Project overview

- 1. The Labour Party Manifesto 2017 (Maniesto) includes a commitment to invest \$10 million over 10 years to establish a Centre of Digital Excellence (CODE) in Dunedin, with the vision of a \$1 billion computer gaming industry in New Zealand.
- 2. The Manifesto recognises that Dunedin is well-positioned to contribute to this vision through building on the city's emerging gaming and digital businesses, thriving start-up ecosystem, strong Maori partnerships, global linkages, and internationally-recognised academic centres.
- 3. This briefing presents Regional Economic Development Delegated Ministers (RED Ministers) with the option to fund the Centre of Digital Excellence, as well as options on how to fund the Commercial Information proposal. The application has been made by the Dunedin City Council.

The project comprises of two parts:

i. **Part one:** the manifesto commitment of \$10 million will focus on how to develop the human capital required to grow the gaming industry. This will include:

- a. developing digital skills,
- b. growing digital capability,
- c. supporting innovation through contestable funds, and
- d. attracting digital businesses to Dunedin.
- ii. **Part two:** the \$^{commercial Information} requested will focus on the development of the Commercial Information
- 5. While CODE will primarily be focused on supporting and growing the video games industry, it will develop a complementary focus on **Commercial Information**



6. Part two is not a manifesto commitment and would leverage part one for successful delivery. The application presents CODE parts one and two as two separate but connected components. It appears to make the assumption the \$10 million manifesto commitment cannot include Commercial Information and that any 'additional' activity needs to be funded separately.

Business case overview

- 7. The PGF funded the business case to outline how Dunedin City will deliver on the overall project (\$95,000).
- 8. The business case established that the project presents an opportunity to have a complementary focus on Commercial Information and to establish a key point of difference for CODE. Free and frank opinions
- 9. The digital economy is the fastest growing segment of the global economy. The business case found that the video games industry, supported and grown through CODE, will be a catalyst for a stronger digital economy within New Zealand.
- 10. The Dunedin City Council is requesting \$ commercial Information with co-contribution of commercial Information Commercial Information
- 11. The proposal suggests this investment would accelerate the growth of the gaming industry in New Zealand which would lead to more skilled jobs and higher export revenues.

PDU recommendation

12. The PDU recommends \$10 million be provided, in the form of a grant, over 10 years to cover both the original intention by the Labour Party for CODE and the commercial information opportunity that has been identified through the development of the Business Case.

- **Commercial Information**
- 14. Given that the \$10 million Part One project still has a reasonably broad scope, including \$_______ per annum for several contestable funds and competitions. The PDU recommends that the \$______ per annum sought from the PGF for _______ is funded from the original \$______ per annum.

Benefits

- 15. Over a ten-year period the Dunedin City Council suggests CODE would result in:
 - a. 30-50 new small video game studios, each employing on average employees; and
 - b. 3-5 large video game studios, each employing on average employees.



- c. There are currently 41 gaming studios in New Zealand (with two of these based in Dunedin) and this is a high growth industry in New Zealand and around the world. CODE will leverage Dunedin's strength as a centre of knowledge, innovation and expertise in the digital economy.
- d. This project will also build on the Commercial Information project by focusing on segment.

Stakeholder support

- 16. The overall project has received support from the Dunedin City Council. Southern DHB, University of Otago, Ngai Tahu and NZ Game Developers Association.
- 17. The project strongly aligns with the Otago Regional Development framework themes innovation and productivity and Dunedin Economic Development Strategy 2012-23.

Costs and funding

- 18. The financial analysis in the business case is based on the assumption that the PGF would fund \$^{commercial Information} and other investors would fund \$^{commercial Information} towards the total project cost of \$^{commercial Information} over the years commercial Information
- 19. The co-contribution of \$^{commercial Information} has not yet been confirmed.
- 20. There is a one off cost of source over Commercial Information to cover the establishment of CODE.
- 21. The Council has suggested that the \$10 million be paid out over the first year of the project. However, the PDU will follow its standard processes, providing funding as \$ commercial Information over 10 years.

22. **MBIE Innovation Policy Team** support the core elements of the proposal relating to developing the gaming industry in Dunedin, but consider that there is also



considerable opportunity to leverage Commercial Information and the region's Commercial Information expertise through the gaming for ^{Commercial Information} which expand on the original proposal but have attracted third party co-funding.

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
