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1. BACKGROUND, OBJECTIVES, METHODOLOGY & SAMPLE

Background

The **Tourism Sentiments Survey** (TSS) is an online survey conducted twice a year to collect **New Zealanders' perspectives on the impact of tourism across the country and within individual regions.**

The survey is funded by the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) and conducted by Ipsos.

It aims to deliver consistent and reliable tourism insights to enable sustainable decision-making.

This topline report details findings from Wave 1, reflecting sentiments post summer 2025/26.





Objectives

The MBIE TTS seeks to better understand:

1. Sentiment towards tourism in New Zealand overall
2. The perceived impact of tourism in New Zealand
3. Sentiment towards tourism in different regions
4. How New Zealanders engage with tourism

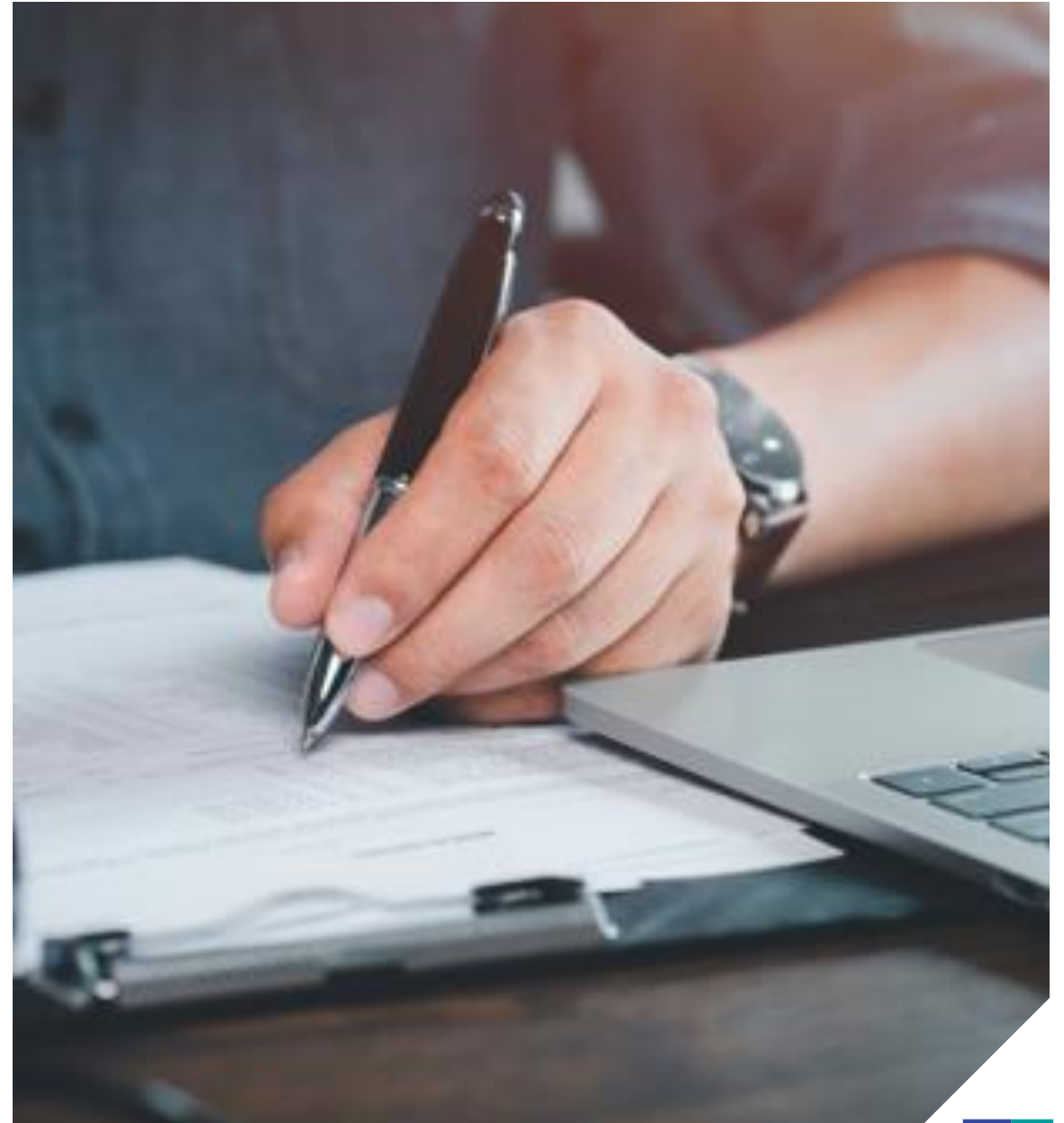
These objectives were designed in collaboration with MBIE, taking into account the needs of different stakeholders.

Summer 2025/26

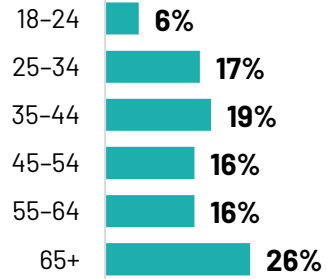
This topline report details findings from **Wave 1**, reflecting sentiments post-summer 2025/26.

- **Fieldwork was conducted 9 Feb–9 Mar 2026**; the survey took 12 minutes on average to complete.
- Participants shared views on tourism over the summer period – Dec 2025–Feb 2026.
- **2,238 New Zealanders** took part in this wave.
- Participants were recruited via a blend of multiple online panels and non-panel sample sources.
- **Findings are representative of the NZ adult population.**
 - Strategic oversampling of participants from smaller regions and tourist hot spots (or destinations of interest) enabled analysis at the regional level.
 - All findings are weighted by region, age, gender, and ethnicity in line with the 2023 NZ census population data.
- Quality assurance was maintained through rigorous survey development, employing cognitive testing, piloting, strict processes, and data cleaning to eliminate low-quality responses, such as overly fast completions. Please note that due to rounding, numbers presented may not add up precisely to the totals provided.

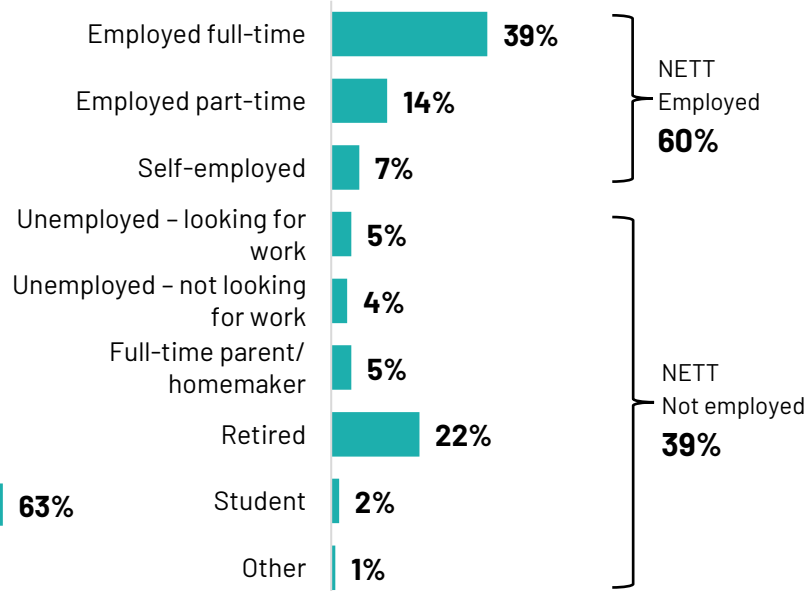


Summer 2025/26 achieved sample demographics (unweighted)

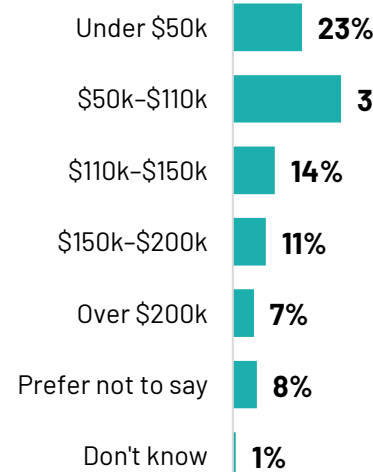

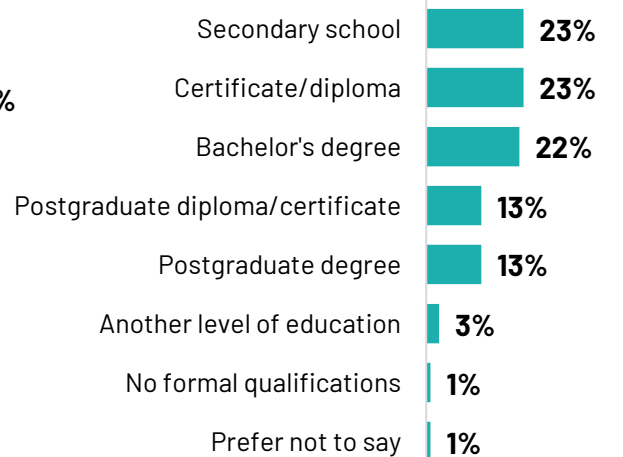

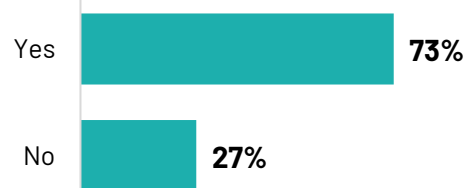

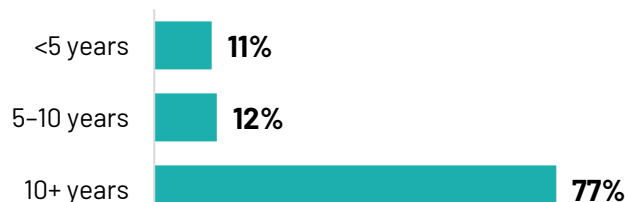

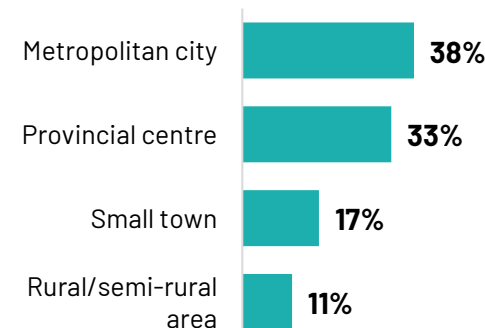

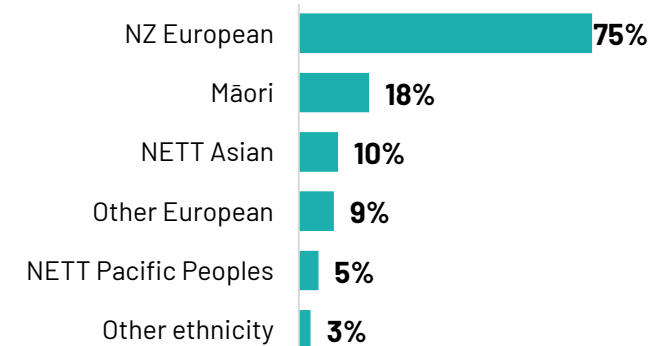

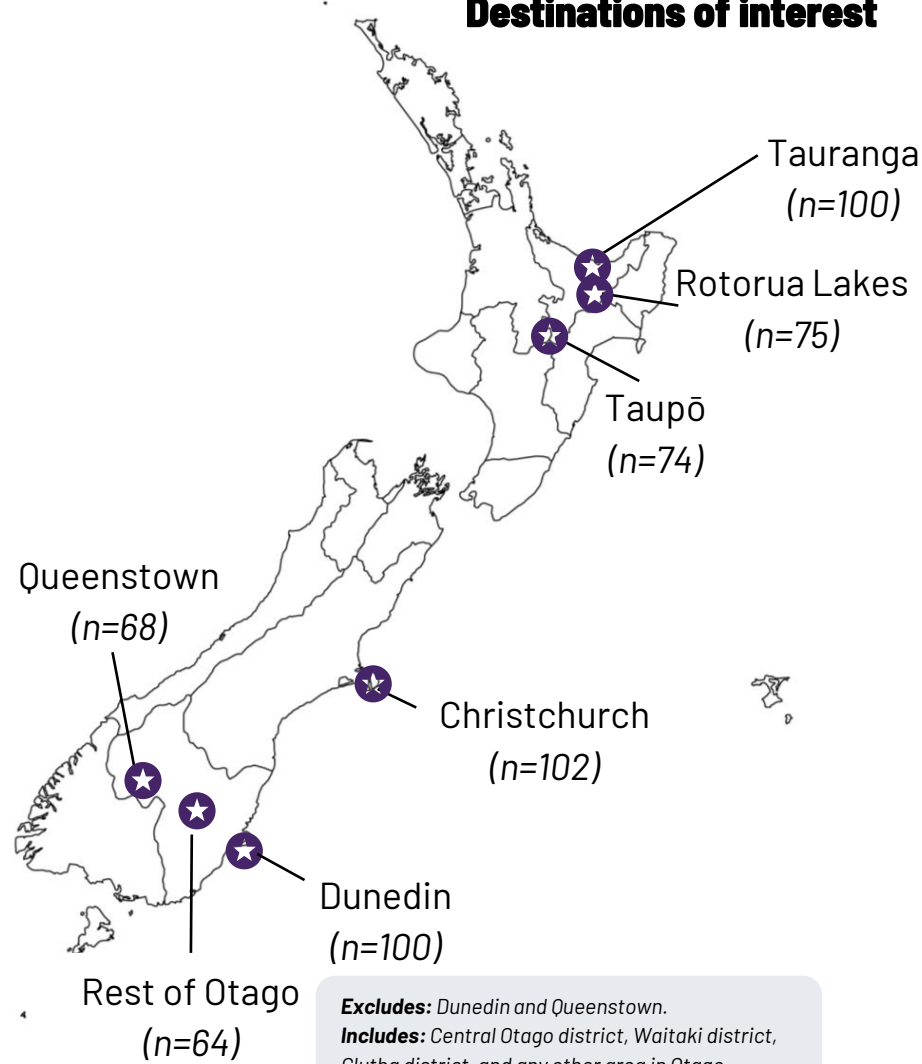

All regions and destinations of interest (DOIs) achieved a minimum sample size of 60, ensuring a reasonable level of reliability in the results at the regional level.

However, caution is advised when interpreting data from regions with smaller achieved samples (e.g. West Coast n=65), as precision may be lower.

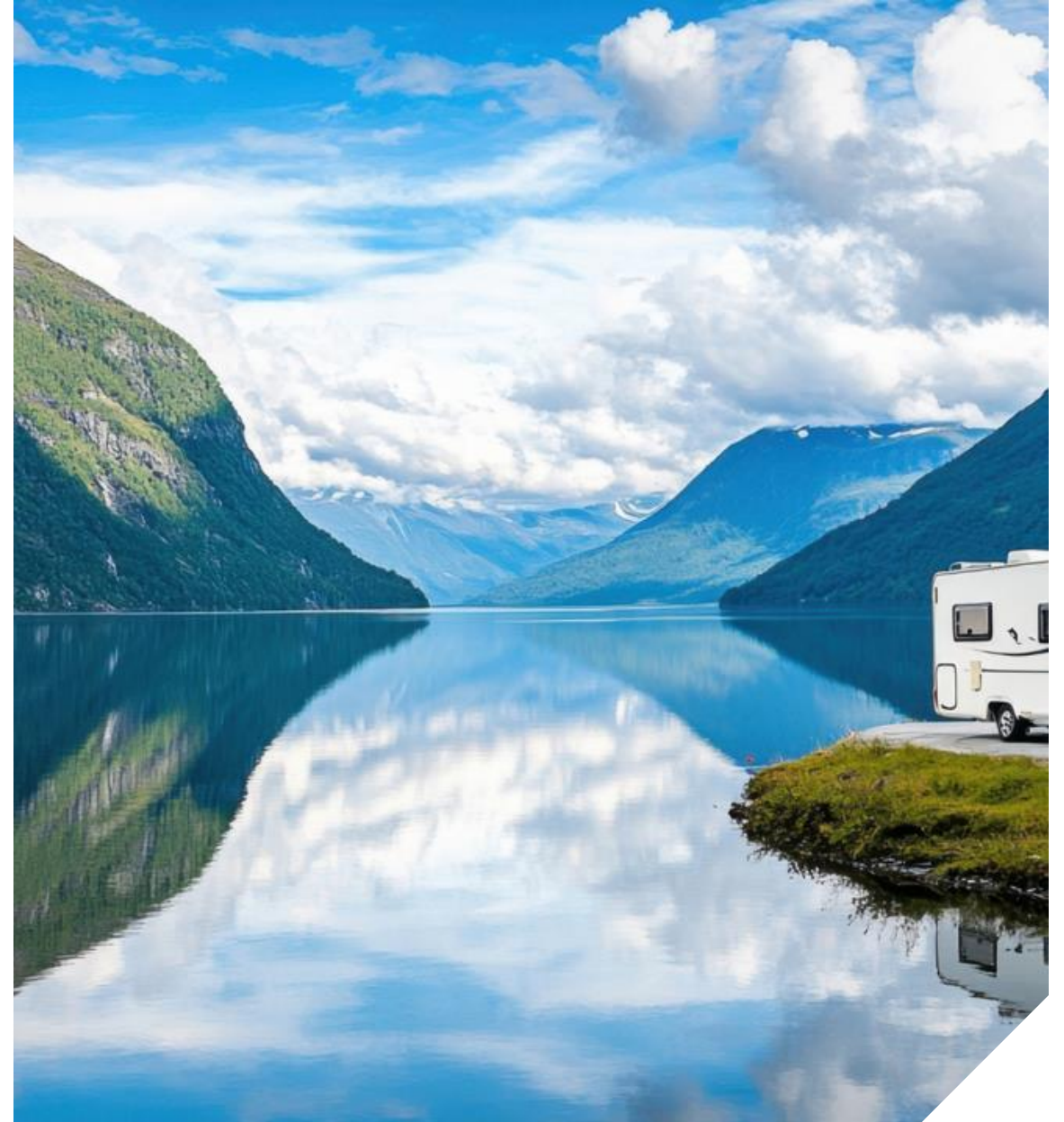
Definitions

NZ summer period refers to the December–February period.

International tourism, when people living in other countries visit/holiday in New Zealand for less than 12 months.

International visitors are people living in other countries who visit/holiday in New Zealand for less than 12 months.

Domestic tourism, when people living in New Zealand visit/holiday in other NZ areas/regions for less than 12 months.



2. KEY INSIGHTS

Key findings

Objective 1. Sentiment towards tourism in New Zealand overall

9 out of 10 New Zealanders think that tourism benefits New Zealand.

Nearly half of the population feels there's 'about the right number' of international (48%) and domestic (48%) visitors. However, there is appetite to increase tourism as about one third think there are 'not enough' international (31%) and domestic (36%) visitors, with a stronger preference for domestic visitors.

New Zealanders favour international visitors who are visiting friends and family, travelling as international students, or coming as families. In contrast, 37% wish to see fewer campers, campervans, and van travellers staying outside built facilities.

Objective 2. Perceived impact of tourism in New Zealand

When considering tourism's impact on New Zealand as a whole, international visitors are perceived to have a more positive impact on the NZ economy, whereas domestic visitors positively influence community life, the natural environment, and NZ values and culture. This sentiment is echoed by 95% of New Zealanders who see tourism as economically beneficial, with highlights on *economic growth for New Zealand* (60%) and *creates employment or income opportunities* (59%), economic growth is particularly noted among Aucklanders.

Over 80% of New Zealanders see the primary negative impacts of tourism affecting the environment (83%) and community/everyday life (81%). Key negative aspects include *increases in litter and waste*, *holiday accommodation being too expensive for NZ residents*, and *reliance on seasonal, low-wage employment*. South Island regions particularly flag *increased traffic issues* as a significant concern.

Objective 3. Sentiment towards tourism in different regions

86% believe that tourism benefits their region, with the highest agreement in Nelson, West Coast, Gisborne, and Otago, where over 90% see tourism positively. Manawatū-Whanganui residents are less likely to agree.

83% of New Zealanders across all regions highlight the *boost to the local economy* as the key benefit of both international and domestic tourism. This was particularly noticed in Nelson, while Manawatū-Whanganui residents are less likely to agree.

More than a quarter in all regions except Tasman and Otago feel that they lack enough international visitors in summer; 25% of residents in Tasman and 26% in Otago feel there are too many.

