

MIQ Operations comments	From an MIQ operational perspective this is a simple request to accommodate due to: - standard MIQ - certainty around dates - no impact on MIQ workforce. Military flights are beneficial as they enable a group to be directed to a specific location (eg, outside of Auckland) which allows more efficient use of MIQ allocation.	 While these groups require standard MIQ, from an MIQ operational perspective this is a complex request to accommodate due to: significant number of large groups over an extended period of time group allocation already being oversubscribed over a number of months which will require sequencing of arrivals and a limit on group numbers (without knowing full potential pipeline of requests). The proposed numbers are a significant increase in personnel relative to last year and may require consideration of scaling to essential personnel. Charter and military flights are beneficial as they enable a group to be directed to a specific location (eg, outside of Auckland) which allows more efficient use of MIQ allocation. 	From an MIQ operational perspective this is a complex request to accommodate due to: - being completely outside the intent of the group allocation process with multiple small groups (many less than 5 people) over multiple dates with different needs - the sporting environment being very fluid and date and location changes having a high likelihood - request for in-room training MIQ for athletes — note that this may not be available due to room size and health and safety constraints. - lack of certainty around dates and limited information. There is a risk of setting a precedent by allocating spaces for individual and small groups, such as for returning students. The EOI also includes snow sport contestants which is not relevant for pre-summer Olympic & Paralympic games qualification travel which this EOI covers.	From an MIQ operational perspective this is a complex request to accommodate due to: - Size of groups - Lack of certainty around dates - Need to sequence arrivals to ensure MIQ is not pushed past safe operating limits and there are no BORA implications due to displacement of returning New Zealander's Note that any allocation can only consider essential athletes and support staff – other parts of the delegation need to use MIAS.
MIQ Health comments	No red flags or known issues from a Health perspective	No red flags or known issues from a Health perspective	From a Health perspective: There are a number of factors yet to be identified, however we expect there will be a high level of compliance from this group. We expect the majority will have low health needs, however, due to the changing nature of COVID-19 this cannot be known until closer to arrival time. Need further information to understand potential health needs of Paralympian's. These small groups and individuals will not be eligible for Health exemptions to training outside of their rooms, either on or off-site.	From a Health perspective: There are a number of factors yet to be identified, however a high level of compliance from these individuals is expected. The Paralympian's are expected to have high health needs. Due to the changing nature of COVID-19 specific testing regimes cannot be known until closer to arrival time
