- j) Note this project is targeted at youth who are unemployed and require support to be employment ready. The post-COVID 19 situation will be more critical in supporting this group for employment, with the possible increase in unemployed numbers across the region and re-deployment to ensure on-going employment being an additional challenge post COVID 19.
- k) Note the set up phase started pre COIVD-19, all relevant roles are in place and this programme is ready begin in a level 2 COVID-19 environment and beyond.

# **Proposal:**

The Project is a three phase 12 month programme. The first phase is 13 weeks intensive tailored learning, second phase is 13 weeks providing work experience and education and the last phase is 6 months monitored employment (or alternative education pathways) experiences – with employer/employee input. The programme is based on Whare Tapa Wha, and a 'wrap around' pastoral support throughout training, work readiness and employment. Tikanga and Te Reo Maori are woven in the fibre of the programme.

#### **Commercial Information**

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IBA programme will be run under the guidance of the BOPYDT in conjunction with the existing TBA programme which is currently being delivered to school-aged children out of the gym and in the Tauranga community with great success.

The end goal is all youth are successfully employed or engaged in a training pathway to employment. The local labour-market needs of Tauranga region will be paramount in engaging potential employers. This programme is unique to Tauranga, as it directly addresses the high NEETS and unemployed youth. BOPYD Trust has a network of employers and other social organisations committed to support this programme. The staff employed at the TBA and IBA are qualified and experienced. Whānau are embraced and invited to participate fully and 'feel at home' by using facilities while they are there. This programme will contribute to addressing the high number of NEETS, mainly Maori youth and work towards meeting the gap in workforce needs. Referrals will mainly come from Trust partners, which include Police, Youth Justice, MSD, MOE and Oranga Tamariki.

# **Target Group**

The IBA programme is targeted at young people (15-24) NEETS, inclusive of youth at risk and young people with disabilities.
