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OVERVIEW OF THE SSIF INFECTIOUS DISEASES RESEARCH PLATFORM PLAN

These guidelines outline our (Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE)) expectations of a Strategic Science Investment Fund (SSIF) Infectious Diseases Research Platform Plan (the Platform Plan); the process for developing one and how it will be assessed.

The Platform Plan is a document that outlines how the Platform's co-Hosts and partners intend to invest SSIF Programmes funding in an integrated programme of research. This research needs to meet the Infectious Diseases Research Platform mission, investment goals, principles, and research themes.

We expect the Platform Plan to cover detailed priorities for research, a strategy for research and engagement within the Platform, and how the Platform will meet the needs and aspirations of Māori.

The Platform Plan will be developed through an iterative process including a draft and if invited a final Platform Plan, and with advice from an Establishment Steering Group.

THE FUNDING AVAILABLE

There is \$1.5 million (excluding GST) available to establish and develop of a Platform Plan.

Once we have approved a Platform Plan for contracting, a further \$34.5 million (excluding GST) will be made available to implement and operate the Platform. The total duration of the Platform based on funding available is three years - 2021/22 (including the Establishment Phase) to 2024/25. This will be implemented through the Platform Contract.

This funding has been made available through the SSIF Programmes fund.

ABOUT THE INFECTIOUS DISEASES RESEARCH PLATFORM

The Infectious Diseases Research Platform aims to:

- > Build and coordinate domestic research capability in infectious diseases.
- > Continue to address COVID-19 and other serious infectious diseases in New Zealand.
- > Improve preparedness for future pandemics.
- Support New Zealand's Health Research Strategy and infectious disease research priorities of key stakeholders and Māori as Treaty partners.
- > Link with international research.

The Platform will ensure New Zealand has world-class research capability acting together to maintain and build our preparedness for future infectious disease outbreaks.

The Platform will help fulfil the Government's Treaty of Waitangi/Tiriti o Waitangi (Tiriti) obligations, and address health inequities. The research will be interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary, collaborative, and world-class.

OUR EXPECTATIONS OF THE PLAN

Your Platform Plan should explain how the Platform will meet the investment mission, objectives, principles, and research themes outlined below, and how it will help fulfil the needs and aspirations of Māori and the Government's Tiriti obligations.

PLATFORM MISSION

To ensure New Zealand has world-class research capability to respond to serious infectious disease threats.

INVESTMENT OBJECTIVES

This investment should:

- Deliver an integrated research programme in partnership with researchers, clinicians, Māori, and New Zealand Pacific Peoples.
- > Demonstrate research excellence that builds New Zealand's capability in infectious disease research and research translation.
- > Contribute to international research through collaborations in infectious disease research.
- Contribute to strengthened collaboration between researchers, clinicians, health agencies, Māori, and New Zealand Pacific Peoples.
- > Contribute to improving health outcomes and increasing equity of health outcomes.
- > Contribute to significantly lifting New Zealand's infectious disease response and management capability.
- > Contribute to addressing key gaps and creating an agile and integrated research and response system.
- > Contribute to increasing New Zealand's preparedness and readiness for infectious disease outbreaks.

INVESTMENT PRINCIPLES

We have developed a set of principles that you need to consider when you develop your Platform Plan. The principles are tied to the performance areas used for SSIF Programmes investments.

The principles are to:

- > Foster connection, create inter-disciplinary world-class research and create a pipeline of research capability.
- > Help fulfil the Government's Tiriti obligations.
- > Create excellent research.
- > Embrace novel approaches that are in addition to current capability and outputs.
- > Span research horizons: generating new ideas, develop emerging ideas, and leverage proven ideas.
- > Create a pipeline of new ideas and opportunities to inform public health, clinical policy, and practice.
- > Focus on major research questions in priority areas at the frontier of the fight against infectious diseases.
- > Focus on transformative outcomes, which may involve high-risk/high-return research.
- Contribute to growing an integrated research and response system and not duplicate existing capability.

RESEARCH THEMES

The research has two broad themes, spanning public health, social, and biomedical sciences.

Theme 1

Improved prevention and control of infectious diseases. This would be achieved through research in understanding:

- > Determinants, transmission, and risk factors.
- > Preparedness, public health, and social measures to prevent and control infection.
- > Vaccine research, development, and delivery.

Theme 2

Improved management of and response to infectious diseases. This would be achieved through research:

- > To develop and use a wide range of diagnostics including genomics.
- > In surveillance and outbreak investigation and control.
- > To develop and deliver therapeutics.

MEETING THE NEEDS AND ASPIRATIONS OF MĀORI

The Platform will help fulfil the needs and aspirations of Māori and the Government's Tiriti obligations, through:

- > The Platform co-creating an integrated research programme in partnership with Māori, including Māori researchers and communities, coordinated by the Platform co-Hosts.
- > Research seeking to increase equity of health outcomes, and specifically address infectious diseases that affect Māori communities disproportionately.
- > Research programmes expected to include Māori researchers, as well as provide opportunities to develop a diverse set of early-career researchers.
- > Potential providers required to demonstrate how they propose to incorporate Te Ao Māori in the research, delivery of the proposed outreach, and impact.
- > The <u>Vision Mātauranga policy</u> and objectives being incorporated into the assessment criteria (this guides the incorporation of science and innovation potential of Māori knowledge, resources, and people).



PLATFORM PLAN: DEVELOPMENT AND ASSESSMENT

We require you to develop your Platform Plan in two distinct stages, with the outputs of each stage being assessed by an assessment panel.



