This issue has been acknowledged in the 2010 Ngati Porou Treaty settlement, where a 100 year MoU was signed by Gisborne District Council, MPI and Ngati Porou to address the existing issues. The Crown acknowledged that Maori had been largely excluded from any decision-making processes in relation to the management of the catchment. Importantly, the MoU did not put in place a budget, or allocate funding for this work. As such, the two Trusts are becoming increasingly frustrated at the lack of meaningful action.

The applicants have been clear in their insistence that the restoration of the Waiapu must have a Maori framework and include Matauranga Maori. The programme must be holistic, catchment wide and longterm, and at the heart of it must be the community working together.

The package of four projects submitted to the PGF provide a programme of work that has been developed by the local hapu and whanau of the Trusts in collaboration with business, community, Commencial Information (consultant) and MPI. The projects are:

- The river corridor design
- People and capability building (Scommerce inform)
- Sediment and debris dam construction (\$^{commercial information})
- Poplar and Willow nursery establishment
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 S^{commercenterm})

The goals of this programme include, the key PGF criteria of creating jobs, ^{com} directly associated with the four projects, and, enabling Maori to realise aspirations in all aspects of the economy.

In assessing these applications, the PDU has noted the current issues facing the alluvial flats of the Waiapu river resulting from the continued problems associated with the catchment. These include:

- Continued significant erosion of the catchment and alluvial flats
- Flooding restricting forward investment opportunities
- Damage to regional Infrastructure (SH35)
- Seabed and fisheries destruction due to sediment deposit

The four projects seek to address the problems and are designed to develop systems to significantly reduce the continued degradation by: addressing and limiting

- The applicant working with MPI through the programme to ensure KPIs and milestones are met – noting the scale of this significant programme
- MPI sitting with the applicants at the governance table to offer support as required
- The PDU working with the applicant to better understand who might be appointed to the ^{Commercial} information and Commercial Information Toples
- Ensure no double dipping with the ECF, noting this functing is for riparian planting, as is part of this application

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debris entering the river; designing a better path for the river where possible; limiting the ongoing damage via riparian planting; and building capability to ensure knowledge is developed and retained.

Importantly, the acknowledged problems are limiting the landowners' economic opportunity potential by restricting the activity that can be undertaken on the land. Sustainable forward investment into higher-value agriculture/ horticulture, such as kiwifruit, avocado, and as a first step, crops including corn, cannot be committed to while the security of the land is problematic.

The applicant has supplied a strong level of detail in relation to the programme and individual project KPIs and milestones, including financial breakdowns.

A possible issue the IAP should weigh is the fact an open tender process will not be conducted for a number of programme jobs, as part of this programme seeks to build local capacity. That noted, professional services are to be contracted to the project as required, with the goal of imparting knowledge and upskilling hapu and whanau.

The purpose of this briefing is to consider recommending PGF funds to the Walapu Restoration Programme:

Risks Issues:

The applications have significant risk/ mitigation registers for each project. These have been assessed by the PDU and MPI and acknowledged as strong.

MPI has noted that risk is present in the governance structure. MPI believes this could be mitigated via MPI working with the applicant in the establishment and initial programme development

Eligibility points of note:

- Due diligence:- Full due diligence is to be completed (waiting on Insolvency office for due dil). It is a condition of approval that due diligence is to be to the satisfaction of the Head of PDU Investment team.
- *Conflict(s) of interest:* Based on the information provided no conflict of interest is evident noting that full due diligence will inform this item further.
- Illegal Activity:- Based on the application information provided and feedback from other agencies there is no indication that the applicant or project has been involved in, or associated with illegal activity.
- Alignment with Regional development plans:- Although this project is not directly noted in the TEAP, the development of ag/ hort and the Maori economy are heavily referenced as priorities.
- Commercial funding availability:- Given the nature of the project which is to restore the alluvial plains of the Waiapu river and mitigate against erosion, access to commercial funding is not considered a feasible option.
