Sorry I missed your call last night. Since I spoke to you yesterday, I have had a conversation with bout this OIA. She has escalated this issue within Comms, and the feeling is firmly that draft Comms material such as this should not be released. The rationale is that the role of Comms is to cast the net as wide as possible when it comes to

issues that might arise and require messaging, and if Comms staff feel that they have to temper what they put in drafts in response to potential political sensitivity and the possibility of release under the OIA, then they can't perform effectively.

I haven't tested this with Legal yet, but I feel that it's a sufficiently strong argument for withholding the documents in their entirety under s9(2)(g)(i). If the Minister's office feels the same way, then I will proceed on that basis.




Comment:


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


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

As discussed over our phone conversation, here is a list of questions for Simon.

Just so you know, the questions have been formulated from the already existing information in the media and hence some of them may seem assertive. But I am interested in doing a neutral story and would love to hear Simon's perspective on it and how the government is addressing the issue.

• When Statoil was initially given the 15 year permit for deep sea oil drilling, were you expecting such a large opposition by the people?

What do you think triggered or fuelled the opposition and do you think they are right in

protesting?

• What were the immediate measures taken in order to deal with the growing opposition?

Inspite of the opposition Statoil was granted an extra 1670sq km of area to explore. Does
this imply that the govt has decided to turn a deaf ear to what the locals have to say and
their concerns? Or that govt prioritizes economic growth and financial gain over public
opinion and concerns?

Greenpeace claims that the govt has not taken the necessary effort to conduct an individual research regarding the potential impacts of seismic testing and oil spill. Are you fully aware of the risks involved or Is the govt relying on claims made by Statoil? Any scientific research

to support that?

Is Statoil and the govt prepared to deal with an oil spill disaster if there was one to occur?

 What efforts has the govt taken for ivi consultation as that seems to stand out as the main problem? The iwis are not very happy with the decision. Were they made aware beforehand about the project?

Statoil has partnered with Chevron. Are you aware about Chevron's environmental history?

If yes, why is the govt still ready to take the risk? What is the dire need to do so?

Have all sides of the project been communicated to the locals? Along with the benefits to
the country's economy, the probability of an oil spill and the potential impacts? Details of
the company, partnerships, history etc.

Do you think if you had a well-planned communication plan in place in advance the

opposition by the iwis would not have escalated to this level?

NZ is marketed as 100% Pure NZ and also widely known for the diverse and beautiful flora and fauna. Welcoming more oil exploration projects and allowing foreign companies to drill the oceans is a highly contradictory move. Has the govt considered employing alternative energy solutions for clean energy which would also the serve the same purpose and provide for job opportunities?

Lunderstand that oil is the 4th largest commodity exported by NZ which would obviously mean that the oil and petroleum industry helps boost the country's economy. But is it at the expense of the rich environment, marine life and potential impacts on climate change.

What's next on your to do list in order to deal with this issue?

Any message you would like to pass on to the people in order to show that the govt is making sincere efforts to deal with the issue while keeping in mind the welfare of the people and the country?

• Would you like to refer anyone else can I talk to and get further insight about the subject? I would love to have a short phone or face to face interview with him as it would be better to understand him and follow up with questions. It should not take more than 10-15 mins. The deadline for the story is 10th June, so anytime before that would be great. Thanks a lot for your help.

If you could please elaborate on how the oil industry provides more jobs in the country as in an interview with Greenpeace they claimed that working in the oil industry requires high levels of expertise and hence many of the employees are brought over from overseas and the job opportunities here are minimal.

There would of course be a mix of Kiwis and workers from overseas in the resources industry, just like any other. I suggest, if you haven't already, that you look at Venture Taranaki's recent publication *The Wealth Beneath Our Feet* (http://www.taranaki.info/news/tiles/1405.pdf) to get a sense of the difference the industry has made to that region.

Also why does the government not have a say in Statoil's partnership with Chevron? It is a risk-taking decision keeping in mind Chevron's environmental history.