Across all regions, domestic visitors are preferred over international ones. At least 25% feel they lack enough domestic visitors in summer, apart from in Tasman (14%) and Bay of Plenty (8%), which report having too many (compared to 4% total).

Objective 4. How New Zealanders engage with tourism

Some 11% of New Zealanders have worked in the tourism sector in the past year.

Over 80% haven't had the opportunity to voice their opinions on tourism development nor know where to express concerns, but 27% want to be more involved in these decisions.

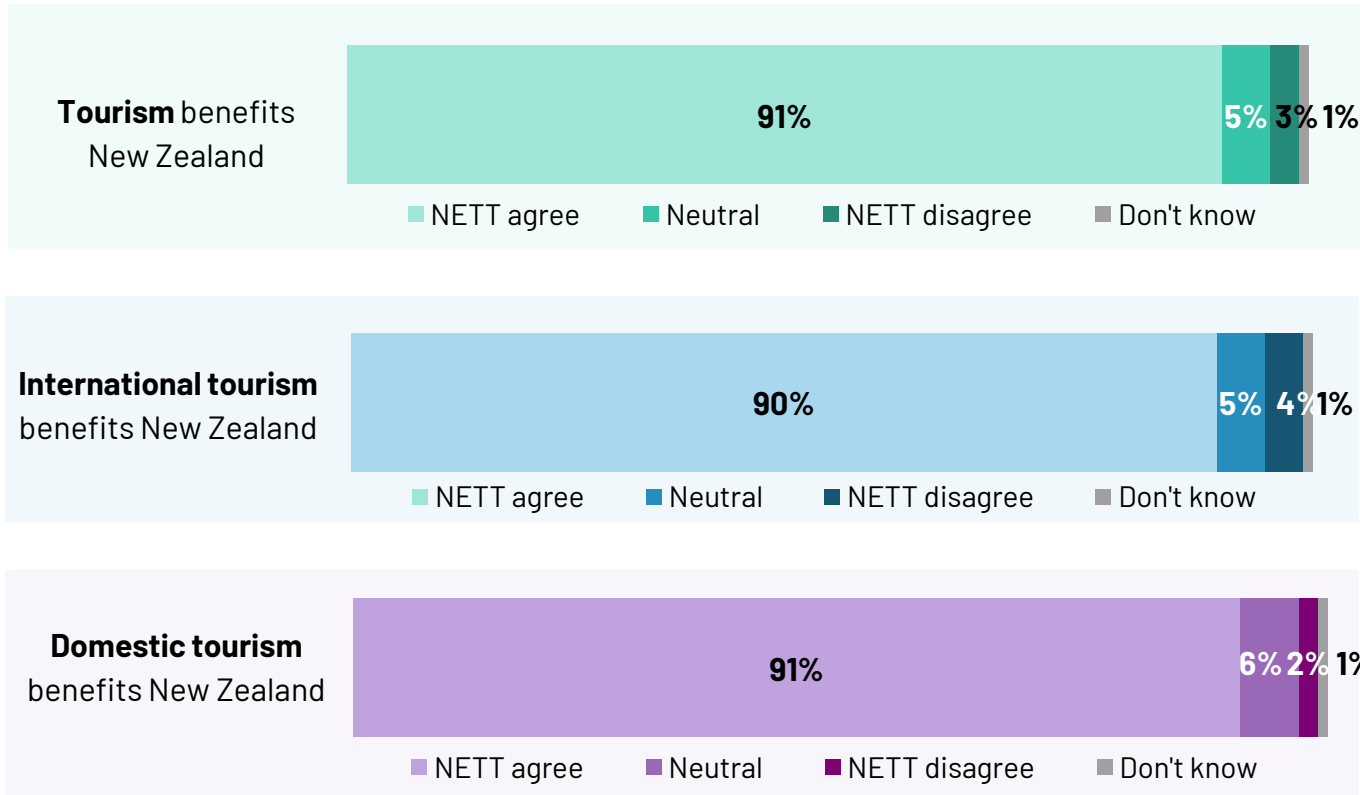
During summer, nature tourism is popular among New Zealanders, with over half visiting *beaches* (53%) and others enjoying *public gardens* (36%) and *scenic walks/lookouts* (29%). Engagement varies regionally based on local offerings.

3. Objective 1 OVERALL SENTIMENT TOWARDS TOURISM IN NEW ZEALAND



Views on tourism in New Zealand today

Across the country, 9 out of 10 think international & domestic tourism benefits New Zealand. Nationally, only 1% see tourism as one of the most important issues facing New Zealand today, with cost of living/inflation, healthcare & the economy selected as more pressing problems.

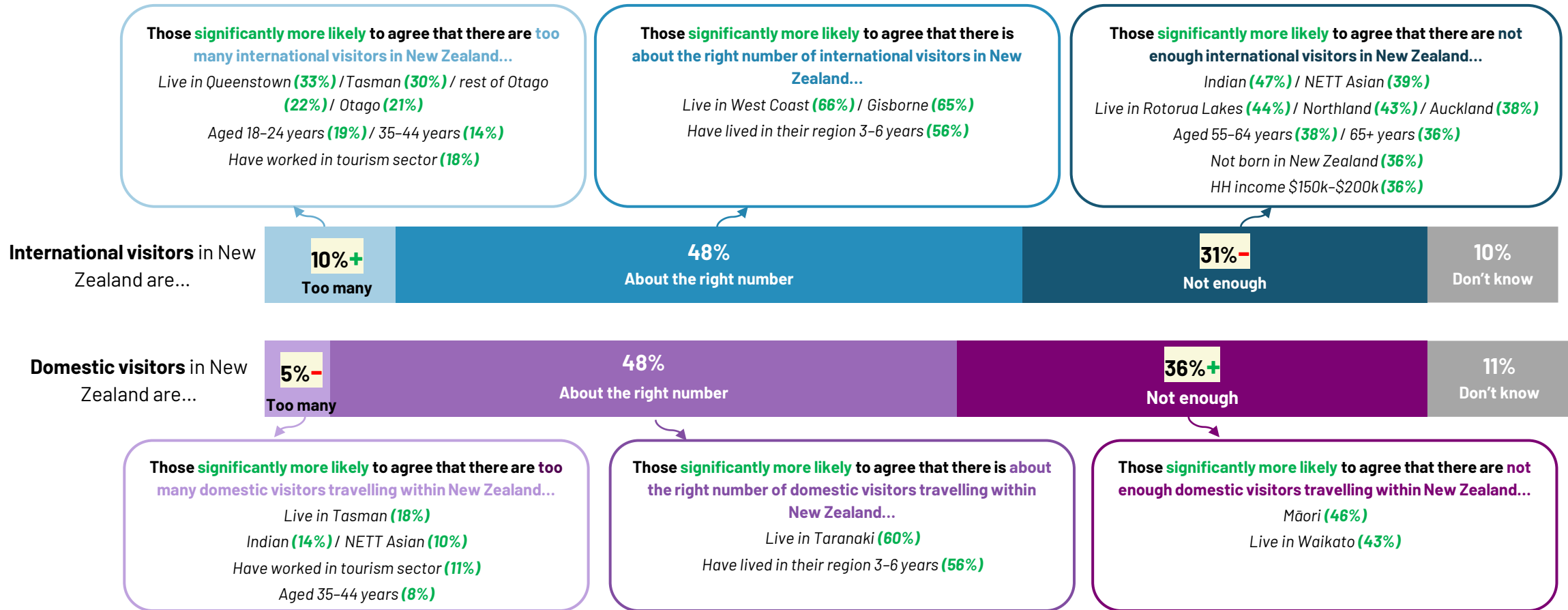

Number of international & domestic visitors in NZ over the summer

Almost half of New Zealanders feel there is 'about the right number' of international (48%) & domestic (48%) visitors & for about one third there are 'not enough' international (31%) & domestic (36%) visitors. More domestic tourism is encouraged; higher percentages of New Zealanders believe there are 'too many' international visitors vs domestic ones (10% vs 5%) & there are 'not enough' domestic visitors vs international visitors (36% vs 31%).



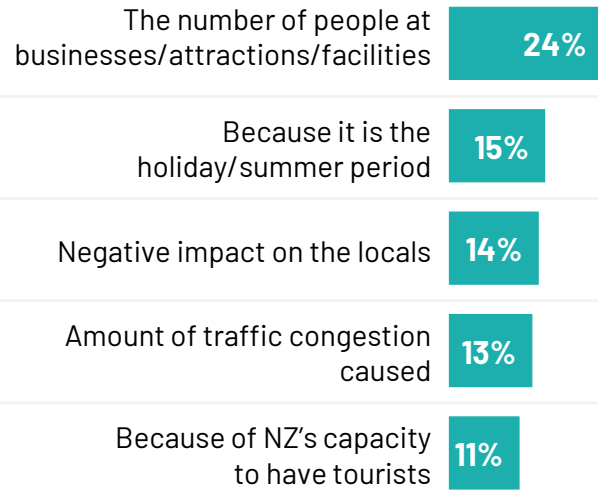
Q3/Q5: Thinking about tourism in New Zealand during the summer period (December-February), in your opinion, do you think there are...

Reasons for perceptions of number of international visitors

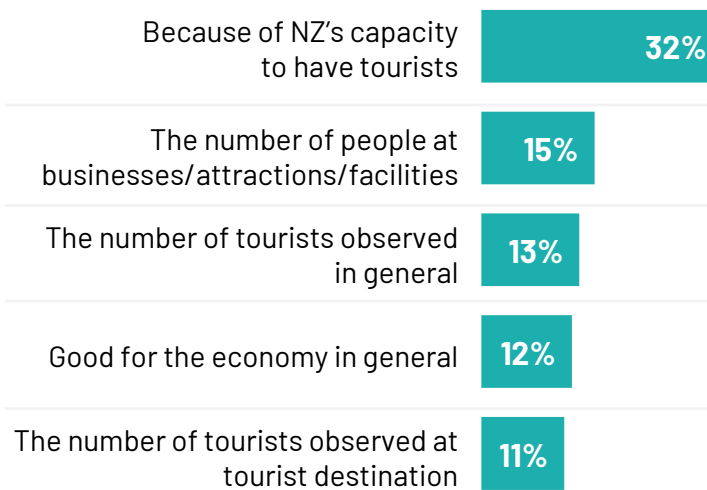
New Zealand's capacity to have tourists was a compelling reason why the vast majority of New Zealanders considered there to be the 'right number' (48%) or 'not enough' (31%) international visitors. Among the 10% of New Zealanders who thought there were 'too many' international visitors, 24% mentioned the number of people at businesses, attractions & facilities.

10% Too many international visitors: Top-5 themes



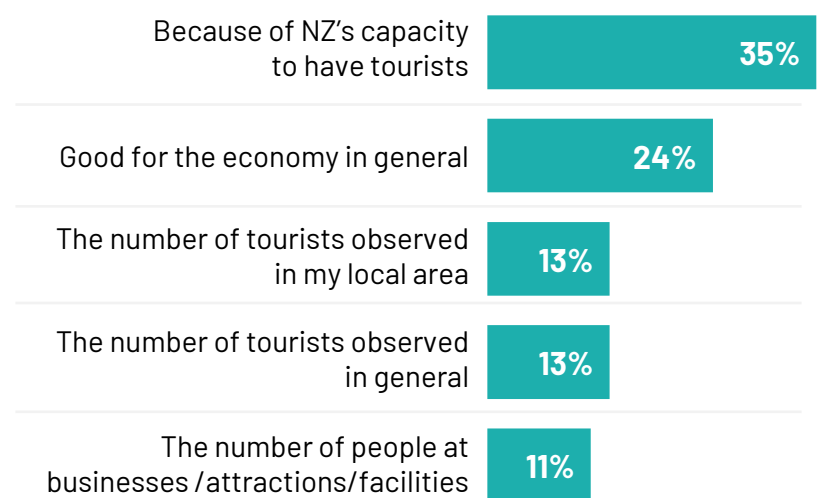

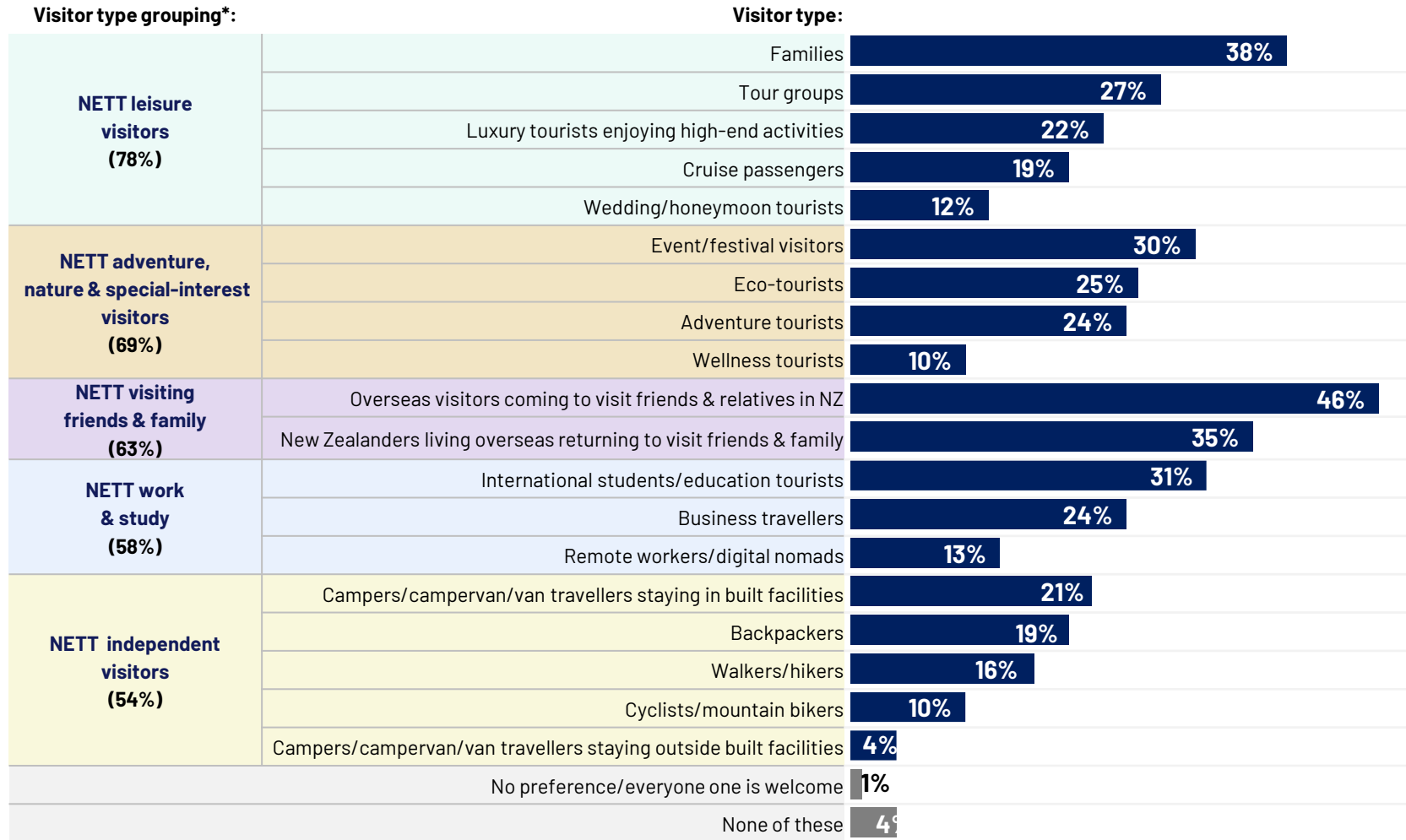

International visitors New Zealanders want to see less of

37% of New Zealanders expressed a desire to see fewer campers, campervans & van travellers staying outside built facilities compared to any other type of international visitor. This preference is notably higher than for fewer remote workers (18%) & cruise passengers (16%).

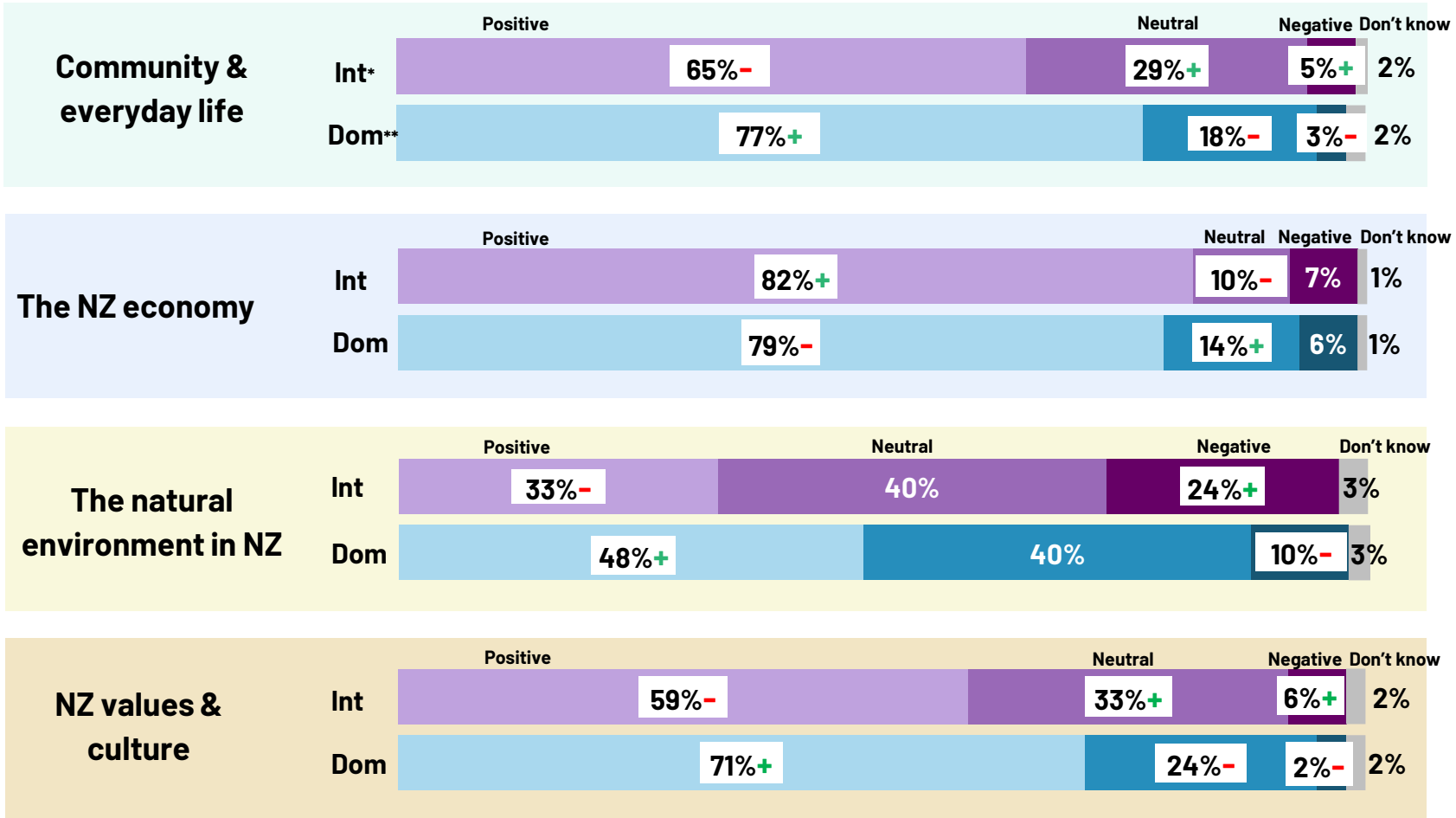


4. Objective 2 PERCEIVED IMPACT OF TOURISM IN NEW ZEALAND

Impact of international & domestic tourism on New Zealand

Domestic visitors were seen to have a more positive impact than international ones on all aspects apart from the NZ economy. Perceptions of the impact on the natural environment are the least positive for both domestic & international visitors. Gisborne residents are significantly more likely to rate the impact of international visitors positively for three of the four key aspects.

