

# Pacific Peoples in the Labour Market - June 2021 Quarter (unadjusted)

Overall, the labour market results for Pacific Peoples are showing signs of recovery. More Pacific Peoples entered the labour force over the past year to June 2021.


Employment grew by 20,600 people over the year to June 2021, with the highest growth in the Education & training, Agriculture, forestry, fishing & mining and Public admin & safety industries.

The employment rate grew by 1.1 percentage points (pp) over the same time period.

The labour force participation rate increased to 66.2 per cent, up 2.2pp from June 2020 to June 2021.

The unemployment rate grew by 1.5pp to 7.8 per cent in June 2021.

The NEET rate fell by 1.7pp to 16.6 per cent over the year to June 2021, with the NEET rate for Pacific women falling by 2.4pp to 18.8 per cent. About 13,000 Pacific Peoples youth were NEET.



#### National and regional" labour markets

As at June 2021, there were 287,500 Pacific Peoples in the working-age population, an increase of 11.2 per cent from a year ago to June 2021. Of these, 190,300 were in the labour force.

A higher proportion of Pacific Peoples were participating in the labour market (up 2.2pp) over the year to June 2021, contributed to by large increases in those aged 15 to 24 and 55 to 64 years, and Pacific women. Participation grew the most outside Auckland.

The employment rate grew, with 20,600 more Pacific Peoples employed over the year to June 2021. The employment rates grew for Pacific Peoples in most age groups, especially young Pacific Peoples and those aged 45 to 64 years.

Differences in Pacific Peoples' employment across the regions continue. The highest employment rates for Pacific Peoples were in Wellington and the North Island (excl. Auckland and Wellington).

The employment rate for Auckland fell, where the Pacific Peoples' working-age population is most concentrated (193,300 people). Around two thirds of the Pacific Peoples labour force is in Auckland (120,700 people) and 12.8 per cent (24,300) is in Wellington.

The number of Pacific Peoples employed in Auckland (including the sub regions) grew, despite the fall in the employment rate.

The unemployment rate for Pacific peoples overall grew, coinciding with a fall of those not in the labour force, with those unemployed growing faster than those employed. The unemployment rate for men increased more than for Pacific women.



# Unemployment and employment by age

The unemployment rate for Pacific Peoples fell for younger (15 to 24 years) and older (45 to 64 years) age groups over the year to June 2021, but remained higher than the national average overall.

Over the year to June 2021, the employment rate grew for the same age groups of Pacific Peoples – those who were younger (15 to 24 years) and older (45 to 64 years), while also remaining lower than the national average overall.

The industries employing the most Pacific Peoples in June 2021 were Manufacturing, Utilities & construction, and Health care & social assistance.

From June 2020 to June 2021, employment grew in eight out of twelve industry groups. The strongest annual growth was in Education & training, Agriculture, forestry fishing & mining, and Public admin & safety.

#### Occupational Representation<sup>®</sup>

From June 2020 to June 2021, employment in seven out of eight occupation 46.2% were in Skilled\* occupations\*\* groups grew. The biggest increases in employment were in Service, Labourers and Plant workers.


Pacific Peoples in Skilled occupations grew (up 0.7pp to 46.2 per cent) over the past three years from June 2018, but still remain lower when compared to all workers (68.0 per cent).

# 21.1 % of Pacific Peoples were in Unskilled\*\* occupations.

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# Youth Not in Education, Employment or Training (NEET)

As at June 2021, there were about 78,500 Pacific Peoples aged 15 to 24 years in the working-age population. Of these, around 13,000 people were NEET (16.6 per cent).

Of those young Pacific People (aged 15 to 24 years) who were NEET 3,800 were unemployed and not in education; 3,400 were not in the labour force, not in education but were caregiving and 5,900 were not in labour force, not in education and not caregiving in June 2021.

The NEET rate for Pacific Peoples has been consistently higher than European and Asian ethnic groups. Pacific women were more likely to be NEET (18.8 per cent) than their male counterparts (14.6 per cent).

# Underutilisation rate\*

There were 28,600 Pacific Peoples underutilised in the working-age population in the year to June 2021, with underutilisation growing by 4,500 people over the year.

Increases in Pacific Peoples unemployed (up 4,300 people) and underemployed (up 1,600 people) were partially offset by the potential labour force falling by 1,500 people.

The underutilisation rate for Pacific females was higher than Pacific males.

\*People who are underutilised as a proportion of the extended labour force provides a more detailed picture of the workforce. Those people who are underutilised are those who are underemployed, officially unemployed and potentially in the labour force. Underemployed are those who are employed part-time (working fewer than 30 hours per week) and have the desire and availability to increase their hours. The potential labour force includes people who would like a job but are not currently actively seeking one (available job seekers) and people who are currently looking for a job but are not available to start quite yet (unavailable job seekers).

This document reports key labour market information for Pacific Peoples for the year to June 2021. Most data is sourced from the Household Labour Force Survey (HLFS) released quarterly by Statistics New Zealand (SNZ). Data comparisons now use unadjusted data so that the effects of COVID-19 can be seen clearly. Comparisons use unadjusted data for the same quarter in the current and previous year to address seasonal variation concerns. The population base underlying the Household Labour Force Survey was reweighted in September 2020. For the purposes of this factsheet "total respo+A97:AB116se" data is used. This means that Pacific Peoples refers to everyone who has selected that ethnic group, regardless of whether they have also selected another group. The subnational estimates (eq regional breakdown or ethnic group) are subject to larger sampling errors than the national estimates. Therefore, caution is needed when using and interpreting subnational estimates.