Chevron was assessed by NZP&M on their proposed work programme, and technical and financial capability. NZP&M also undertake a high level assessment of the operator's capability and systems that are likely to be required to meet applicable health, safety and environmental legislation. Furthermore, the Government does not just issue a permit and "let them go". Throughout the life of the permit the operator will need to meet strict requirements of agencies including NZP&M, WorkSafe NZ, the Environmental Protection Authority, and Mantime NZ, who monitor compliance with the standards to ensure they are met. What is most important is New Zealand's rigorous regulatory system – which has been designed to minimise risk by ensuring activities are undertaken safely and responsibly – not what has happened in another jurisdiction.

Lastly if you could please, talk about the clean energy projects New Zealand has undertaken and if there are any plans to increase clean energy production and usage in the near future as it is more sustainable for the environment.

The Minister is committed to ensuring the energy sector continues to develop in a way that recognises that the world is in transition to a low-carbon future. You may be interested to look at the *New Zealand Energy Strategy 2011-2021* (www.med.govt.nz/sectors-industries/energy/strategies/), which sets out the Government's strategy for the sector. The strategy includes the target to achieve 90% renewable electricity generation by 2025. In 2014, renewable generation reached 80%, the highest level since 1996.

You also might want to talk to or look at what the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Authority (http://www.eeca.govt.nz/) does in this space, and particularly the new projects the Minister announced last year (http://www.beehive.govt.nz/release/businesses-and-households-save-new-energy-efficiency-initiatives and http://www.beehive.govt.nz/release/launch-renewable-energy-initiative-southland).

Just so you know, the questions have been formulated from the already existing information in the media and hence some of them may seem assertive. But I am interested in doing a neutral story and would love to hear Simon's perspective on it and how the government is addressing the issue.

• When Statoil was initially given the 15 year permit for deep sea oil drilling, were you expecting such a large opposition by the people?

• What do you think triggered or fuelled the opposition and do you think they are right in protesting?

• What were the immediate measures taken in order to deal with the growing opposition?

• Inspite of the opposition Statoil was granted an extra 1670sq km of area to explore. Does this imply that the govt has decided to turn a deaf ear to what the locals have to say and their concerns? Or that govt prioritizes economic growth and financial gain over public opinion and concerns?

Greenpeace claims that the govt has not taken the necessary effort to conduct an individual research regarding the potential impacts of seismic testing and oil spill. Is Statoil and the govt prepared to deal with an oil spill disaster if there was one to occur?

• Statoil has partnered with Chevron. Are you aware about Chevron's environmental history? If yes, why is the govt still ready to take the risk? What is the dire need to do so?

Have all sides of the project been communicated to the locals? Along with the benefits to the country's economy, the probability of an oil spill and the potential impacts? Details of the company, partnerships, history etc.

Do you think if you had a well-planned communication plan in place in advance the

opposition by the iwis would not have escalated to this level?

NZ is marketed as 100% Pure NZ and also widely known for the diverse and beautiful flora and fauna. Welcoming more oil exploration projects and allowing foreign companies to drill the oceans is a highly contradictory move. Has the govt considered employing alternative energy solutions for clean energy which would also the serve the same purpose and provide for job opportunities?

I understand that oil is the 4th largest commodity exported by NZ which would obviously mean that the oil and petroleum industry helps boost the country's economy. But is it at the expense of the rich environment, marine life and potential impacts on climate change.

What's next on your to do list in order to deal with this issue?

Any message you would like to pass on to the people in order to show that the govt is making sincere efforts to deal with the issue while keeping in mind the welfare of the people and the country?

Would you like to refer anyone else can I talk to and get further insight about the subject? I would love to have a short phone or face to face interview with him as it would be better to understand him and follow up with questions. It should not take more than 10-15 mins. - Prospecting permit applications are usually speculative in that they are often submitted by multiple companies vying for the same work, or they may be for a project competing internally for funding priority. As time goes by and things change, speculative applications can become obsolete and are withdrawn.
- We are forecasting a busy summer for seismic activity. Chevron and OMV have upcoming seismic obligations in the East Coast/Pegasus Basin, OMV and ONGC Videsh have upcoming obligations in the Taranaki Basin, Searcher Seismic and Schlumberger have obligations over the entire East Coast/Great South Basin and Great South Basin respectively. 

