Entity Detail:	Manaaki Ora Trust is a <u>capable provider</u> , who has been delivering community-based health, education and social services to vulnerable populations for more than 30 years. They hold contracts valued at \$\sigma_{\text{outper}}^{\text{outper}} with multiple Ministries and the District Health Board, including the contract for the Māori residential alcohol and drug service Te Whare Oranga Ngakau, which is based on the same site as the proposed detox facility. The Trust has an experienced board and senior management has extensive project implementation experience and expertise, particularly in the Māori provider sector context. The Trust employs over staff including dentists, registered nurses, social workers, stop-smoking practitioners, addiction counsellors, support workers, senior administrators and PTE Tutors.		

We recommend that the SROs:

- a) Approve \$476,677 from the Social Capital Investment portion of the Provincial Growth Fund towards Kaupapa Maori Methamphetamine Service because
 - a. it fulfils a gap for a specialised detox facility in Rotorua;
 - b. it would be fully integrated into a coordinated pathway of care, from detox through to staged reintegration to community, by being co-located with the Trust's existing residential service Te Whare Oranga Ngakau;
 - c. it is delivered by an experienced Maori Trust who's management has extensive experience in delivering health, social and education services; and
 - d. it is supported by the DHB and other Government agencies
 - e. subject to:
- written consent from Ngati Whakaue to renovate and utilise the building and confirmation of ongoing lease/future use arrangements
- written consent from Rotorua Lakes Council to proceed with renovation.

Proposal:

Manaaki Ora Trust, proposes to fill an unmet need in Rotorua and wider Bay of Plenty by developing a 6-bed dedicated detox facility for treatment and recovery support for methamphetamine addiction. The project is to renovate a vacant building at Kokoreke (part of the Ngati Whakaue Tribal Lands whenua base) next to the Trust's existing residential service Te Whare Oranga Ngakau. This strategy will ensure the detox facility is integrated into a coordinated pathway of care.

The Trust has identified, through their existing residential programme at Kokoreke, that 80% of those who come into Te Whare Oranga Ngakau service are Māori and are or have been recent users of methamphetamine.

The Kaupapa Service Design lead will ensure the facility provides a pathway from detoxification from methamphetamine, through to longer term abstinence and staged reintegration to community (including plans for housing and employment).

To project is to develop a new detox facility. PGF funding will enable the Trust to:

- Renovate a vacant building, creating a six bed (2 per bedroom) home-like facility (floor plan submitted)
- Fit it out with furniture, fittings, and service equipment
- Employ an FTE for to develop Kaupapa Service Design
- Operating costs for Commercial Information (meals for residents, administration costs, cleaning, power, internet)

Once the facility is operational, it can support the following programme options

- 1. Seven day methamphetamine detoxification, supported by nursing and support staff
- 2. Post detox 12 week preparatory program into residential services
- 3. 12 week preparatory program into residential services for men with methamphetamine related offending transitioning from prison

Outcomes

Depending on the programme the facility is used for, outcomes would include:

Detox programme

• Developing residents' ability to return to work, reduction of family harm incidents, engagement in longer term services to address addiction, improved wellbeing.

Transitioning from prison programme

 Reduction of risk of reoffending, reduction risk of addiction relapse, engagement in longer term services to address addiction, preparation for further training, education or work, improved wellbeing, entry into training.

Programme Support

- Rotorua Lakes DHB will provide the clinical support person (FTE) to deliver specialist detox support and is supported by representatives in Mental Health and Addictions and Maori Health at Lakes DHB.
- The programme also has support from Rotorua Police and a local charitable trust Visions of a Helping.

Timings, consents and operational matters

- Renovations would commence within Commercial Information from funding approval and would be complete in further Commercial Information. The facility would be available for residents as soon as renovations and fit out is complete, so Commercial Information from approval.
- The programme in the future will be funded on a fee for service basis. Operational funding (\$\sigma_{\text{output}}^{\text{commercial Information}}\) is needed for the first three months to cover shortfall in client numbers while the facility is still in establishment.
- Consent to renovate has been granted in principle by Ngati Whakaue Tribal Lands Trust owners of the

- building and land proposed for renovation and are guardians of the Kokoreke whenua.
- Rotorua Lakes Council would need to provide building consent for the renovations.

The programme is operating at a fundamental level - supporting the overall health and productivity of the most at-risk people and whanau. Work readiness or employment training will not succeed without programmes such as this one to remove harm from methamphetamine.