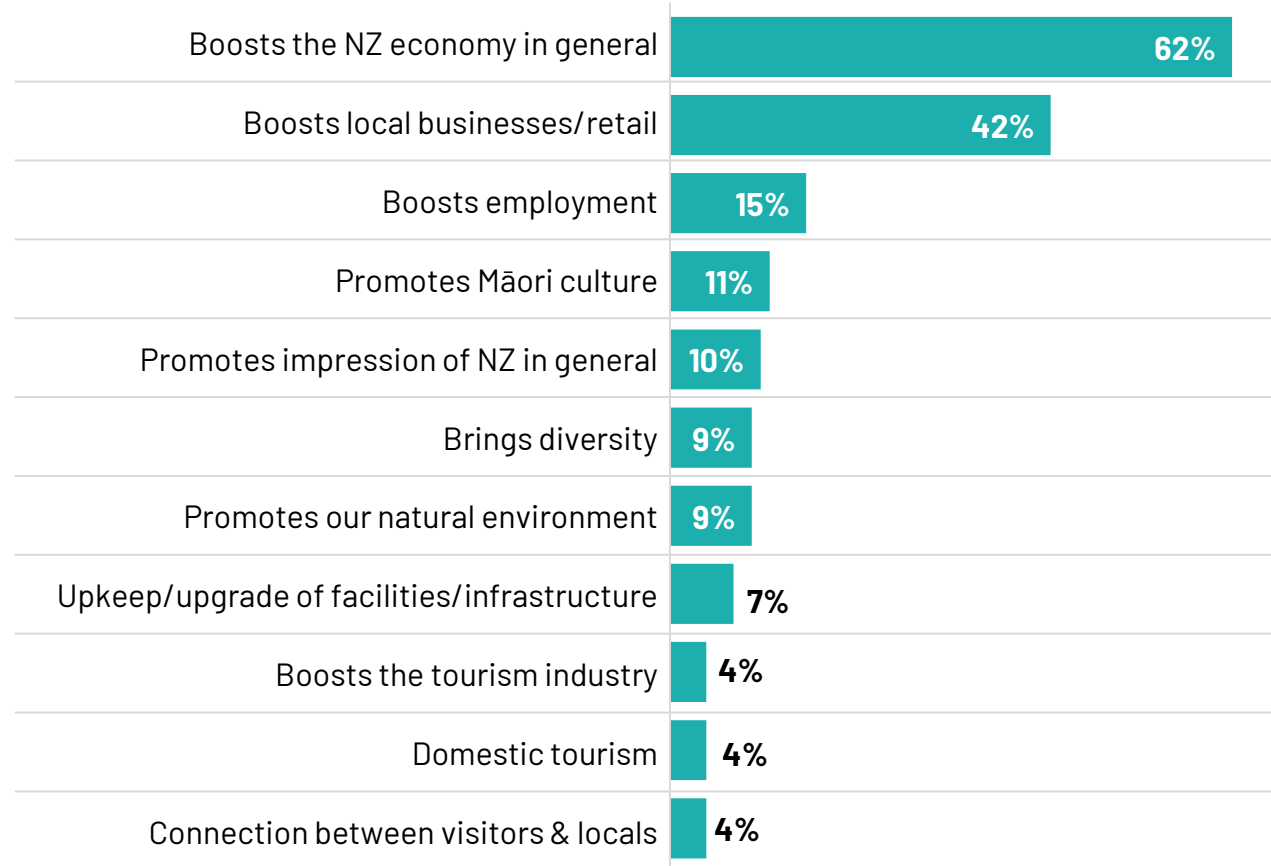

Benefits of tourism

Among the 91% of New Zealanders who think that tourism benefits New Zealand, the main unprompted reasons given were related to the benefits to the economy (62%) & boosts to local businesses (42%).

Benefits of tourism

95% of New Zealanders believe tourism brings economic benefits. Notably, over half highlighted economic growth for New Zealand (60%) & creates employment/income opportunities (59%) as the top advantages. However, Māori (51%) & Pacific Peoples (47%) were significantly less likely to state that tourism creates economic growth for New Zealand.

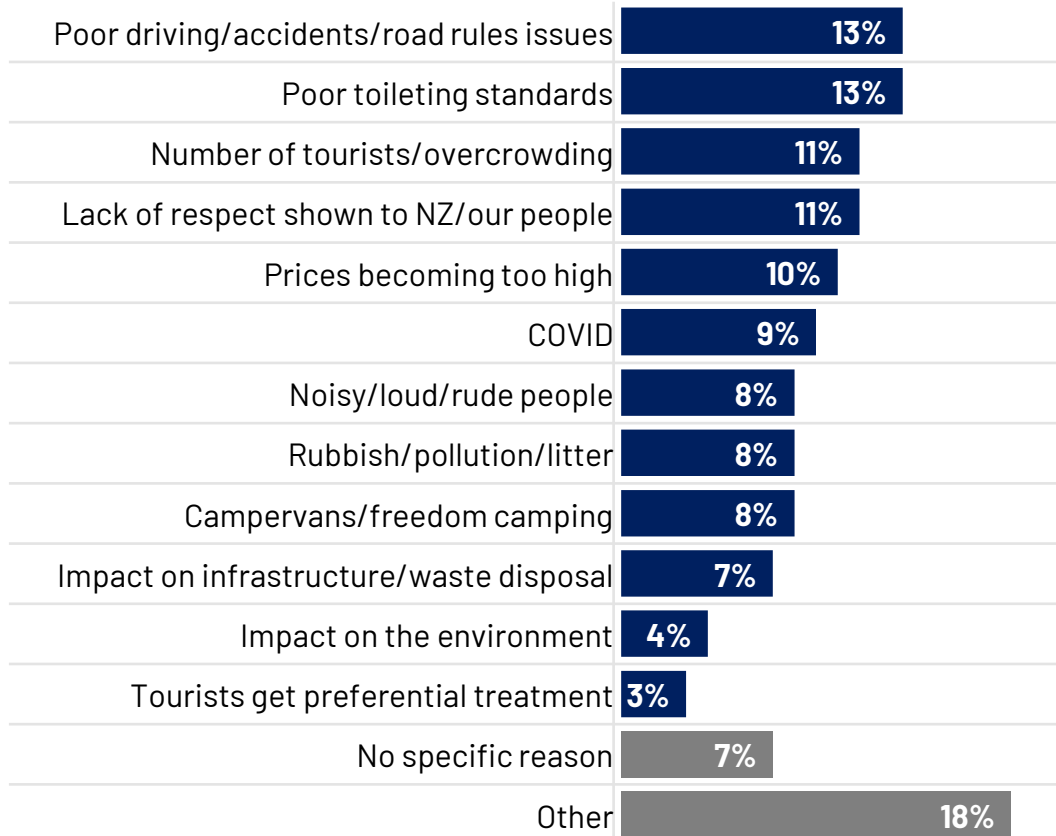

Among the 3% of New Zealanders who stated that tourism has a negative impact on New Zealand, the top-2 reasons provided were poor driving (13%) & poor toileting standards (13%), likely linked to freedom camping.

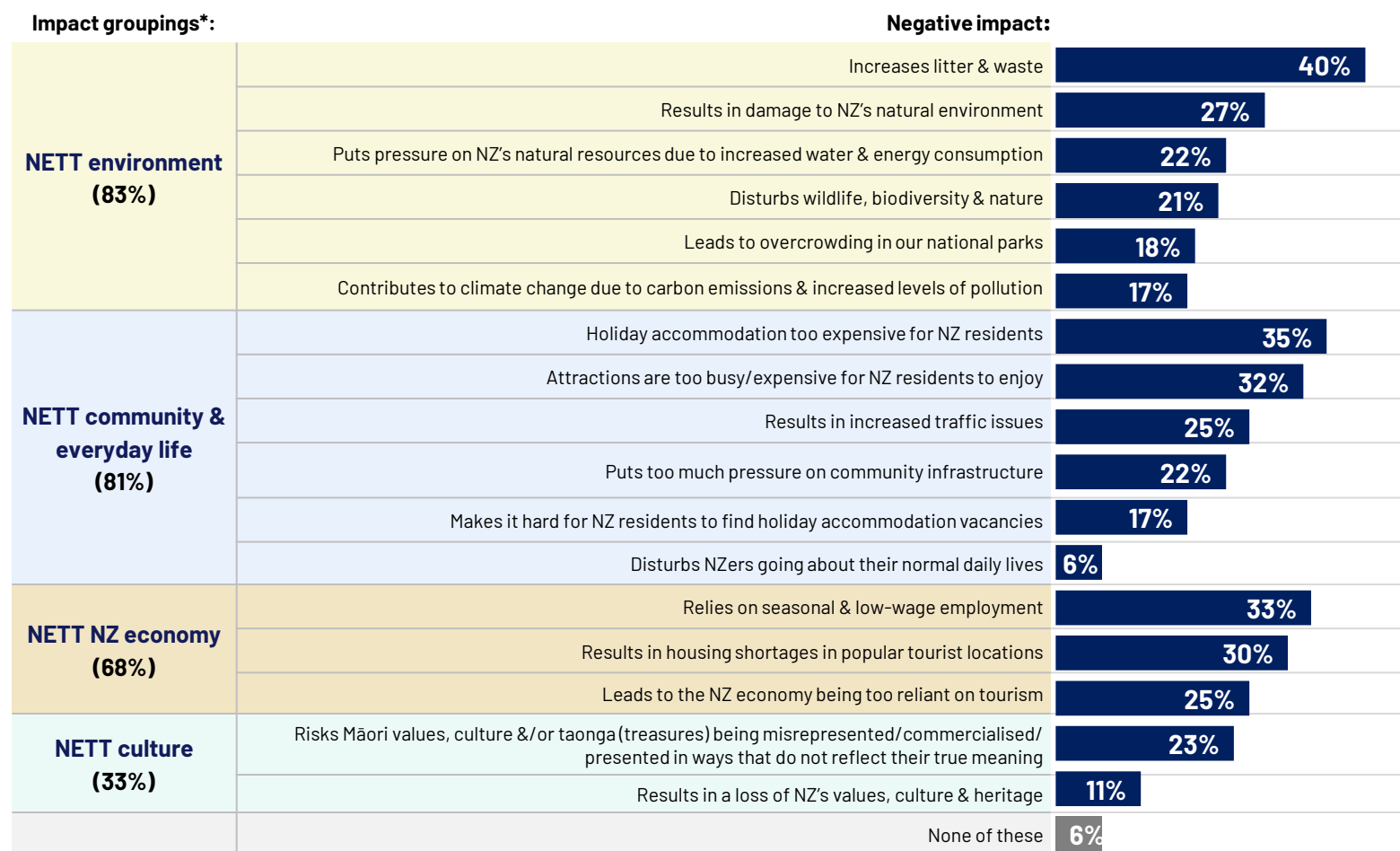

Negative impacts of tourism

Over 80% of New Zealanders identified the primary negative impacts of tourism as affecting the environment (83%) & community & everyday life (81%). The top-3 specific negative impacts cited were increases in litter & waste (40%), holiday accommodation becoming too expensive for NZ residents (35%) & reliance on seasonal, low-wage employment (33%).

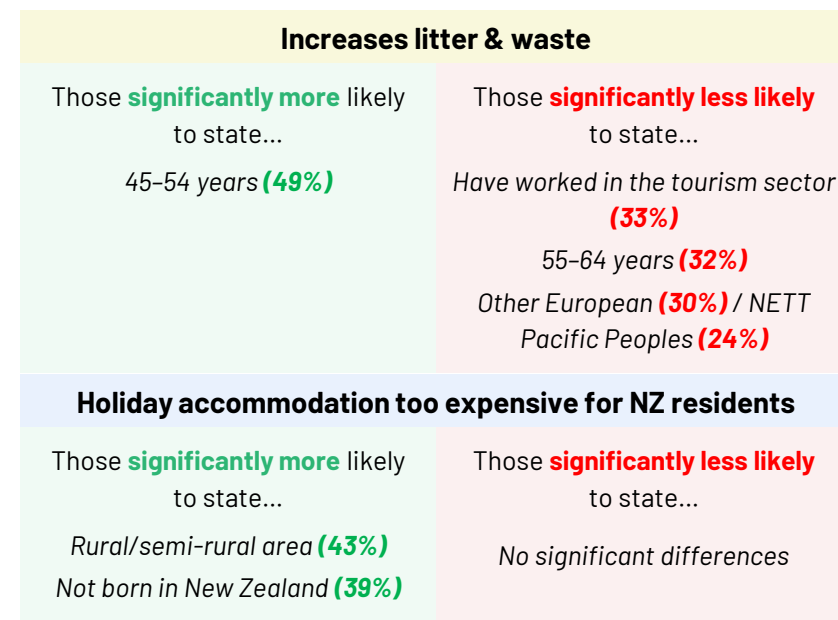
Negative impacts of tourism: Top choices from provided list

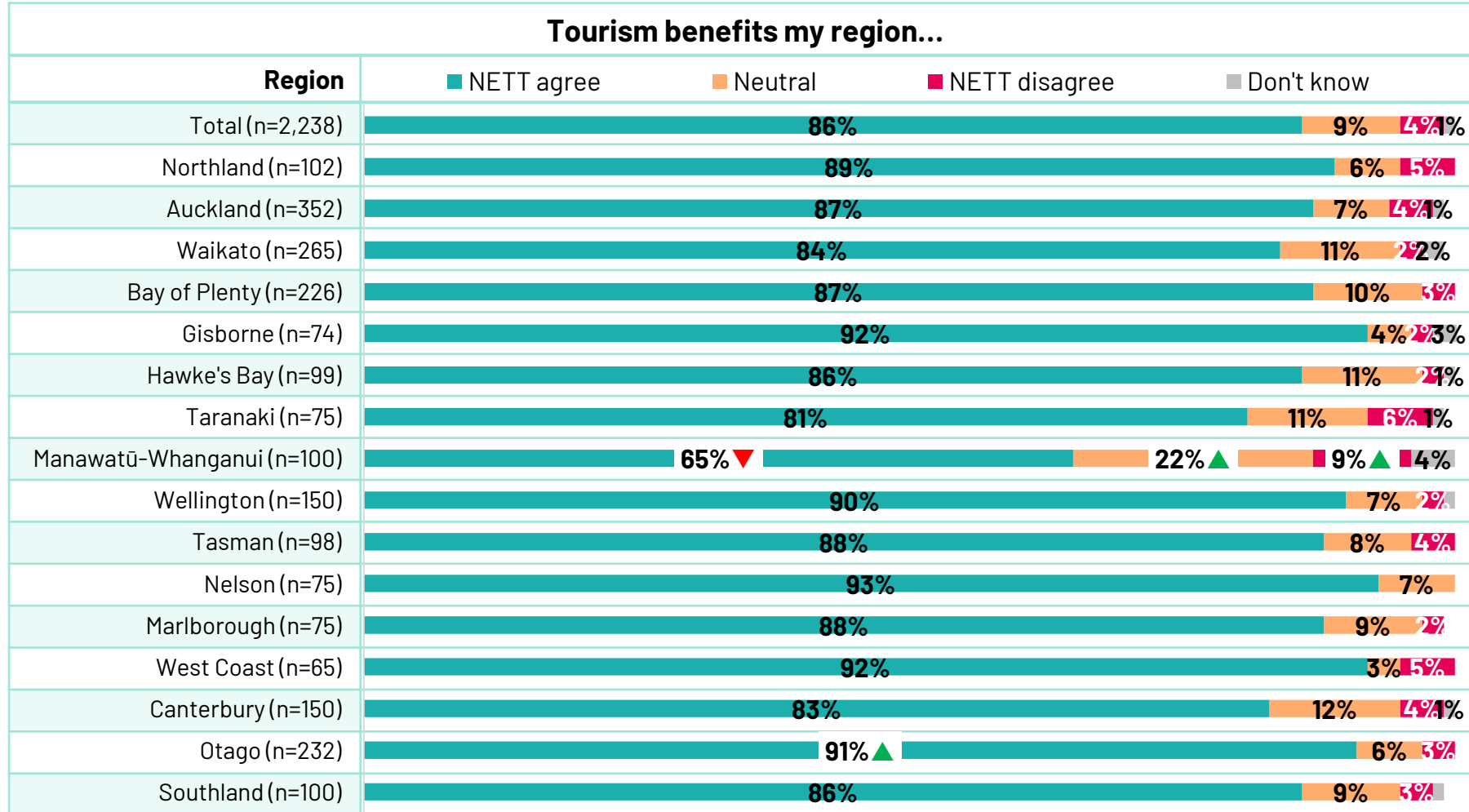

5. Objective 3 SENTIMENT TOWARDS TOURISM IN DIFFERENT REGIONS

Regional views: Perceived benefits of tourism

Overall 86% agree that tourism benefits their region, with Manawatū-Whanganui least likely to agree. In Nelson, West Coast, Gisborne & Otago, more than 9 in 10 people agree that tourism is a benefit to their region.

At least a quarter of residents in all regions aside from Tasman & Otago feel they have 'not enough' international visitors during summer, with this sentiment especially strong in Northland (48%), Manawatū-Whanganui (46%) & Southland (42%).

Conversely, a quarter of **residents in Tasman (25%) & Otago (26%) believe there are 'too many' international visitors.**

Compared to the average, Manawatū-Whanganui & Taranaki residents feel less benefit from international tourism, whereas Nelson residents perceive a more positive impact.

When considering the impact of international tourism, 83% of New Zealanders identified the **boost to the local economy as the most positive aspect**, especially in Nelson (95%). However, only 74% in Manawatū-Whanganui felt positively, likely due to fewer international visitors.

The **natural environment was perceived as the most negatively impacted attribute** (17%), especially in Otago (25%).

Across all regions, domestic visitors seem more desirable than international visitors.

At least 25% of residents in all regions aside from Tasman feel they have 'not enough' domestic visitors during summer, with this sentiment especially strong in Manawatū-Whanganui (44%), Wellington (43%) & Southland (46%).

Residents in the Tasman (14%) & Bay of Plenty (8%) regions were significantly more likely to state they have 'too many domestic' visitors over the summer.

Like with international visitors, when assessing the impact of domestic tourism, **83% of New Zealanders acknowledged the boost to the local economy as the most positive aspect.** Again, this was most prominent in Nelson (93%) & least in Manawatū-Whanganui (70%).

The **natural environment was viewed as negatively impacted** by both domestic & international visitors, but this was notably lower at 10% for domestic visitors compared to 17% for international ones.

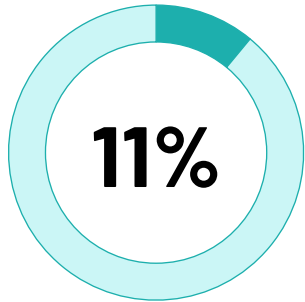
There was also **an increase in positive impact to community & everyday life (5 % points) & NZ values & culture (4 % points)** compared to impact of international visitors.

6. Objective 4 ENGAGEMENT WITH THE NEW ZEALAND TOURISM INDUSTRY

Working in tourism

More than 1 in 10 New Zealanders have been employed in the tourism sector over the past year. This workforce tends to be younger individuals, Māori, or those relatively new to New Zealand or their current region, with a notable concentration in the South Island.