KEY DATES AND ACTIVITIES

The following summarises the indicative key dates for the Establishment Phase and contracting.

All dates are indicative. Final submission and assessment dates are dependent on Platform co-Host progress in developing a Platform Plan and Assessment Panel member availability.

Any change to key dates will be notified via an e-mail to nominated contacts of the co-Hosts.

GUIDANCE FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE PLATFORM PLAN

The Platform development will be overseen by MBIE with input from the Ministry of Health and guided by the Establishment Steering Group.

The Establishment Steering Group has been convened by us, with input from the Ministry of Health.

The primary role of the Establishment Steering Group is to oversee the development of an integrated research programme coordinated by the Platform co-Hosts which will form a Platform Plan. The Establishment Steering Group will provide advice and oversight to the co-Hosts and participating members.

SUBMITTING YOUR PLATFORM PLAN

Once complete, submit your draft Platform Plan by emailing the Platform Plan in Word and PDF format to your investment managers on or before the dates detailed above. Dates are indicative and Investment managers will discuss any changes in the dates below with the co-Hosts. Terms and conditions relating to submitting the Platform Plan are set out in Annex 1.

HOW YOUR PLATFORM PLAN WILL BE ASSESSED

An assessment panel made up of MBIE, Ministry of Health senior managers, and independent science assessors, will assess your draft Platform Plan. We will advise the exact makeup of the panel prior to assessment as the expertise needed in this panel will depend on the detailed priorities of the Platform. We may seek external advice in this assessment.

After assessment of your draft, you may be invited to refine your Platform Plan and submit a final version.

The panel will make contracting recommendations based on your final Platform Plan.

The final Platform Plan will be approved for contracting by MBIE's Deputy Secretary, Labour, Science and Enterprise.

ASSESSMENT CRITERIA

All sections in the Platform Plan's template must be adequately addressed.

The assessment panel will assess your Platform Plan (in both draft and final) against these five criteria:

- > The extent to which the Platform Plan meets the investment objectives of the Infectious Diseases Research Platform.
- > The extent to which the Platform Plan meets the principles for the Platform.
- > Whether the proposed priorities in the Platform Plan are within the research themes outlined under Our expectations of the Platform Plan.
- > The robustness of the process to develop those priorities.
- > The extent to which the Platform Plan demonstrates that the Platform will help meet the needs and aspirations of Māori and are aligned with the Vision Mātauranga policy.

Each of the criteria will be scored either:

- > Excellent
- > Good but some gaps
- Insufficient.

DECISION PROCESS

Draft Platform Plan

We will endeavour to complete an assessment of the draft Platform Plan within ten working days of submission and provide assessment panel feedback within fifteen working days following submission. Feedback will include whether you are invited to submit a final Platform Plan.

Final Platform Plan

If invited, your final Platform Plan will be reassessed to determine the suitability of your Platform Plan as a basis for investment. We will endeavour to complete assessment of the final Platform Plan within ten working days of submission. If the panel considers that the final Platform Plan is not suitable for recommending for contracting, we may seek further iterations of the Platform Plan or may recommend precontract or contract conditions to the MBIE decision-maker.

Informed by the assessment panel, the final decision on whether your Platform Plan will be approved for contracting will be made by MBIE's Deputy Secretary, Labour, Science and Enterprise. We will endeavour to provide the co-Hosts with a decision on the final Platform Plan, fifteen working days following submission.

Public announcement of decision

Timing for the public announcement of the Platform Plan will be made in consultation with the co-Hosts and relevant Ministers.

PLATFORM PLAN: IMPLEMENTATION PHASE

CONTRACTING AND IMPLEMENTING A SUCCESSFUL PLATFORM PLAN

We expect to commence negotiating a final Platform Contract for the Platform stage after we advise the co-Hosts of the decision on the final Platform Plan. We expect that the Platform Contract will start on 1 September 2022 and end on 30 June 2025.

The Platform Contract for the final Platform Plan will be based on:

- > A master SSIF Programmes contract.
- > A successful final Platform Plan's fundable research and related activities, Key Performance Indicators, Work Programme, and an IP Management Plan.

The Platform Contract template outlining terms and conditions and schedules will be emailed to nominated contacts of the co-Hosts during the Establishment Phase.

REPORTING REQUIREMENTS OF A CONTRACTED PLATFORM

The Platform co-Hosts will provide the following formal reports to MBIE:

- > An Annual Update covering the research, science and technology or related activities that it proposes to undertake over the next 12 months (July-June), by the end of April.
- > An Annual Progress Report covering the delivery of strategic science as part of a Science Platform over the previous year (July-June), by no later than 31 August.

More information is available from the SSIF Performance Framework.

IMPLEMENTION AND OPERATION OF THE PLATFORM

The Platform implementation and operation will be overseen at all steps by us, with input from the Ministry of Health, and guided by the Platform Steering Group.

The Platform Steering Group will be convened by MBIE, with input from the Ministry of Health and the Platform. We expect that the Platform Steering Group will include some members of the Establishment Steering Group.

The primary role of the Platform Steering Group is to oversee the implementation and operation of the Platform. The Platform Steering Group will provide advice and oversight to the co-Hosts and participating members.

PLATFORM PLAN TEMPLATE

The template below provides you with the information you should cover in both your draft and final Infectious Diseases Research Platform Plans. This is a guide and is not intended to constrain the information you provide.

Note that you do not have to justify your receipt of SSIF funding. Your Platform Plan should focus on outlining the science programme you will deliver, and the rationale for your approach.

- Converted into an unsecured PDF
- PDF and .doc versions sent by email as an attachment to your MBIE investment managers.
