Managed Isolation Facilities: Criteria and standards for facilities

Purpose

To provide you with the initial results of a desktop review that assessed the suitability of current Managed Isolation and Quarantine Facilities (MIQFs) against a set of agreed criteria, as requested following initial advice on options to strengthen transmission risk management in MIQFs [briefing 2021-2085 refers].

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Background

- 1. Following genome sequencing indicating that a community case of COVID-19 from a recent MIQ returnee was connected to another returnee in the Pullman Auckland Managed Isolation Facility, we provided you with initial advice on options to strengthen transmission risk management in MIQFs [briefing 2021-2085 refers]. As part of that briefing, MBIE and the Ministry of Health (MoH) agreed to conduct a review of the suitability of current Managed Isolation and Quarantine (MIQ) facilities and report back to you in early March.
- 2. This briefing outlines the interim findings of our desktop review which assessed 32 MIQ facilities against 21 criteria. Two of the 23 criteria are connected to the ventilation of facilities and have not been examined as part of this review, instead leaving this to the ventilation review [HR20210455 refers]. As outlined in the public health focused end-to-end assessment of the MIQ system, advice relating to risk reduction will be packaged and sequenced where possible to ensure interdependencies and any resulting trade-offs are easily visible. This briefing forms part of the package of advice focused on Infrastructure and Workforce and should be viewed in that context.

The criteria for facilities has evolved over time...

- 3. The original criteria used to identify hotel for use as MIQ facilities were largely operational in to support their rapid establishment. Criteria have evolved over time and focus on whether appropriate infection prevention and controls can be implemented (given the context of using hotels); that appropriate security arrangements can be made; and that appropriate wellbeing aspects are in place.
- 4. Over time, the development of the operating model and Standard Operating Procedures has seen an increase in the number of criteria that a facility should meet. The general approach continues to be that the criteria are focused on the management of COVID-19 infection prevention and control risks, security risks and ensuring the wellbeing of returnees.

MBIE, with MoH's support, has undertaken a three-step desktop review of MIQ facilities

- 5. The three steps taken were to:
 - a. Identify and agree criteria
 - b. Undertake a desktop assessment of each MI or MQ facility
 - c. Undertake a collective analysis of MIQ portfolio of facilities
- 6. The first step for the review was to compile all existing lists of criteria for facilities, and then to refine this to the structural and locational factors that matter for the suitability of a MIQF. This means that there is a tendency towards infection prevention and control requirements, which was also informed by Public Health involvement in the process. The review did not seek to create a comprehensive list of possible considerations for the suitability of MIQFs. These criteria are instead a 'first hurdle' for the suitability of any given facility. Other criteria, such as availability of workforce (particularly health) or compliance with operational requirements are also important when considering the use of a new facility, but require different considerations.
- 7. In the course of this process, we developed a list of 21 criteria, two of which apply only to subsets of the full 32 MIQFs. **Annex One** outlines these criteria in more detail.
- 8. The second step was to undertake a desktop review of the 32 MIQF around New Zealand to rate each against the criteria.

9. We then analysed the information generated to identify whether the current mitigations are appropriate.

Ventilation criteria are being reviewed separately

- 10. As referenced above, there is a separate review of ventilation systems underway. The first phase of this review is a desktop exercise which MoH is leading. The initial results, which consider 21 of the 32 MIQFs, make nine recommendations. At this stage it appears that there are proactive measures that will need to be implemented across all facilities. Nonetheless, assessments indicate that, in principle, appropriate mitigation can be achieved for all ventilation issues, except in the case of the Bay Plaza Hotel in Wellington.
- 11. MBIE is commencing a second phase of the ventilation review, which will involve physical assessments of each facility. This phase of the review will be undertaken over the next two months and regular updates will be provided to you as the facilities are assessed.

The existing MIQFs broadly meet the criteria of this desktop review

- 12. Seventeen of the 19 remaining criteria apply to all MIQFs. As hotels are not designed to be infectious disease isolation and quarantine facilities, it was expected that some criteria would not able to be met without mitigations. However, the review has found that all facilities meet or are able to mitigate 15 of these criteria. We have detailed below where mitigations have been put in place.
- 13. Two criteria apply only to a select group of hotels: the four dual-use facilities and the three that contain long-term residents, respectively. Mitigations in place for these two criteria are also outlined below.
- 14. Annexes Two and Three provide more detail on the findings of the review.

Where the existing MIQFs do not meet the criteria, arrangements are in place to mitigate risk of transmission

- 15. Facilities have had to put in place mitigations to meet seven criteria (see Annexes Two and Three):
 - a. 2m physical distancing on entry and exit
 - b. Distance from international airport/ MIQ facility
 - c. Dual-use: separate isolation and quarantine zones
 - d. MIQF areas separated from long-term residents of hotels
 - e. MIQF has Building Warrant of Fitness and meets Fire Safety requirements
 - f. Physically distanced evacuation possible
 - g. Outdoor exercise area is available on site

Criteria: Two metres' physical distancing on entry and exit

- 16. Six hotels have small lobbies that do not permit two metres of physical distancing on entry and exit. This can create a transmission risk where there are too many people in a small space as returnees are processed on arrival or exit.
- 17. This has been resolved by using a variety of operational practices appropriate to each facility to provide for physical distancing on entry and exit. These approaches include holding people on buses where necessary and the repurposing of entrances to establish single-direction flow.

18. In Auckland, large numbers of concurrent arrivals are distributed across several MIQFs to reduce the number of new returnees at a single facility at any given time, although the recent decision to cohort returnees when practicable will affect this policy once implemented more widely.