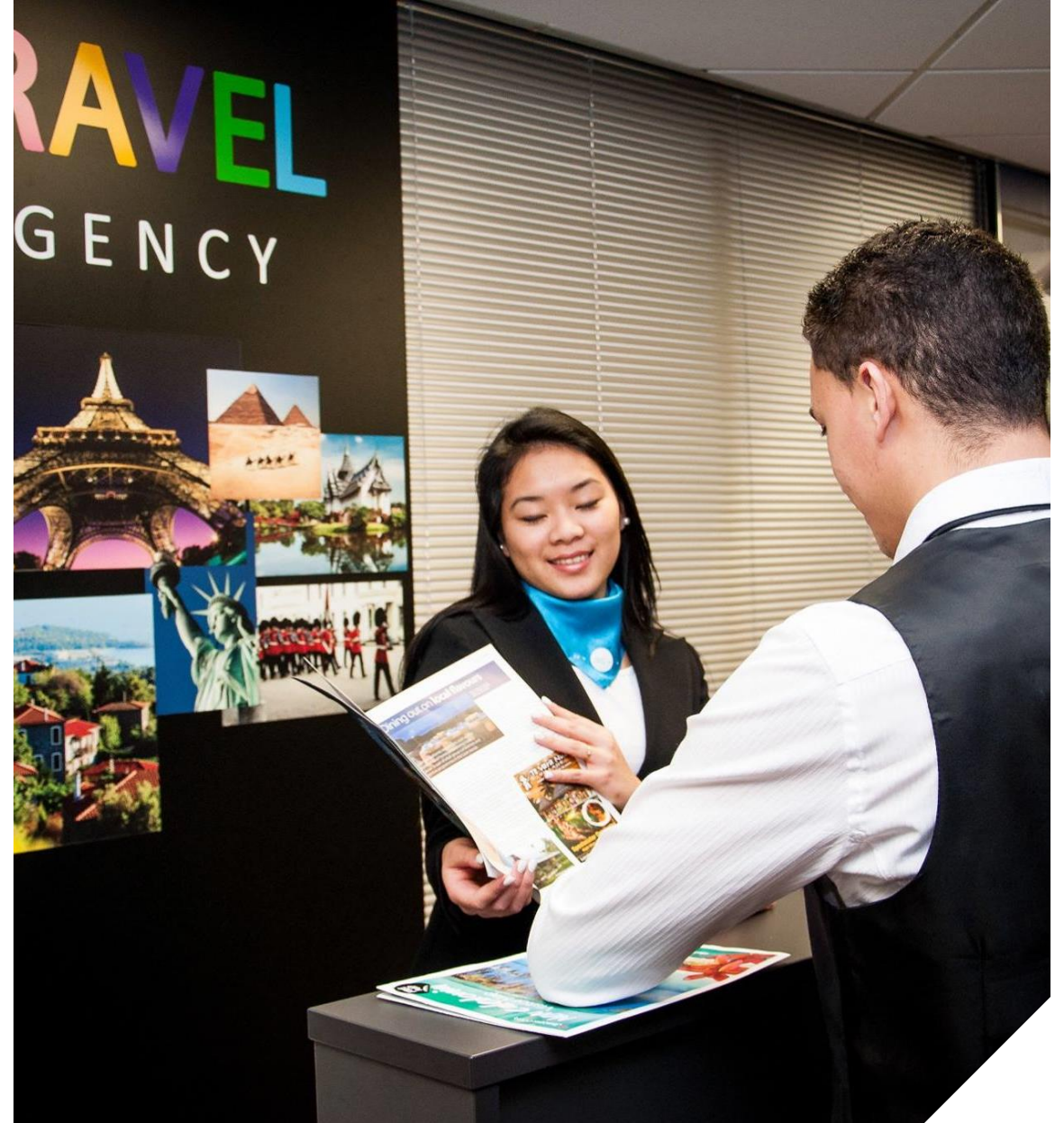

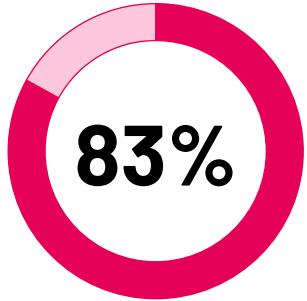

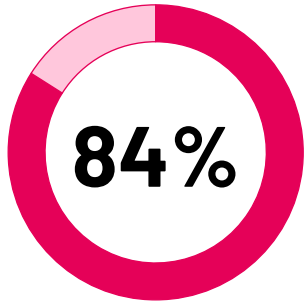

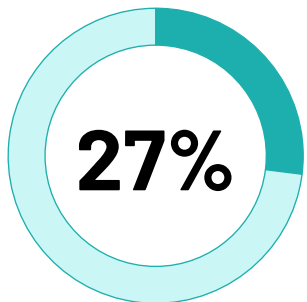

During the summer, nature tourism is popular among New Zealanders, with over half visiting beaches (53%) & others enjoying public gardens (36%) & scenic walks or lookouts (29%).

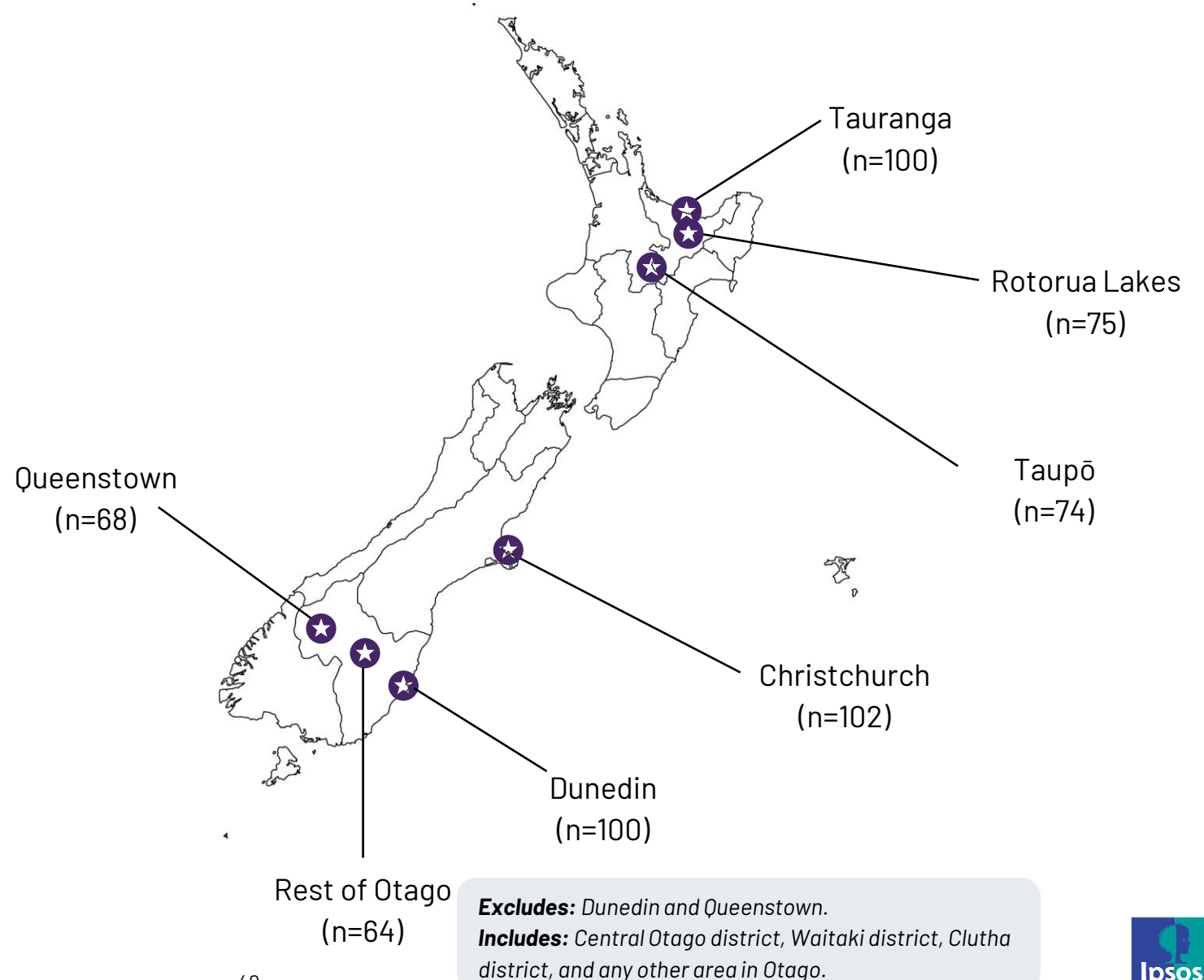


Destinations of interest

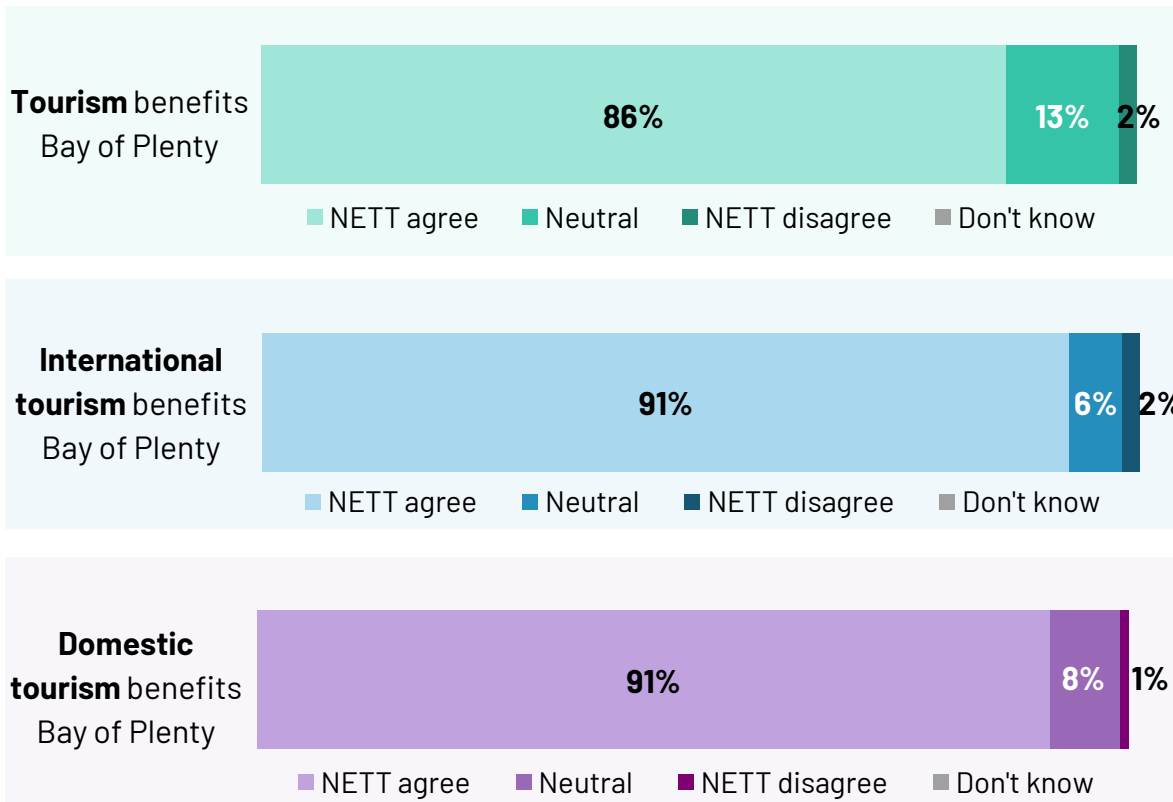

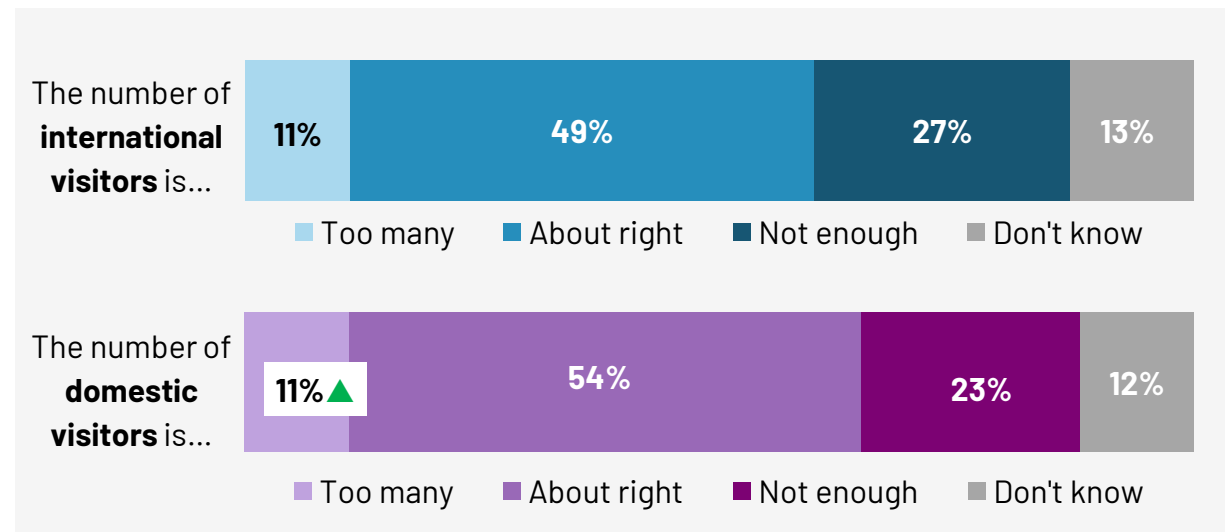
Tauranga residents: Tourism benefits & visitor numbers

Among Tauranga residents, 86% believe that tourism benefits the Bay of Plenty, aligning closely with the 88% from Rotorua Lakes. Approximately half feel the region receives 'about the right number' of international (49%) & domestic (54%) visitors during summer. However, a quarter feel there are 'not enough' international (27%) & domestic (23%) visitors. Tauranga residents have a smaller appetite for more visitors in the Bay of Plenty region than Rotorua Lakes ones.

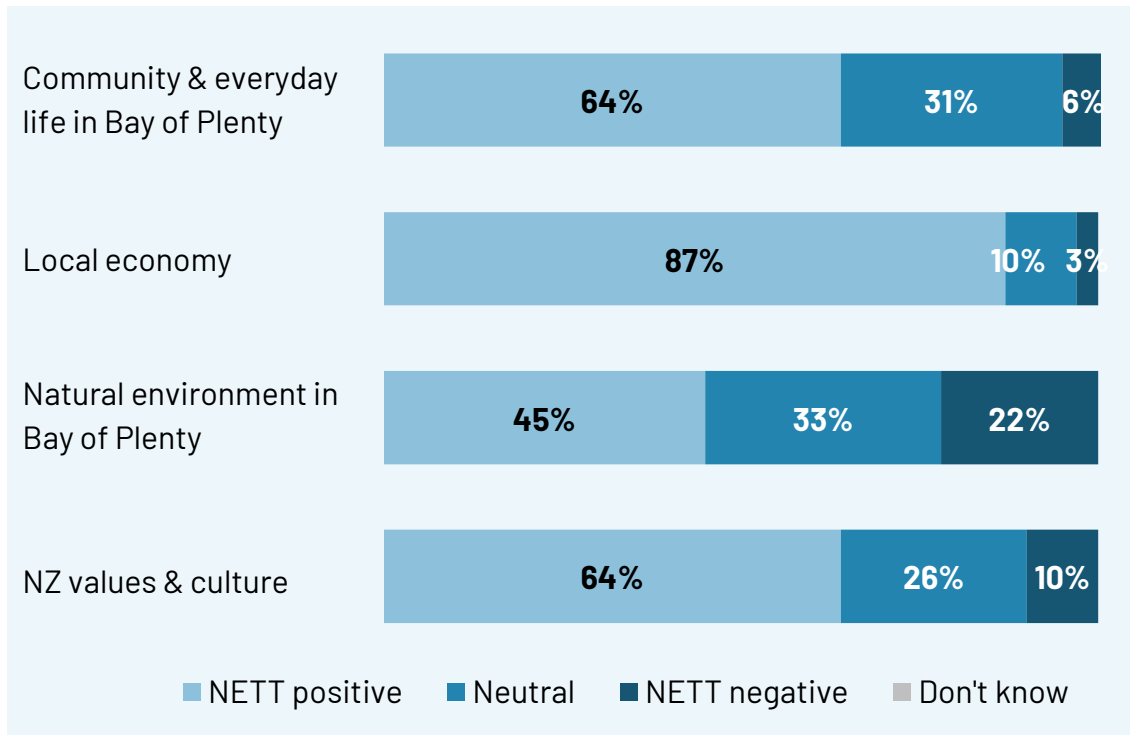

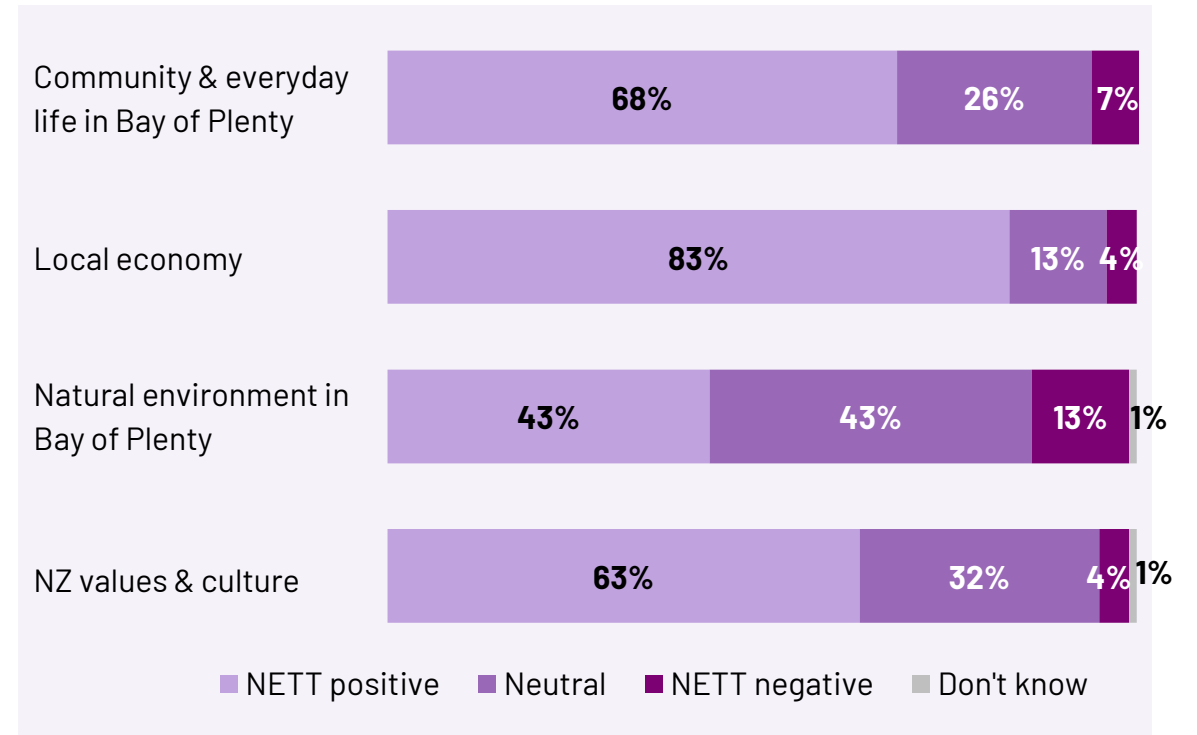
Tauranga residents: Impact of tourism on key regional aspects

Tauranga residents, like those in other regions, highlight the boost to the local economy as the most positive impact of both international (87%) & domestic (83%) tourism. A majority (63%-68%) also perceive tourism as beneficial for the community, everyday life & NZ values & culture. However, tourism's positive impact on the natural environment is significantly lower, with only 43%-45% agreement. Although not statistically significant, more Tauranga residents view international tourism (22%) as negatively impacting the natural environment compared to domestic tourism (13%).

