6% Threshold

While the 6% (soon to be 5%) threshold is not part of this consultation the NZAS wish to note that people with less than a 5% hearing loss may benefit from appropriately fitted hearing aids. We therefore we disagree with the statement in Point 4a of this dicussion document that states:

4a. A six per cent hearing loss injury-related cover threshold (based on clinical evidence that hearing aids provide benefit beginning at five-six per cent hearing loss). This threshold is prescribed in the AC Act (primary legislation).
