## Gas Security Response Group: Update

### Portfolios Energy / Resources

On 29 May 2024, the Cabinet Economic Policy Committee (ECO):

- 1 **noted** that the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment has set up the Gas Security Response Group to identify and respond to any issues around gas security of supply;
- 2 **noted** that the Gas Security Response Group met for the first time on Friday, 10 May 2024, and was tasked with:
  - 2.1 verifying the immediate supply and demand information to make sure Ministers have a true picture of the problem;
  - 2.2 identifying opportunities or workstreams to improve gas supply or reduce gas demand over the short, medium and long term;
- 3 **noted** that:
  - 3.1 the Gas Industry Company has collated data from the gas suppliers, gas retailers, and major users to develop a picture of the supply and demand across the next 12 months;
  - 3.2 this data is consistent with recent estimates of the likely supply in 2024 being around 120 petajoules, which is 12 percent below the most recent forecast;
- 4 **noted** that gas users who are coming to the end of contracts are having difficulty re-contracting for gas, with prices increasing and contract terms markedly shorter;
- 5 **noted** that critical services, such as hospitals and schools, will not be required to have their supply reduced as their demand is too small, Negotiations
- 6 **noted** that any gas shortage would need to be managed in the short-term through demand reduction by large industrial consumers, however there is the potential for significant economic impacts to be felt by industry from the reduction in gas availability;
- 7 **noted** that it is essential to act now to put longer-term actions in place to avoid having a repeat of this situation or a worse situation in future, and that the proposed actions include:

<b>noted</b> that on 22 May 2024, ECO considered a submission on a proposed suite of amendments to the Crown Minerals Act 1991 intended to increase investment in gas fields and to explore new fields [ECO-24-MIN-0077];	
<b>noted</b> that officials are in the process of expanding the Gas Security Response G membership by inviting Fonterra, New Zealand Steel, Ballance and Oji to ensure representation of major gas users;	-