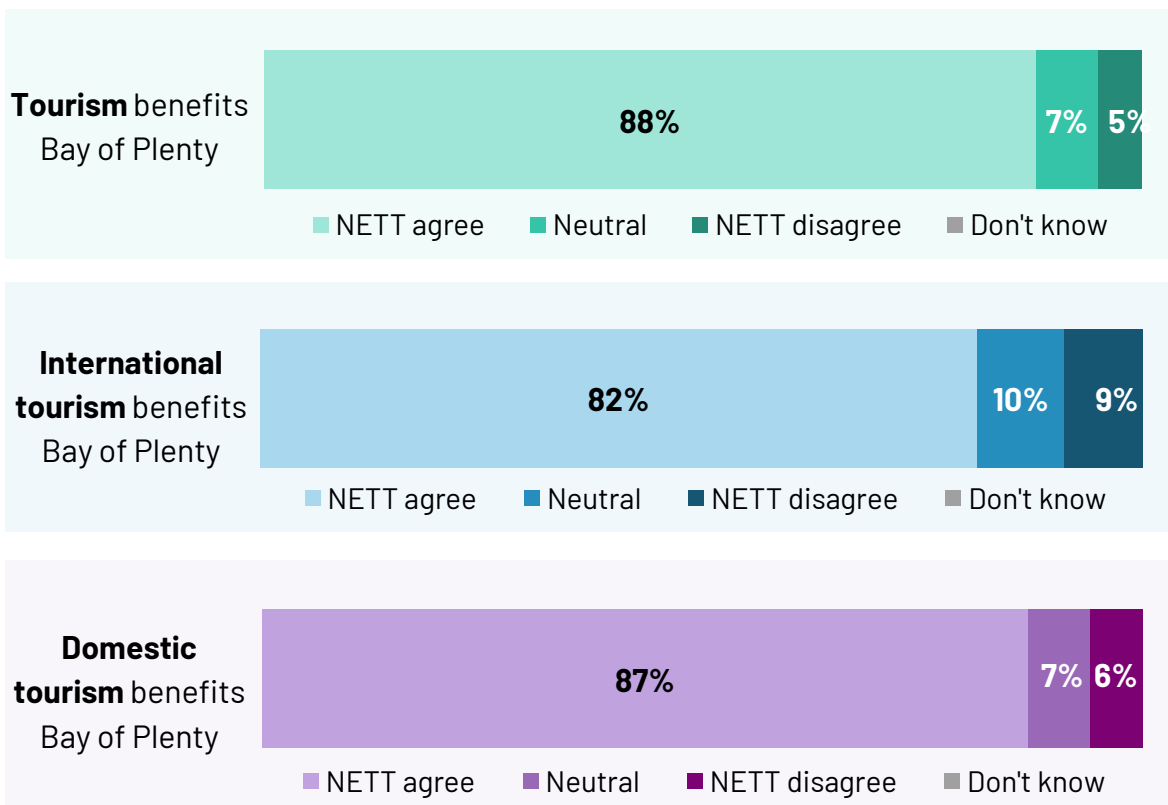

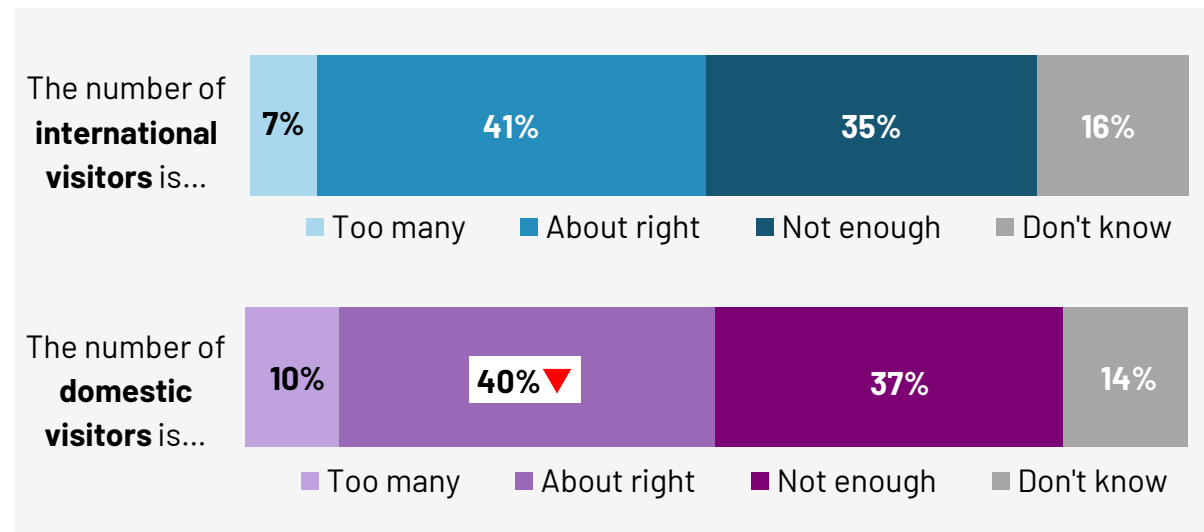
Rotorua Lakes residents: Tourism benefits & visitor numbers

Among Rotorua Lakes residents, 88% believe tourism benefits the Bay of Plenty, aligning closely with the 86% from Tauranga. About 40% feel the region receives 'the right number' of international (41%) & domestic (40%) visitors during summer, while roughly one third believe there are 'not enough' international (35%) & domestic (37%) tourists. Rotorua Lakes' residents have a greater appetite for more tourists in the Bay of Plenty region compared to those from Tauranga.

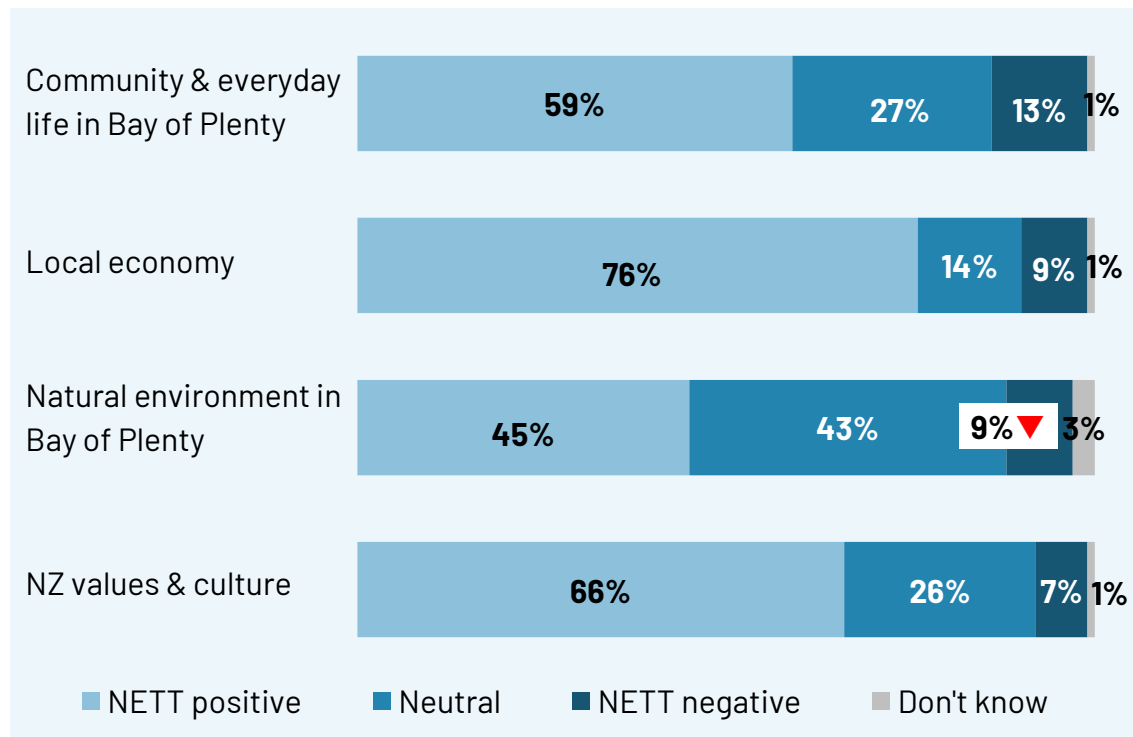

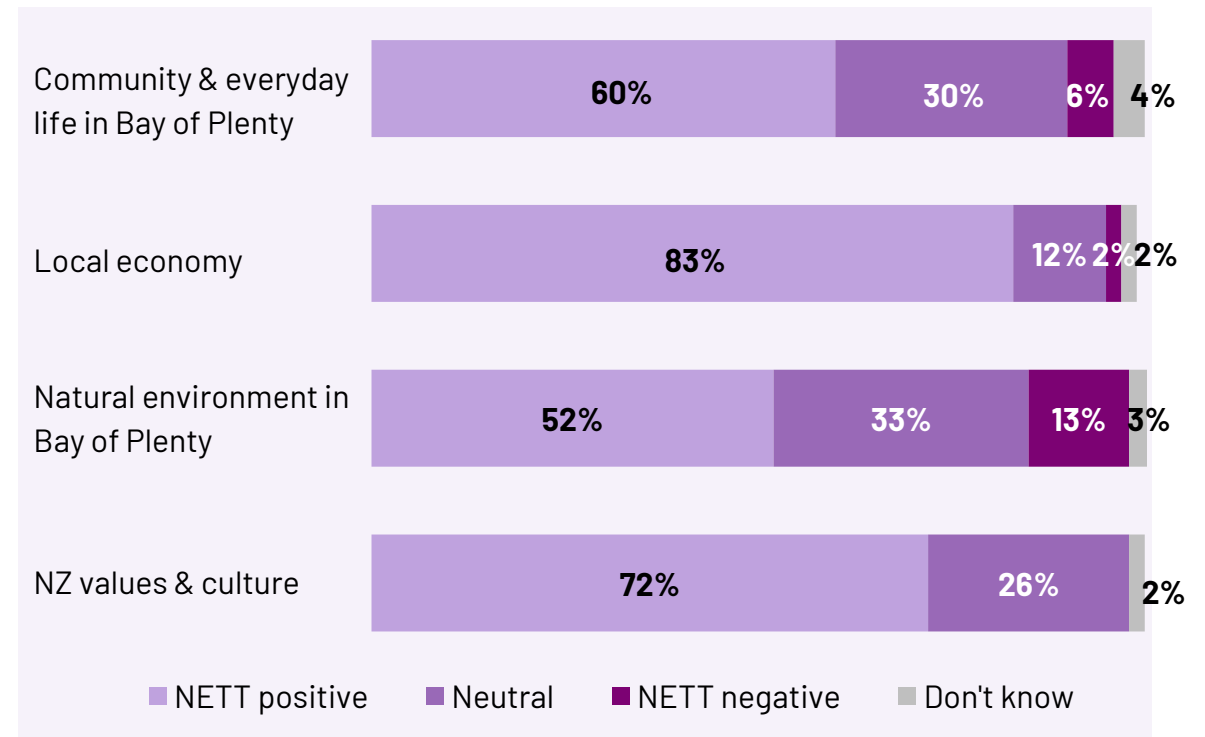

Rotorua Lakes residents, like those in other regions, highlight the boost to the local economy as the most positive impact of both international (76%) & domestic (83%) tourism. A majority (59%–72%) also perceive tourism as beneficial for the community, everyday life & NZ values & culture. Perceptions of tourism’s environmental impact remain least positive (45%–52%).

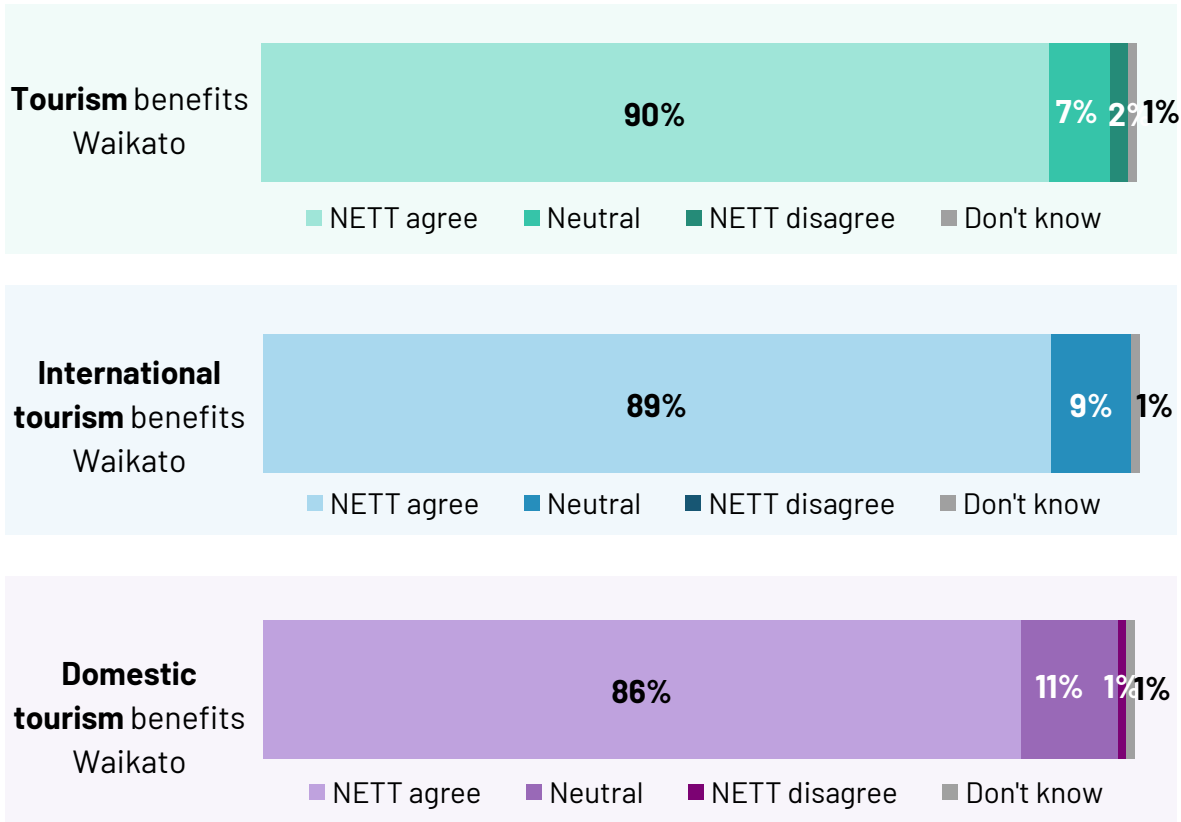

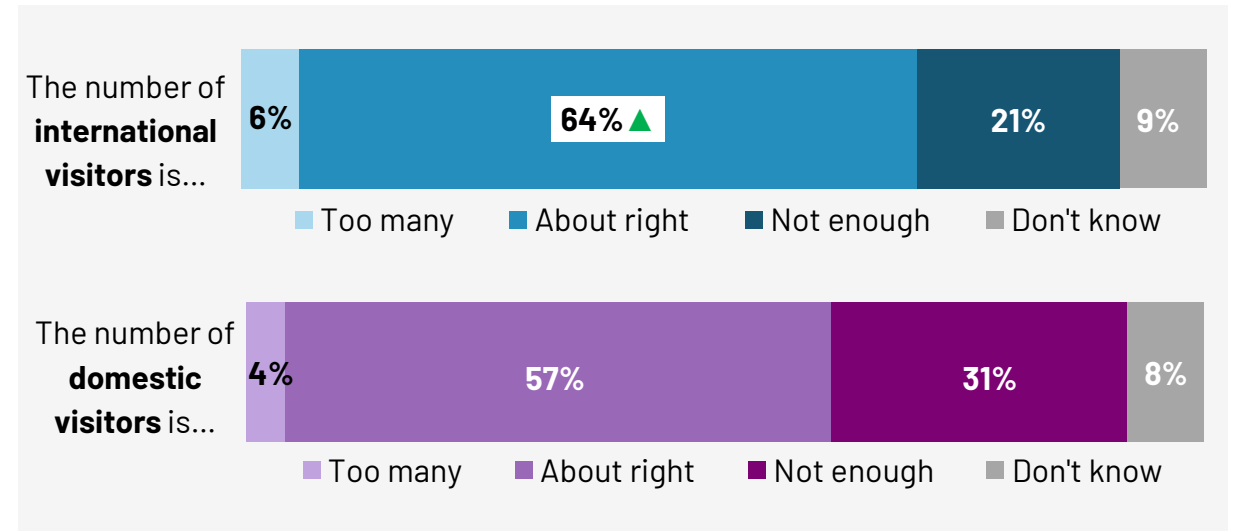

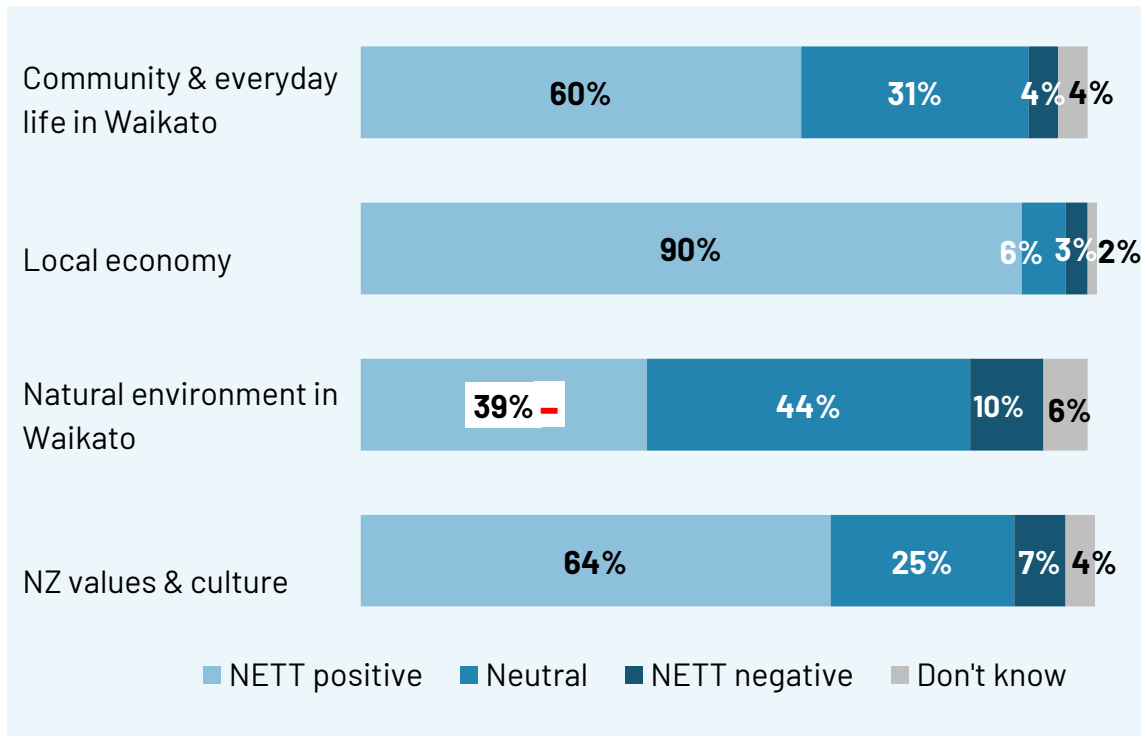

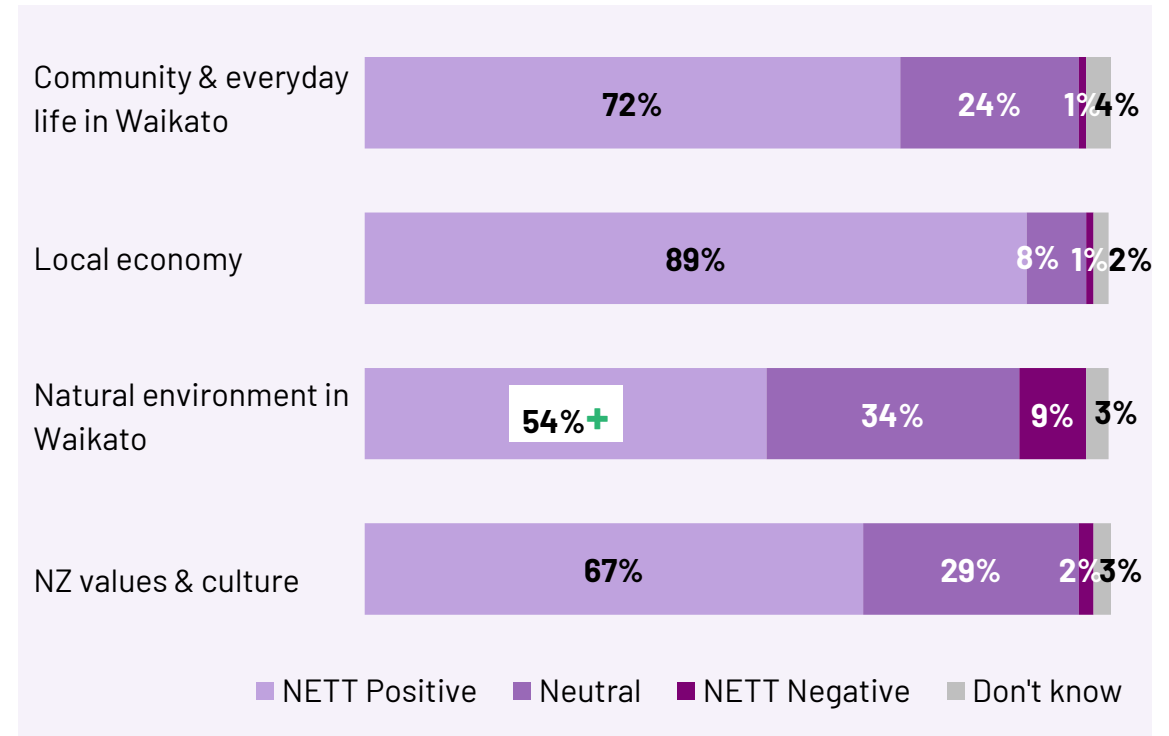
Taupō residents: Impact of tourism on key regional aspects

Taupō residents, similar to other regions, recognise the positive impact of both international (90%) & domestic (89%) tourism on the local economy. A substantial majority (60%–72%) also view tourism as beneficial for the community, daily life & NZ values & culture. Although the overall perception of tourism’s environmental impact remains least positive, Taupō residents are statistically significantly more inclined to see domestic tourism as having a positive environmental effect (54%) as opposed to international tourism (39%).

