Region: Northland		from further HPR funding for the FY2019/2020.  The programme provides intensive, youth-centred, individualised services, beyond what is currently available to MSD clients. Previous HPR funding enabled the programme to include young people outside MSD's scope (non-beneficiaries and 15-17 year olds) and to provide more mental health or other support than was able to be provided by MSD through their standard services. HPR funding allows young people with more complex needs to be provided with extra staffing and intensive wraparound support to participants and employers which cannot be funded by MSD.  The programme directly aligns with the Tai Tokerau Northland Economic Action Plan's goals to reduce Northland's NEET rate, reduce the Māori unemployment rate and increase the proportion of Northland's young people holding qualifications. Currently 82 per cent of programme participants are Māori. Iwi groups have been involved in the development and delivery of the programme, including Ngāpuhi and Ngāti Kahu. The programme has received local support with 116 individual employers across Northland engaged in the programme. HPT is supported by the Northland Skills and Employment Steering Group, which includes representatives from Northland Inc, Te Puni Kokiri (TPK), Ministry of Education, Tertiary Education Commission, and Ministry of Primary Industries.			
	The programme is showing signs of success in getting participants into employment, and is likely to be put forward for the State Service's Commission's Spirit of Service award 2019. The programme initially targeted 750 rangatahi, but has				
	engaged over 905. In the last 8 months, 460 participants have gone into employment, 91 have gone into training or further study, and 373 remain in the service and receive tailored support. These young people are still considered to be participants in the programme, receiving ongoing support for 12 months, including whilst in employment.	MSD and Te Puni Kōkiri support the proposal, with MSD/MBIE to evaluate the programme as a potential standard model once there has been sufficient time to evaluate the employment outcomes. HPT has a clear governance and project management structure, in line with MSD requirements. HPT Governance Board also includes representatives from MBIE.
