meet PGF criteria, notably jobs and productivity.</li> <li>The role of the World Trade Organization (WTO) rules were discussed and Jane emphasised the importance of not seeing these as simply a barrier, but instead as something to be considered. The meeting discussed adopting a "how can we make it happen?" attitude and the need for</li> </ul>



	PDU to show leadership in this space.