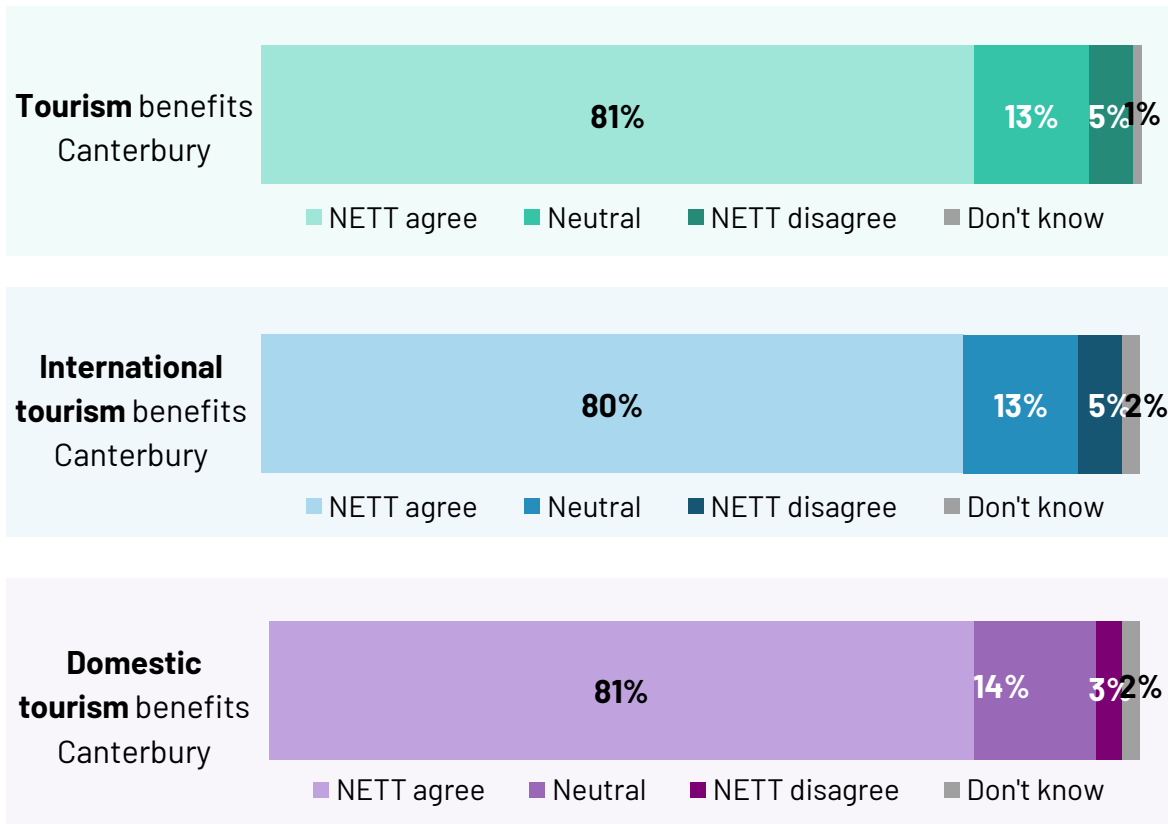

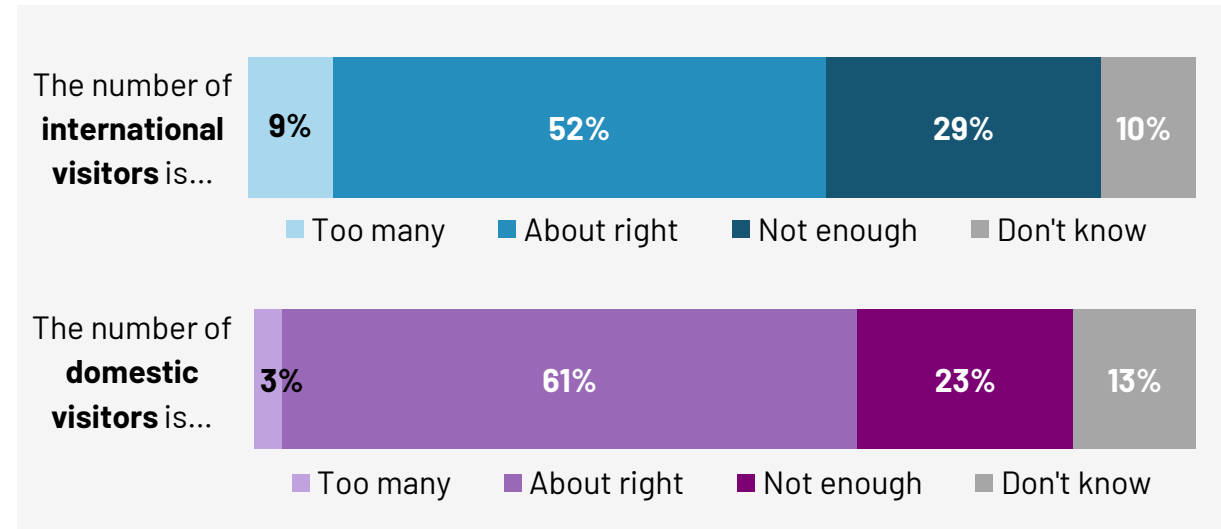

Perceived number of visitors in Canterbury during the summer



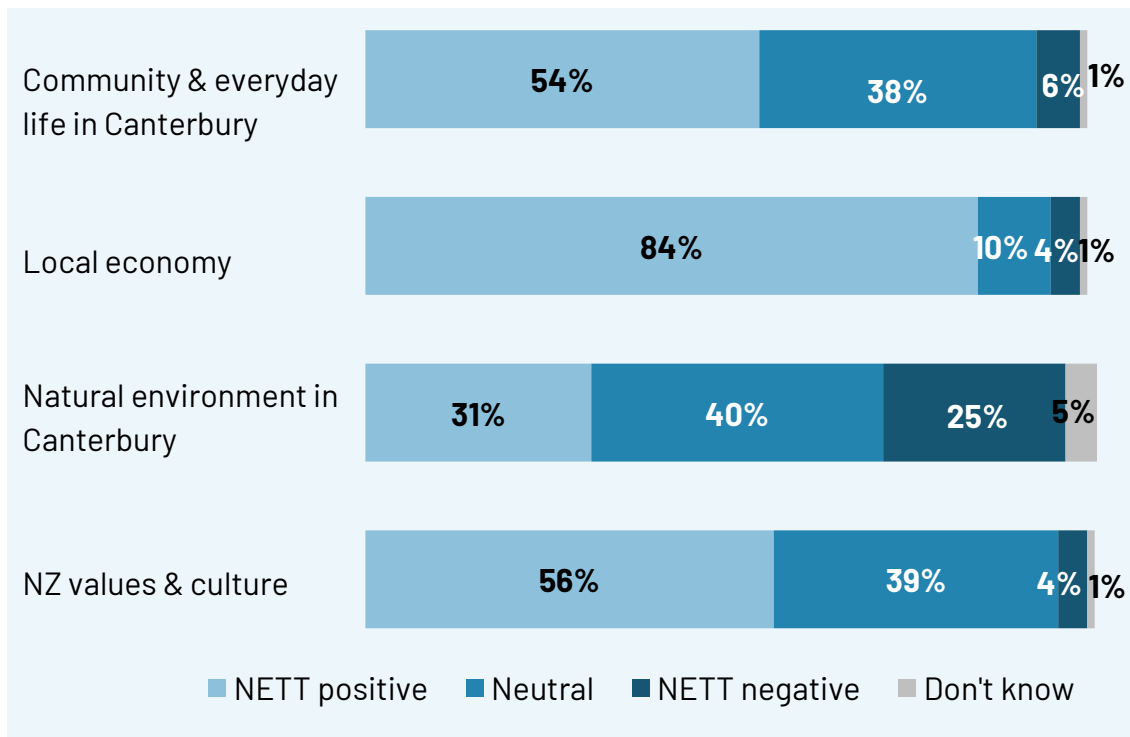

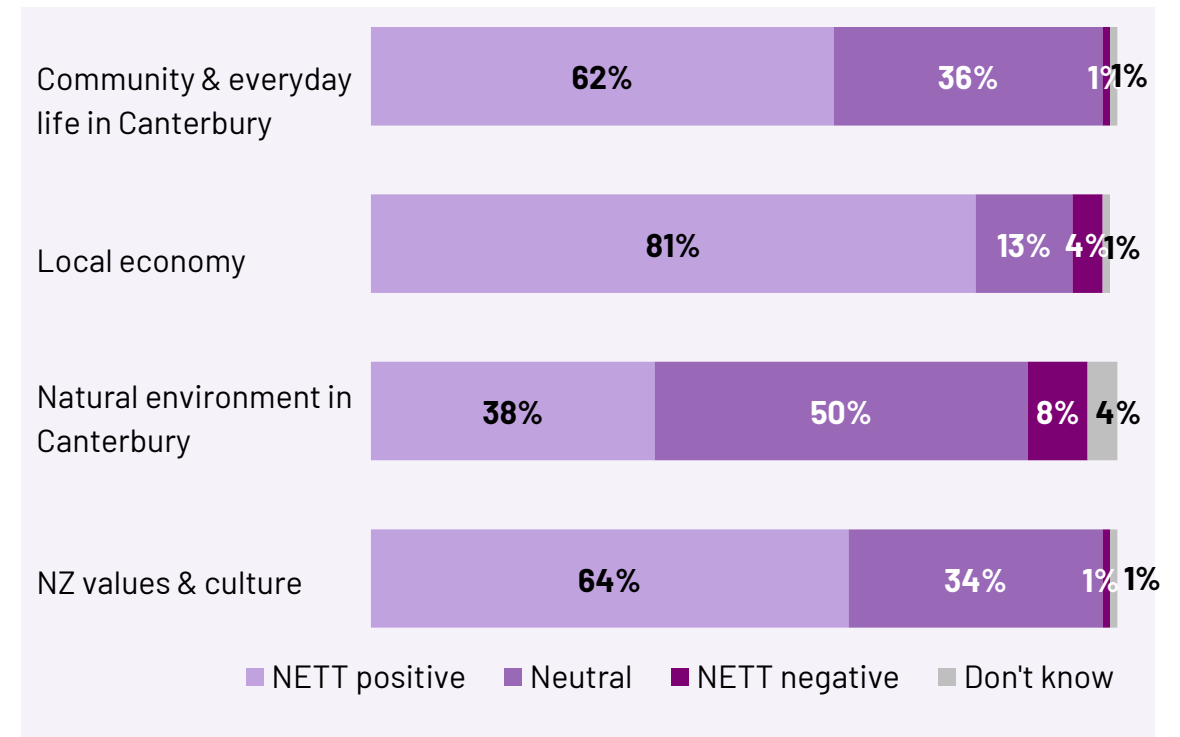
Christchurch residents: Impact of tourism on key regional aspects

Christchurch residents, akin to other regions, identify the boost to the local economy as the most positive impact from both international (84%) & domestic (81%) tourism. A majority (54%-64%) see tourism positively affecting the community, daily life & NZ values & culture, while the environmental impact of tourism is viewed less favourably (31%-38%). Although not statistically significant, Christchurch residents prefer domestic visitors' influence on community, daily life & NZ values, perceiving them as having a less negative effect on Canterbury's environment.

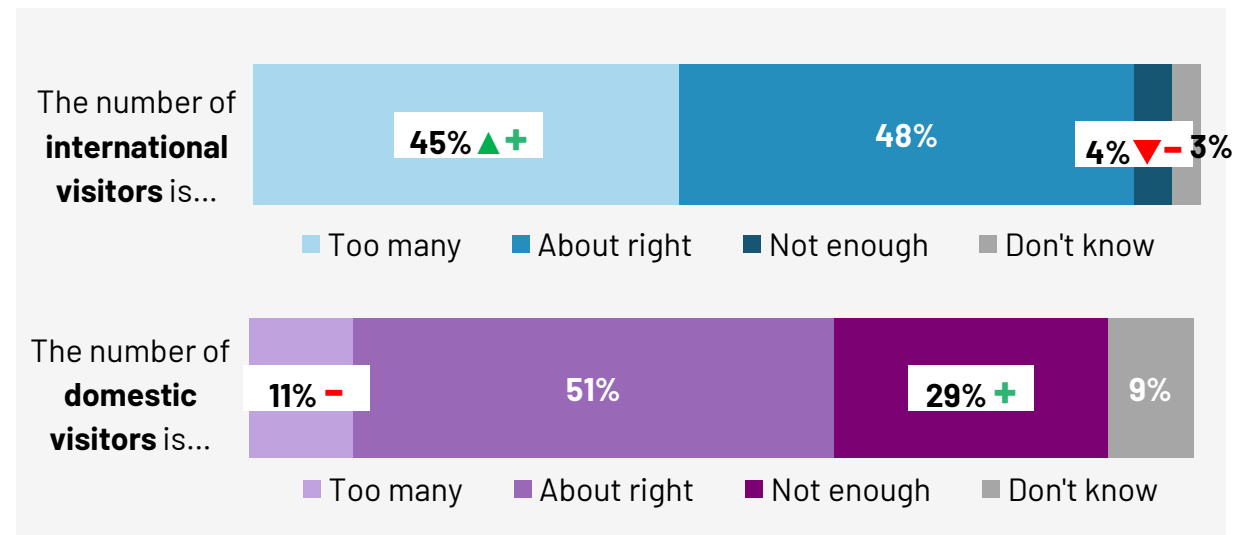

More than a quarter (29%) believe there are 'not enough' domestic visitors during summer.

Perceived number of visitors in Otago during the summer



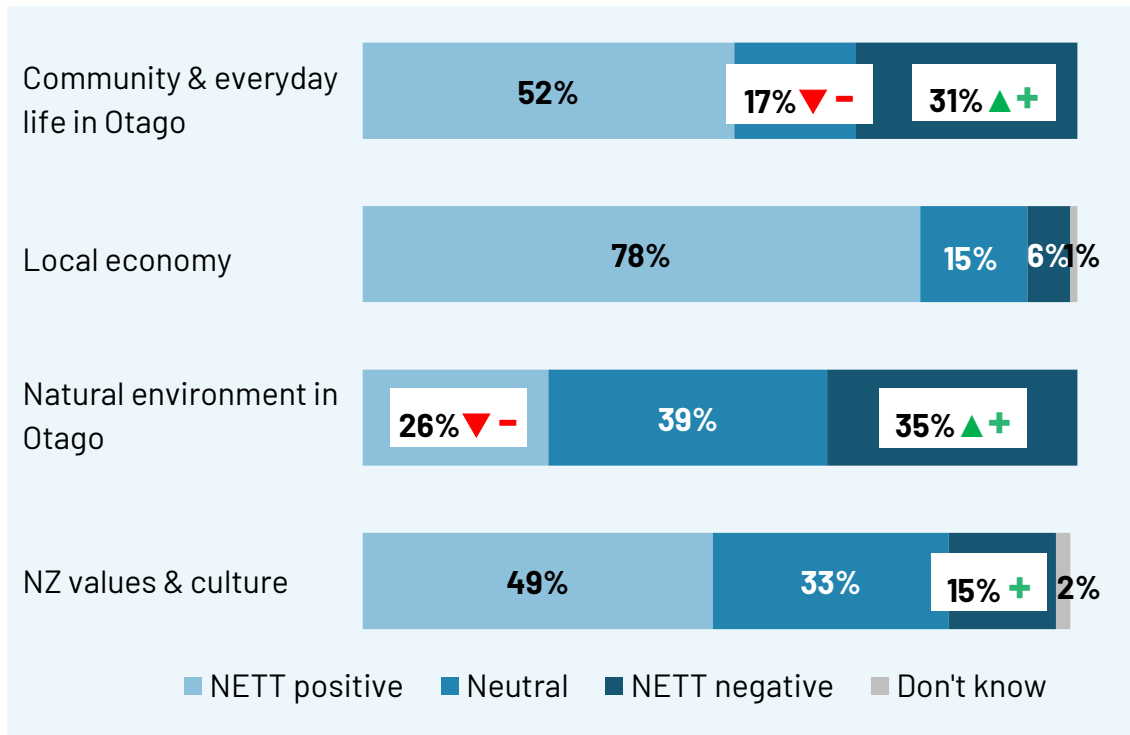

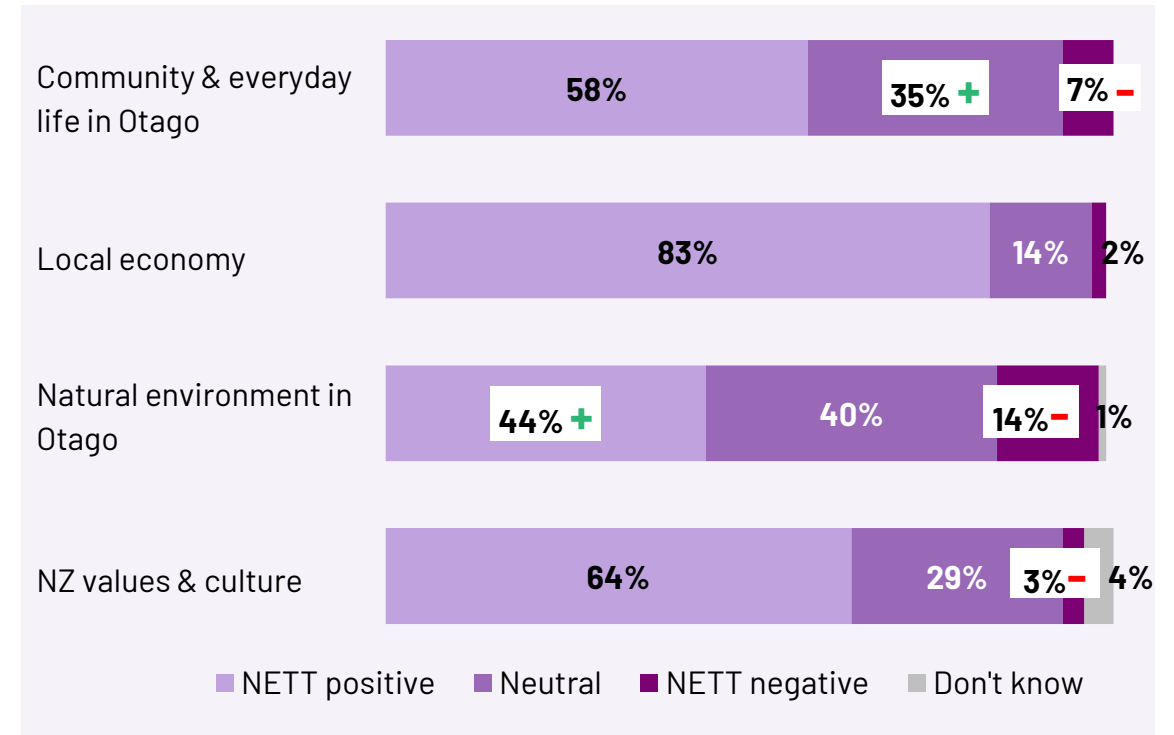

Queenstown residents recognise the boost to the local economy as the top benefit of both international (78%) & domestic (83%) tourism. Over half view international tourism as positively impacting community & everyday life (52%), yet 31% see a negative impact vs just 7% for domestic tourism. Moreover, 64% believe domestic tourism enhances NZ values & culture, while only 49% state the same for international tourism, which is also perceived more negatively than domestic (15% vs 3%). The natural environment impact is viewed negatively, with international tourism having more negative (35%) than positive (26%) effects, whereas domestic tourism is seen more favourably, with 44% positive & 14% negative impact.

