I do not agree with 80% compensation of wages earned. I believe that the current ACC cap is far too high.

To have a benefit that at the higher end that is currently \$700 more than the MEDIAN Kiwi worker wage is not a level playing field. Those on the median wage, the many who earn less can not afford to lose 20% of their wage, particularly as inflation is increasing.

It is a far bigger penalty/loss than those on high wages.

This disparity needs to close significantly for both the current ACC and for your proposal to create a fair and equitable treatment of all citizens.

Maybe a few weeks or months belt-tightening would develop some empathy for those who earn so little
