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Key feedback from agency consultation

- 1. We completed agency consultation on the draft Cabinet paper on Monday 10 March 2025.
- 2. Most agencies are broadly comfortable with the intent of the proposals. While some agencies requested more detail around the specific proposals, we expect to work through this detail with them as the policy work advances.
- 3. We draw your attention to the following key comments on the proposals:
 - The Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet and the Ministry for Regulations recommended that the paper more clearly signpost upfront the phasing of the work and the logic behind this sequencing, to ensure Ministers can quickly see the overall package before diving into the detail. We have added a table to the executive summary to reflect this.
 - Agencies including the Ministry of Social Development, Police and the Ministry for Regulation, recommended the paper more clearly explain the policy intent underpinning the reforms, including how they will improve health and safety outcomes. We have incorporated this feedback throughout the Cabinet paper and prepared Q&As for you to address these questions should they arise at Cabinet.
 - Agencies including the Ministry of Health, the Ministry of Social Development,
 Police, and the Accident Compensation Corporation suggested the paper more
 clearly explain what is meant by "critical risk" and that this would help to articulate the
 full intent of the proposals. New paragraph 27 describes what constitutes "critical risk".
 - The Accident Compensation Corporation raised a risk that the focus on critical risk could result in an increase in less severe injuries which could increase ACC work injury costs, of which 50 percent are from less-severe injuries. We will work closely with ACC on the detail of the policy proposals, until then, we are unable to quantify this potential risk. We have prepared a Q&A.
 - WorkSafe provided specific feedback relating to each proposal. They commented that the proposals to increase the use of ACOPs would require additional resource. WorkSafe raised a risk that the proposal to turn ACOPs into 'safe harbours' would result in them becoming secondary legislation requiring additional Parliamentary scrutiny of ACOPs, which would be resource intensive for WorkSafe. We have not amended the paper to reflect this feedback as we consider these issues can be worked through as we develop the proposals in consultation with WorkSafe. Constitutional conventions
 - Some agencies including Police, the Ministry of Social Development and the
 Ministry for Regulation questioned whether there was enough detail in the paper
 about the proposal to limit the health and safety duties for small, low-risk businesses.
 As outlined in the paper, further work is required to determine the best way to define
 small, low-risk businesses to ensure clarity around which businesses will be affected by
 the proposal. Your report back to Cabinet in May intends to seek agreement to this
 detail. We therefore have not amended the Cabinet paper to reflect this feedback.
 - The Ministry for Primary Industries and the Department of Conservation
 recommended the paper more clearly articulate the types of recreational activities
 intended to be captured by the proposal to free up private and public land. The proposal
 is meant to cover both commercial and private recreational activity. Paragraph 49
 clarifies this.

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4. We've also made changes to the Cabinet paper as requested by your Office.