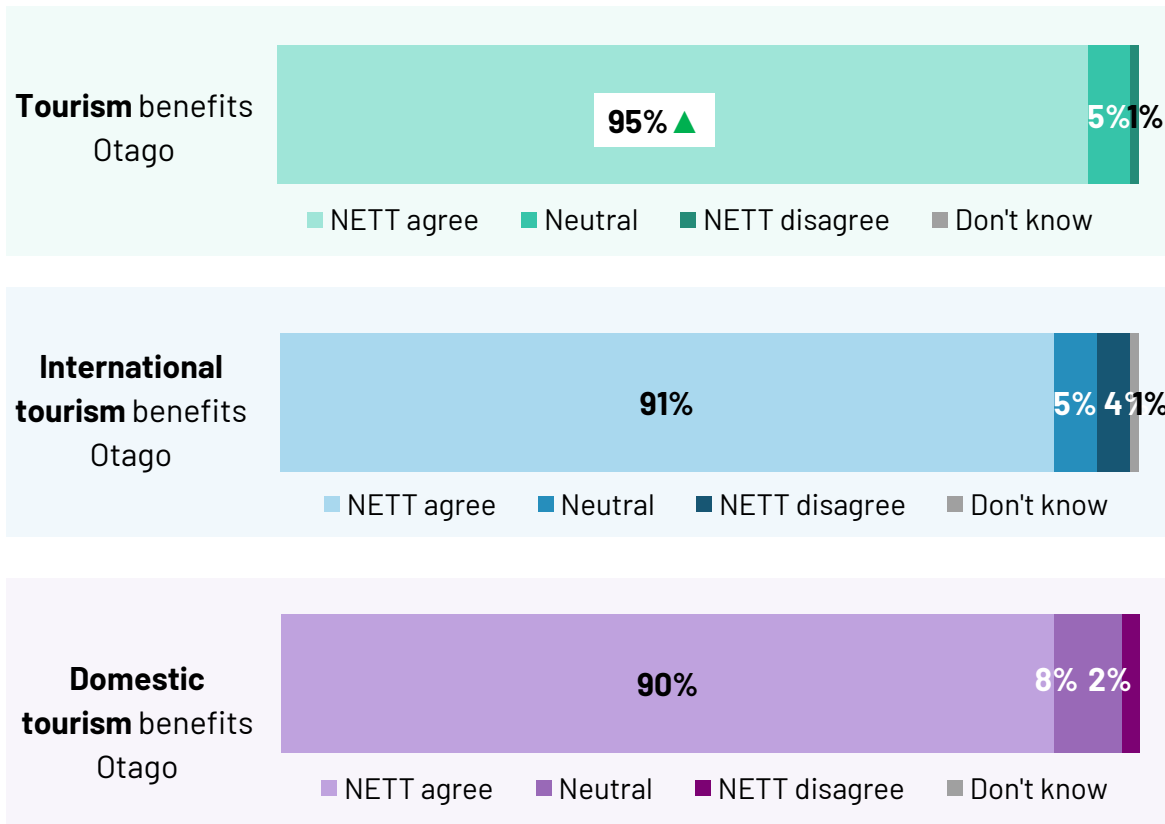

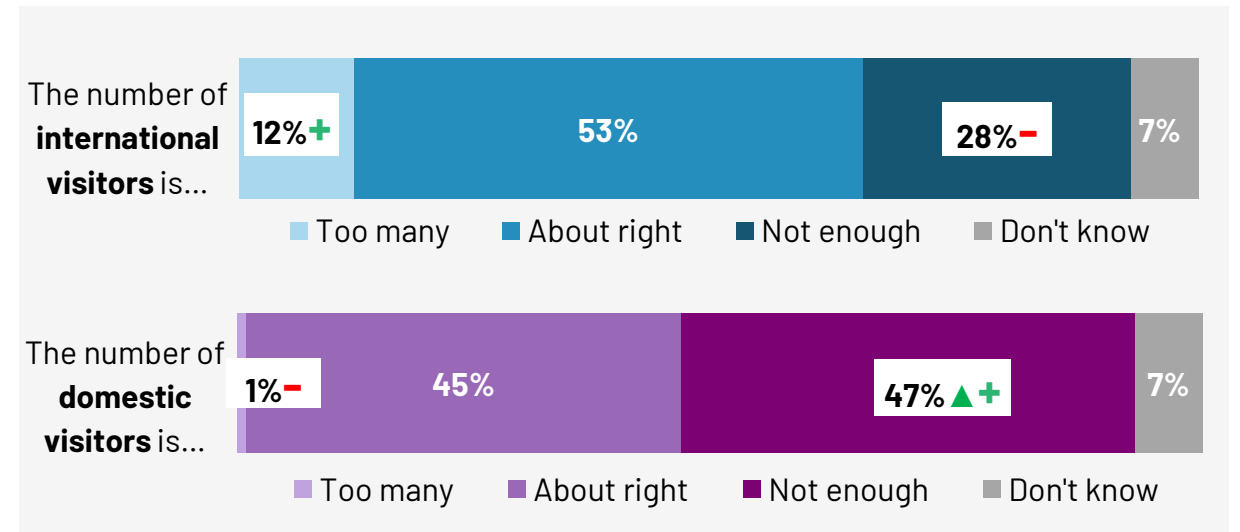
Dunedin residents: Tourism benefits & visitor numbers

Among Dunedin residents, 95% believe tourism benefits Otago. About half feel the region receives the 'right number' of international (53%) & domestic (45%) visitors in summer. Similar to their Queenstown neighbours, Dunedin residents feel there are 'too' many international visitors (12%), while only 1% think there are 'too many' domestic visitors. Nearly half (47%) believed there were 'not enough' domestic visitors to Otago during the summer period.

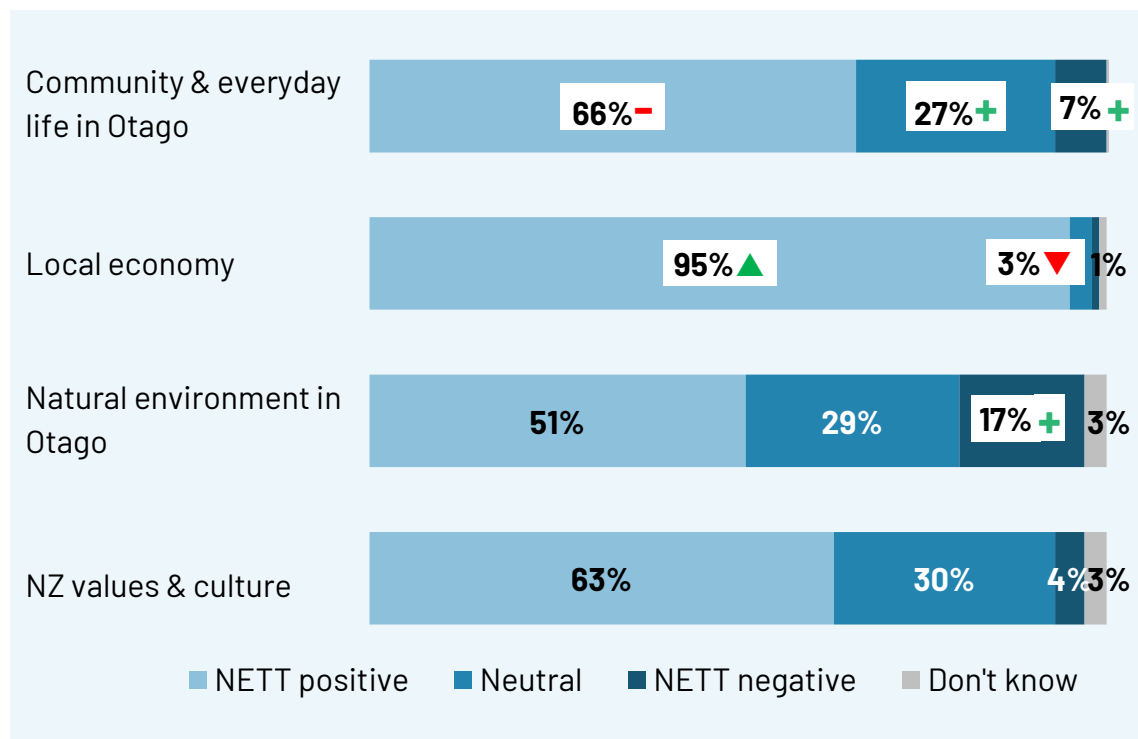

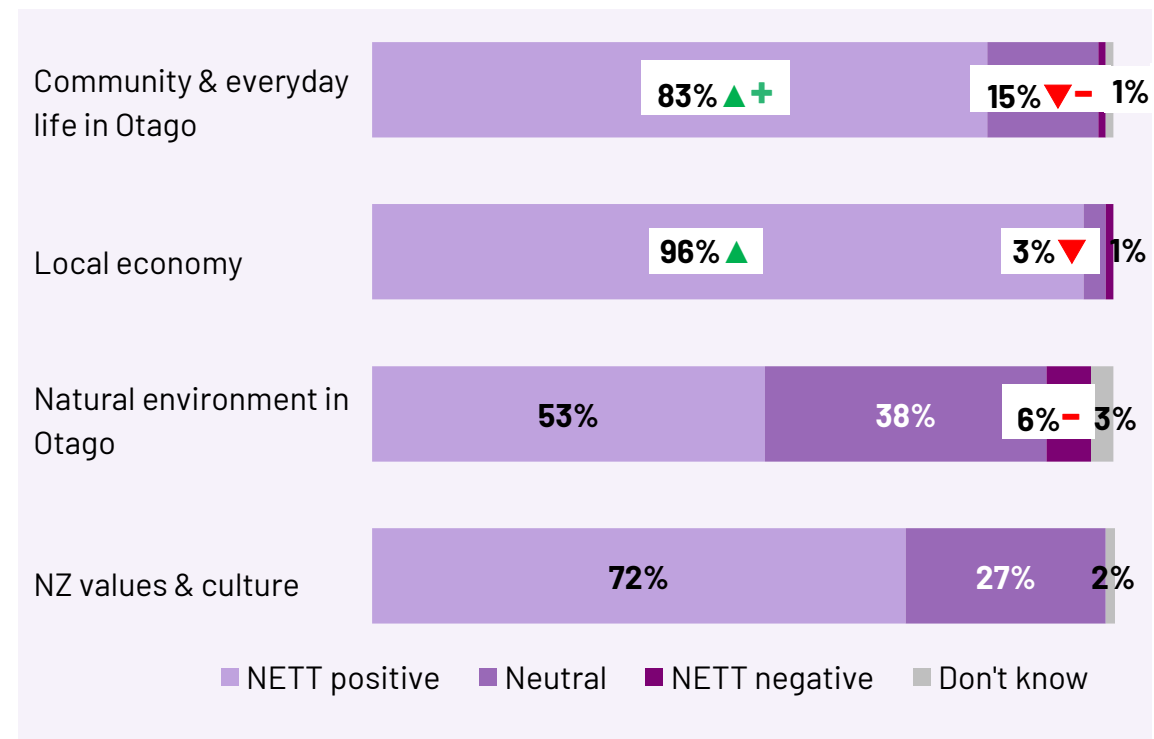
Dunedin residents: Impact of tourism on key regional aspects

Dunedin residents acknowledge the boost to the local economy as the primary benefit of both international (95%) & domestic (96%) tourism. While 66% see international tourism as positively impacting community life, 7% note a negative impact vs just 1% for domestic tourism. Further, 72% believe domestic tourism enhances NZ values & culture, compared to 63% for international tourism, which also has a negative perception among 4% vs 0% for domestic. Environmental impacts of tourism are perceived least positively, with international tourism viewed as having a considerably more negative impact (17%) on the environment than domestic tourism (6%).

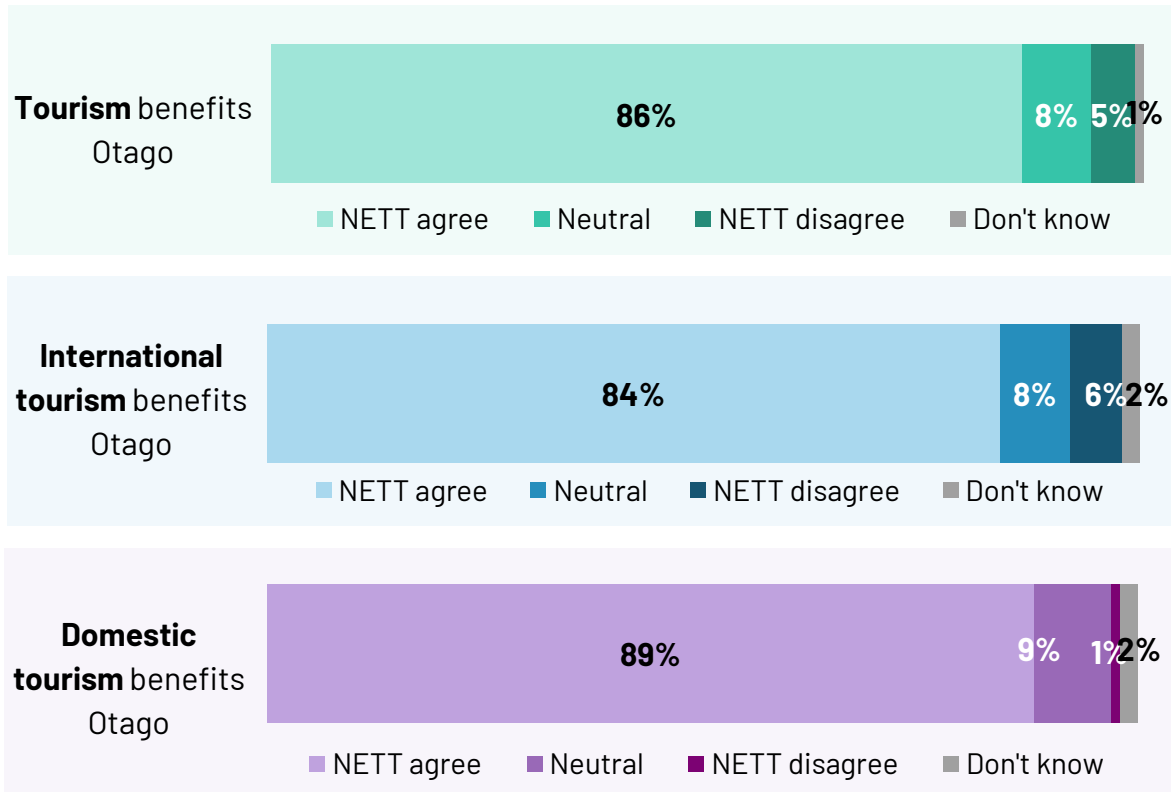

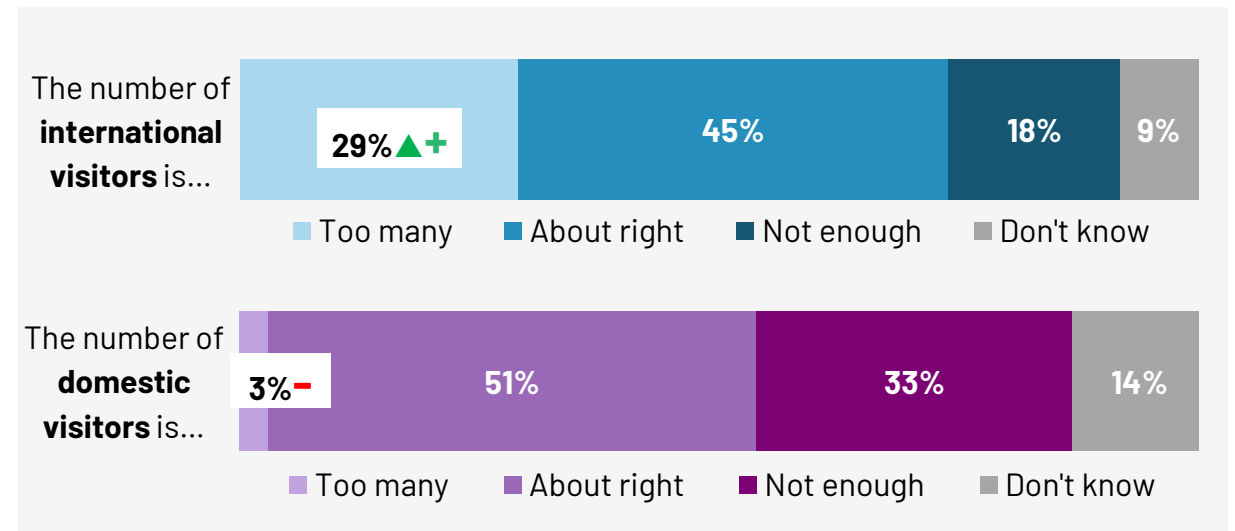

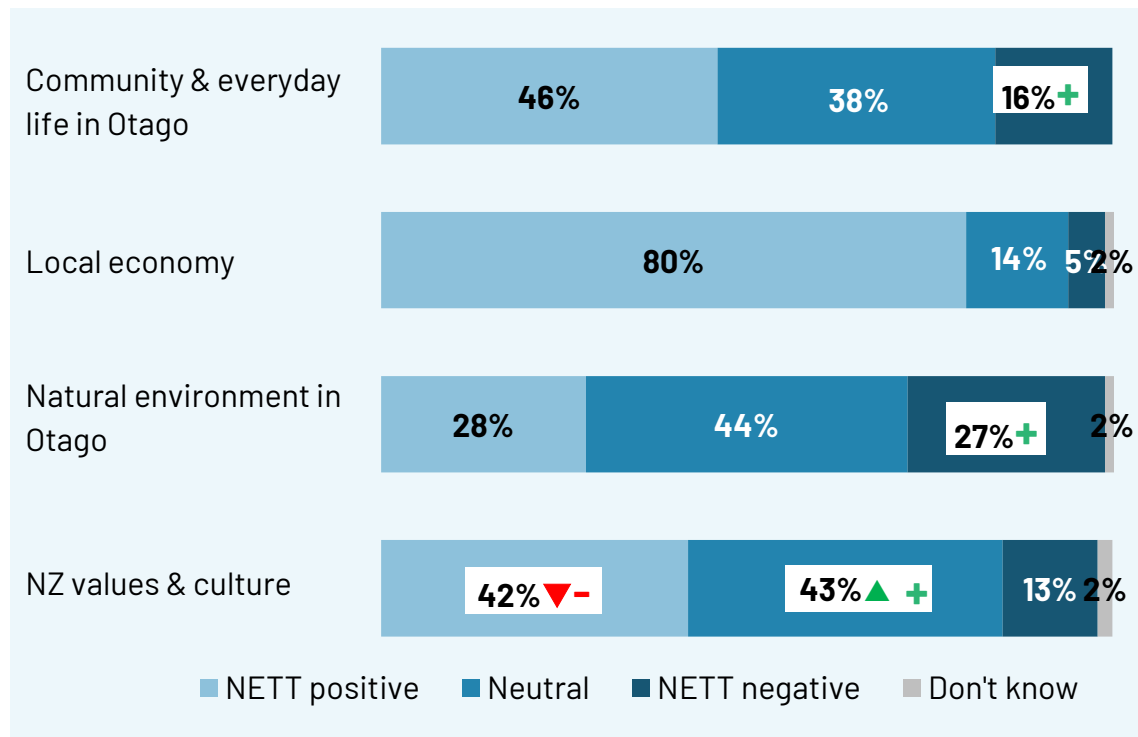

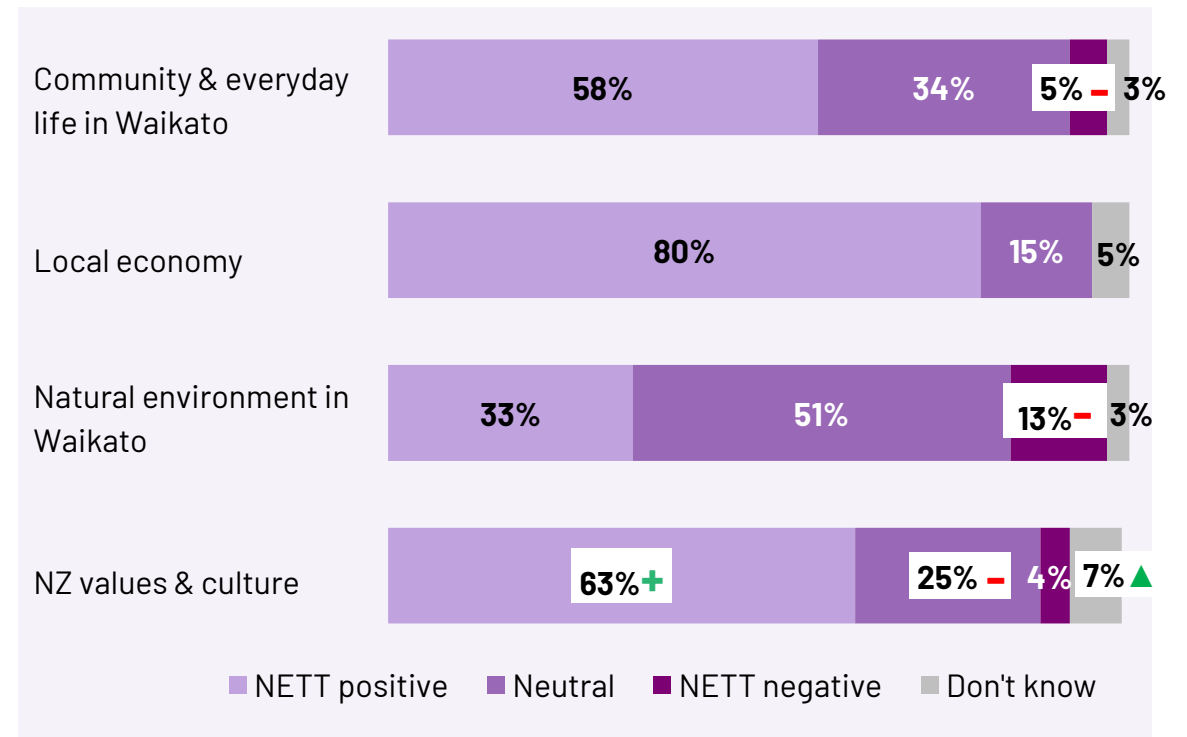
Rest of Otago: Impact of tourism on key regional aspects

Rest of Otago residents recognise the boost to the local economy as the top benefit of both international (80%) & domestic (80%) tourism. Over half view domestic tourism as positively impacting community & everyday life (58%) & NZ values & culture (63%), whereas a smaller proportion stated the same about international tourism (46% & 42% respectively). The natural environment impact is viewed negatively, with international tourism seen as having about equal negative (28%) & positive (27%) impacts, while domestic tourism has 33% positive impact & 13% negative impact.

