The minister should have a DETAILED list of space activities that are not in NZ's national interests and there should be a law that SPECIFICALLY forbids approval of any space activity that is on the forbidden list. This list can be changed from time to time by updating the law.

For space activities that are NOT on the forbidden list the minister can approve them and there should be a court process to appeal the ministers approval and add them to the forbidden list if the court feels the space activities are not in NZ national interest. If the government feels the court got it wrong then they can pass an amendment to the "Forbidden list/ Allowed list" that specifically allows that space activity.

Having a law with a forbidden/allowed list, which can be updated by court appeal and law amendments, should ensure that the "national interest" is clearly defined and flexible over time.