Criteria: Distance from international airport or MIQ facility

- 19. The longer the travel time from an arriving flight to a facility, the greater the probability of transmission on New Zealand soil, relative to immediate isolation in-room. Auckland and Christchurch are the only two operating international airports, and Hamilton is relatively close to Auckland. The number of international flights direct into Christchurch is currently insufficient to make full use of the MIQF facilities there.
- 20. Standard Operating Procedures are in place to mitigate the transmission risk for those travelling on buses to Hamilton and Rotorua, or on flights to Wellington or Christchurch. These policies include processes to manage IPC risks at rest-stops, measures to ensure drivers and returnees use PPE and maintain physical distancing, and regarding the handling of luggage. They are also subject to regular review to ensure they remain in line with IPC requirements and the latest evidence relating to COVID-19 transmission risk.

Criteria: Dual-use: separate isolation and quarantine zones

- In order to reduce the possibility of transmission from those in quarantine (who have COVID-19) and those in managed isolation (who may not), dual-use facilities are required to separate the quarantine and isolation areas of their buildings.
- 22. Facilities in Wellington and Christchurch operate as both isolation and quarantine facilities. In all cases, these occupy separate zones of the buildings. However, stairways, hallways and lifts are sometimes shared between zones. Where this is the case, mitigations are in place such as escorts, or in one case, stairway-only access for quarantined returnees to minimise transmission risk.

Criteria: MIQF areas separated from long-term residents

23. Two facilities have long-term residents living in apartments at the same address. At one of the facilities residents live in a different tower. In the other they have completely separated floors. Separate entranceways and lifts are also used to separate residents from returnees.

Criteria: MIQF has Building Warrant of Fitness and meets Fire Safety requirements

24. Thirty MIQFs meet FENZ requirements, although three of these require mitigation due to lack of sprinklers or limited area for evacuation and assembly. A further two (the Grand Mercure and Pullman in Auckland) do not meet FENZ evacuation requirements as a result of a combination of their lack of sprinklers and height.

Criteria: Physically distanced evacuation possible

NB: These hotels meet FENZ requirements for a hotel however FENZ considers that MIQFs are more akin to detainment facilities and that, as such, these two facilities do not meet detainment standards.

25. Two facilities may not be able to achieve two metres' physical distancing during all times of evacuation, due to limited area for assembly.

Criteria: Outdoor exercise area is available on site

- 26. For the wellbeing of returnees and in line with direction from the Ombudsman, MIQ facilities must provide returnees with an opportunity to take an hour of fresh air and exercise a day, ideally in green space. Providing this onsite is preferred because of the increased transmission risk associated with transport offsite.
- 27. Six of the Auckland MIQFs do not have sufficient green space available onsite for returnees to undertake exercise outdoors while also being physically distanced from each other and the public. Of these, two MIQFs use large car parks on hotel grounds to provide for physical exercise. While well-ventilated, there is no access to any green space.

- 28. Returnees are currently subject to room restrictions on day 0/1 and from day 11/12. You will receive separate advice on these.
- 29. The other four hotels bus returnees to a site in Mount Albert for exercise. While the requirement for transport increases the risk of transmission this is being managed operationally. New operating procedures are in place for the use of the Mount Albert site, which include managing transport by cohort (ensuing that returnees at significantly different points of their isolation do not travel together), seating returnee by bubble and using a ratio of security personnel to returnees (1:6).

We are unlikely to be able to procure an MIQF that fully meets all criteria

- 30. When looking at the criteria, the ideal facility would be a low-rise building or set of buildings on a secure site where rooms have separate bathrooms and private balconies or courtyards (to provide access to fresh air) and separate healthcare facilities. It would also have adequate ventilation, be able to provide catering and laundry services to those in the facility, and be located within an hour of a tertiary level hospital and international airport with good international links.
- 31. It is unlikely that we would be able to procure such a facility and may need to consider alternative options if should you should wish to ensure all criteria are met. One alternative would be purpose-build facility, although is not clear how quickly such a facility could be established or how much it would cost. At a minimum, a facility would need to be planned; consented under both the *Building Act 2004* and *Resource Management Act 1991;* have infrastructure provided; and then be constructed. Under current processes, this would take years.

Next steps

- 32. We recommend that you note that the majority of criteria are met or are being mitigated appropriately by all hotels. However, there are several onsite exercise area and FENZ requirements that are not met or require significant mitigation. Notably, the Grand Mercure in Auckland does not meet either of these two criteria. However, officials recommend that further and more targeted review on the suitability of facilities should be provided once the physical ventilation review is complete.
- 33. A full assessment of whether facilities are completely fit for purpose can only be made once the review of ventilation has been completed. It would likely take a small team at least six weeks to conduct onsite and paper based audits of each facilities.
- 34. The initial results of the ventilation report have been provided alongside this briefing [Health Report 20210455 refers]. Physical assessments will then be provided in May 2021.

• There are also several operational preferences that have been considered to date but are not applied uniformly. For example:

o There has been an operational preference for high-rise (five storeys plus) facilities for security reasons, but the public health preference is for

- low-rise (one to two storeys) facilities. Of the 32 in use, 22 are high-rise, 6 are low rise and the remaining four are medium rise.
- Also for operational reasons, there is a preference for facilities with more than 200 rooms. However, only 15 of the current facilities have more than 200 rooms
- In order to ensure the wellbeing of returnees and facilitate voluntary compliance with isolation, there is a preference for facilities with high amenity, such as hotels which are four or five stars