8. APPENDIX

Additional context

In July 2025, the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) tasked Ipsos with conducting the biannual **'Tourism Sentiments Survey' (TSS)** for New Zealanders aged 18 and older.

This survey examines **perceptions of tourism's social, cultural, economic, and environmental impacts at regional and destination levels.**

Conducted biannually after each summer and winter season, the survey strategically over-represents smaller regions and key tourism destinations such as Queenstown and Rotorua.

The primary audience for these findings is the broader tourism and hospitality sector, particularly regional tourism organisations (RTOs).

Supported by the Tourism Evidence and Insights Centre, this initiative aims to deliver consistent and reliable tourism insights to enable sustainable decision-making.

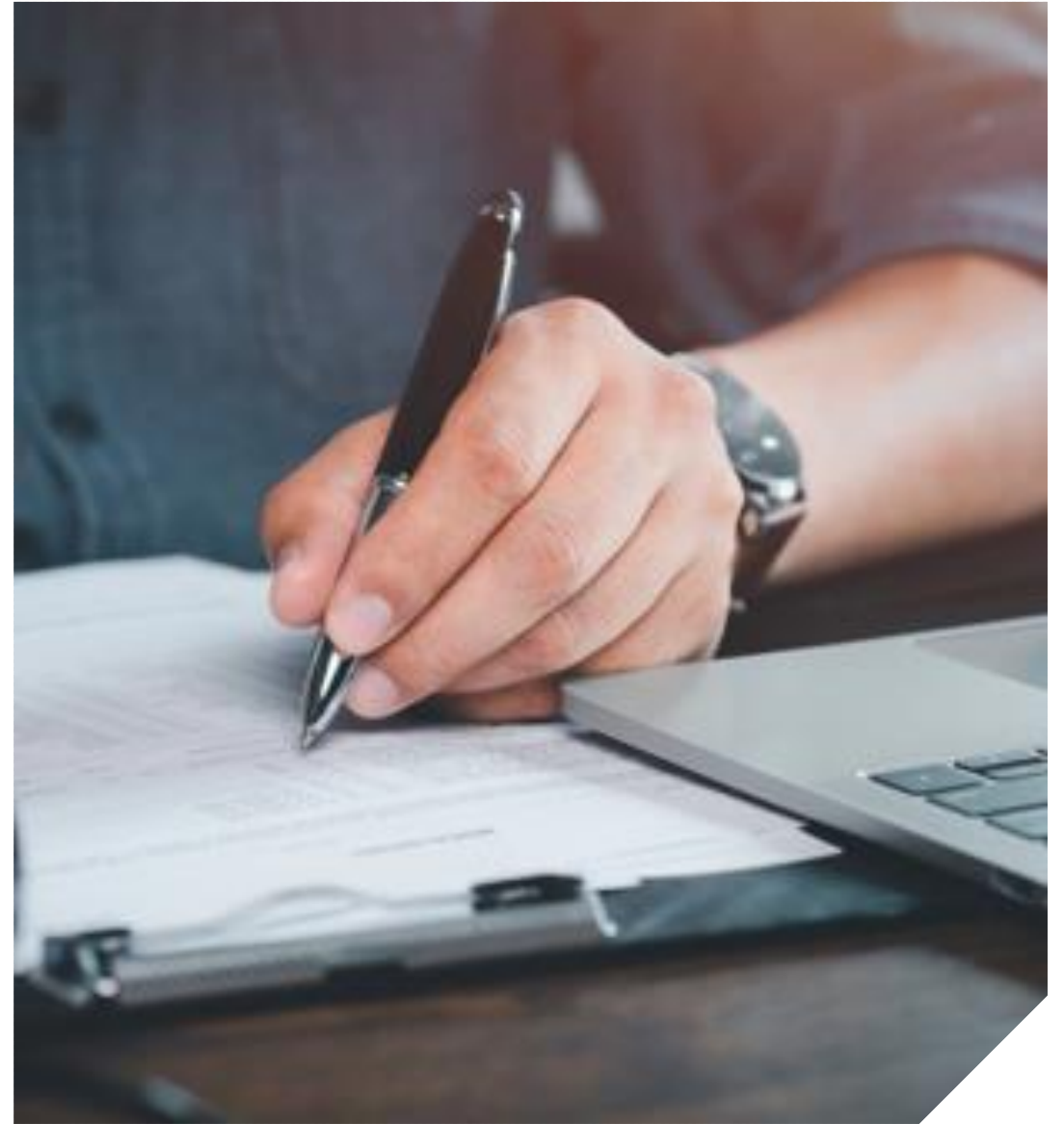


Survey development

In partnership, MBIE & Ipsos crafted the 12-minute TTS targeting the four primary objectives.

These questions will be consistent across each wave to track changes over time.

- Ipsos & MBIE conducted **stakeholder interviews** with Tourism NZ, Department of Conservation, Regional Tourism NZ & Tourism Industry Aotearoa to shape the survey's development.
- The survey benefited from **extensive review**, undergoing more than 19 rounds of revisions.
- **Language assessments** ensured accessibility for all respondents, examining vocabulary, jargon, sentence length & complexity.
- The survey was **cognitively tested** with 10 New Zealanders, leading to minor adjustments to enhance clarity & interpretation.
- Ipsos implemented thorough **QA processes**, including script & device testing (e.g. mobile & desktop).
- A **pilot test** was conducted with 30 participants to uncover any administrative issues & verify that responses were accurately captured prior to the full survey launch.





Achieved sample summer 2025/26

2,238 New Zealanders took part in wave 1, surpassing the 1,800 target.

Fieldwork: 9 Feb–9 March 2026.

Participants shared views on tourism over the summer period – Dec 2025–Feb 2026.

Quotas for region, age, gender, and ethnicity were met through strategic oversampling, ensuring at least 60 responses per region/DOI.

The **survey achieved a 62% completion rate**, meaning 62% of panel participants who began the survey fully completed it. In panel calculating a traditional response rate is not feasible because participants are pre-recruited and agree to participate in multiple surveys over time.

Sampling method

The survey aims to gather insights from up to 1,800 New Zealanders aged 18+, twice a year after the summer & winter tourism seasons.

This approach ensures representation across region, gender, age & ethnicity.

There is a strategic over-representation of smaller regions & DOI or tourist hubs, such as Queenstown & Rotorua. This strategy provides valuable insights for key stakeholders, including RTOs & the wider tourism & hospitality sectors.

Participants were recruited via a blend of multiple online panels & non-panel sample sources (e.g. river sampling), reaching them in digital spaces such as online games & social media.

Strict quotas were applied for age, gender, ethnicity & region, while more flexible quotas at the regional level ensured the sample was balanced, avoiding skewed demographics, e.g. an overwhelmingly female sample in Auckland.

Other demographic factors such as urban/rural split, household income, education, length of time in New Zealand were monitored.

In panel surveys, where participants are pre-recruited for multiple surveys, traditional response rates do not apply. The survey's robustness & integrity rely on a large sample size & comprehensive demographic representation, achieved by adhering to strict quotas across regions, age, ethnicity & gender.

Data cleaning & weighting

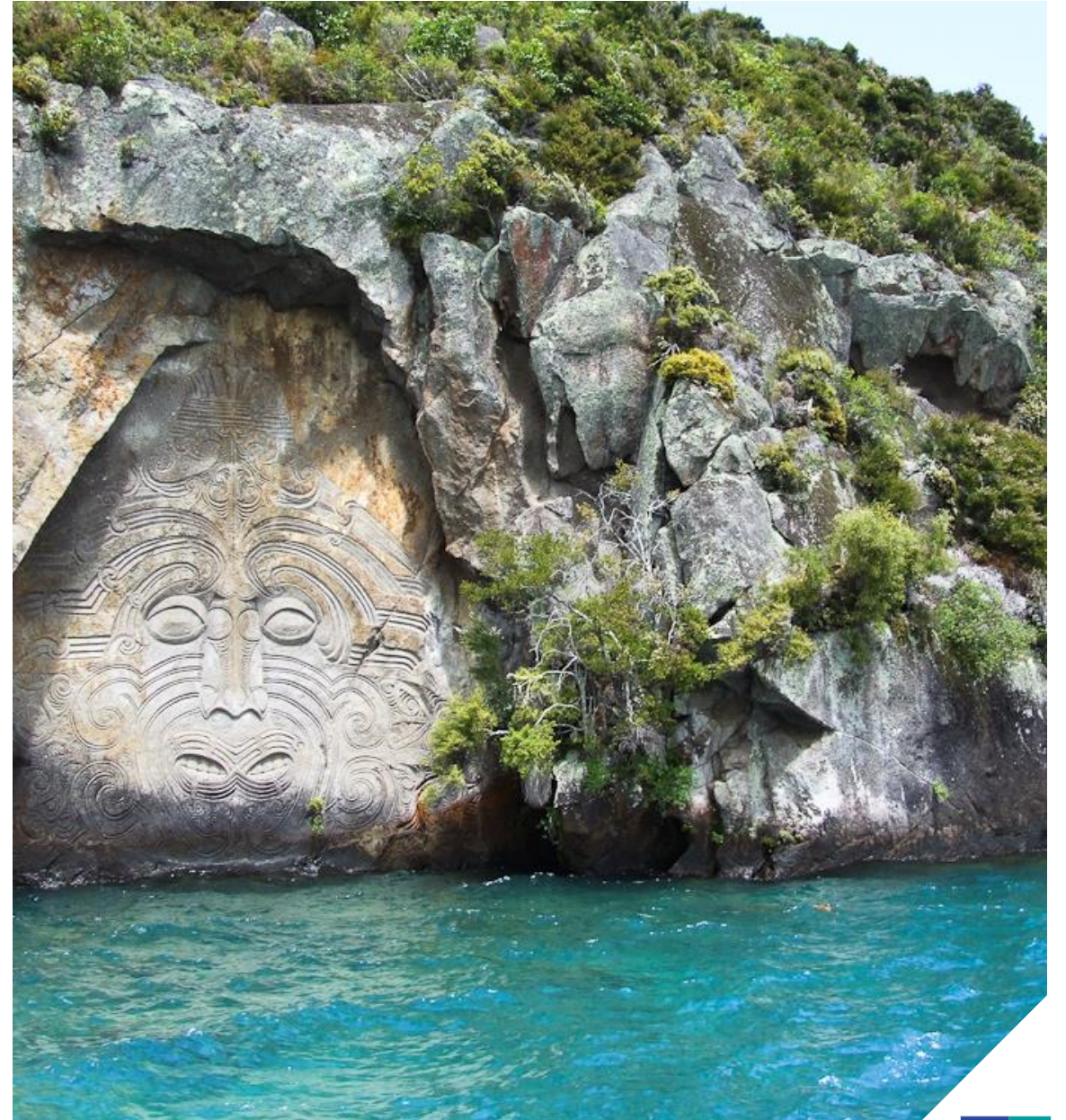
Data cleaning

From the initial 2,257 responses, **19 responses were considered low quality and removed**, leaving 2,238 valid responses.

The data was meticulously reviewed, with a focus on verbatim responses to ensure relevance, coherence, engagement, while also checking for duplication. While completion speed, measured by responses finished in less than one third of the median time, was used as a secondary indicator for flagging possible issues, the main criterion for exclusion focused on content quality. Responses were also evaluated for flatlining – repetitive patterns in at least two thirds of questions, such as selecting the same option consistently, following obvious patterns like alternating between options, and providing contradictory answers across related questions.

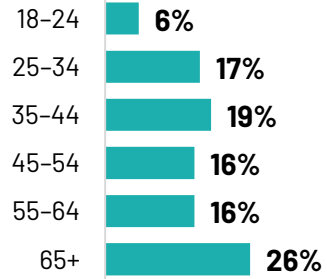
Data weighting

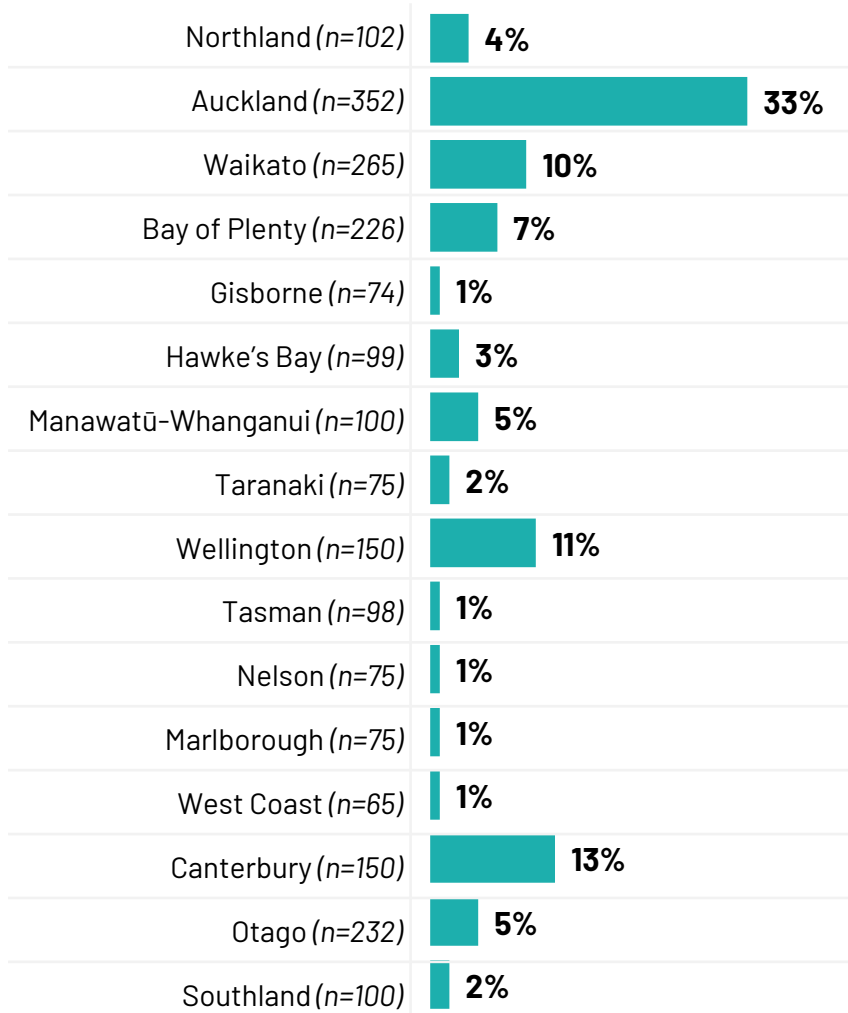

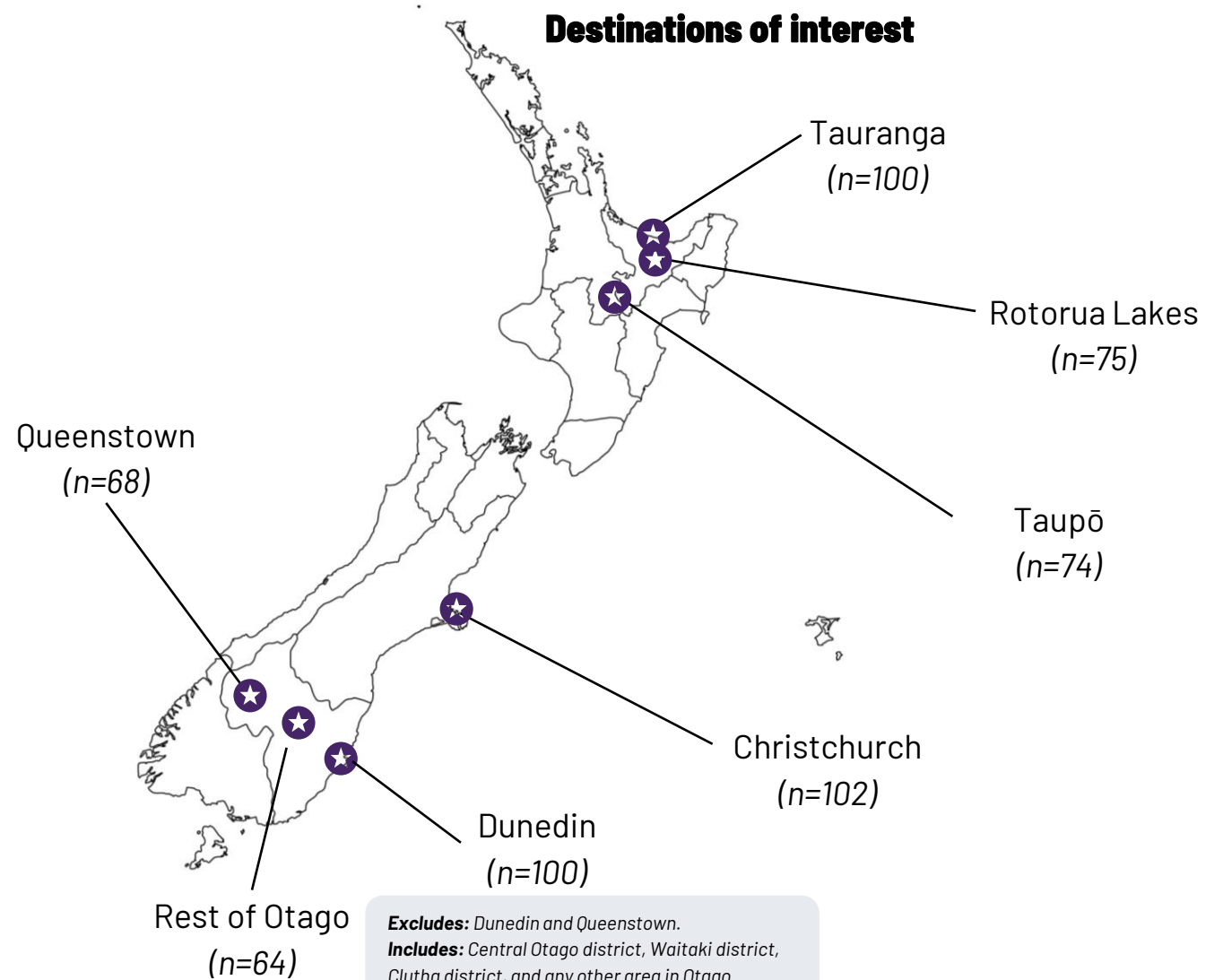