I rang back yesterday afternoon and this morning, but you weren't at your desk. So I thought it might be easier to cover off a few points with an email.

- consultation with MBIE there is only one email exchange with MBIE in the bundle of documents covered by the request (doc 11: 1008114). We've already checked with MBIE about releasing that document, and they didn't see any grounds for withholding it. I didn't think there was any need to consult with MBIE over the rest of the documents, as they are predominantly Authority internal documents, or communications with participants. However, I could provide a copy of the response to MBIE when we release it to the requester (Jamie, 59(2)(a) please let me know if that would be useful?).
- I did not redact the names and details of Ministerial staff or Authority staff, because I did not believe there were any grounds under the OIA to do so. The Ombudsman's office has made it clear that they do not believe there are grounds for blanket withholding this type of information under section 9(2)(a) personal information. If you could explain your reasons for wanting this information withheld under any other grounds in the OIA, I could look at it again?
- Doc 18: 1008065. Sorry, I should have removed the 'check' before I sent the documents over. It was an item I wanted to check with before we released it. However, I am not sure now whether we did discuss that document before I sent the pack over to you. I will check with 9(2)(a) before I finalise the response. My recommendation is that we would release anything that is not highlighted i.e. for the 5/4/16 agenda, we would only release the details of the meeting at the top of the first page, and the 1 paragraphs on page 2 under the heading "Unison's price adjustments". For the 10 May agenda, I would recommend we release the details of the meeting at the top of the first page, and then just the paragraph at item 2, headed "Solarcity has alleged Unison has breached Part 6 of the Code". The rest of both of the agendas is outside the scope of the request.



OMV Background

OMV Background

- 1. OMV Aktiengesellschaft (the OMV Group), headquartered in Vienna, is Austria's largest listed industrial company. The company was founded in Austria in 1956. It is now active in around 30 countries worldwide including New Zealand.
- 2. The OMV Group first entered New Zealand in 1999 when it acquired Preussag AG, which had interests in Australia and New Zealand. This included a share in the Maari oil discovery that OMV New Zealand Limited (OMV) developed and now operates.
- 3. QMV's Australian operations are supported out of the Wellington office alongside the New Zealand exploration and production operations. It is one of the largest exploration and production companies based in New Zealand, holding a portfolio of permits over a number of basins and also production assets.
- It plays a significant role in contributing to the local economy both through royalties, taxes and local employment. Under its corporate social responsibilities, it contributes to local communities in New Zealand and globally.

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OMV's permit portfolio

5. OMV holds an interest in three petroleum production operations in New Zealand.  - b) Environmental responsibility.
 - c) Efficient use of energy.
 - d) Secure and affordable energy.
- The development of energy targets and the replacement of the New Zealand Energy Efficiency and Conservation Strategy 2011–2016 (NZEECS) will support both the BGA and NZES priorities.

Energy targets

- 4. The introduction of energy targets will signal, over the long-term. New Zealand's commitment to the transition to a more productive, lower emissions economy. Achieving these targets will require ongoing effort to make more efficient use of our abundant energy resources, and increase the use of renewable energy in the industrial and transport sectors.
- 5. You may wish to make the following points about the development of energy targets:
 - a) The introduction of energy targets will signal New Zealand's commitment towards the transition to a more productive, lower emissions economy.
 - Energy sector participants have been requesting Government direction and leadership in the context of a rapidly changing energy environment.
 - c) Following the Conference of Parties 21 in Paris, New Zealand will need to articulate domestic energy policies to support our transition to a lower emissions economy while increasing productivity.
 - d) New Zealand has a well-functioning energy sector, based on competitive and efficient markets. The role of the Government is to stimulate market-led innovation and remove parriers.
 - Specific measures have not been finalised, but the current preferred targets are to retain 90 per cent renewable electricity by 2025, and have targets to:
 - Improve our energy productivity, which will lead to decreased costs and enhance our business competitiveness.
 - Broaden the share of renewable energy, recognising that our greatest potential to reduce carbon lies in our transport and process heat sectors.
 - The intention is to set ambitious targets, but the exact level of stretch has not yet been decided. Like the existing target of 90 per cent renewable electricity by 2025, the new energy targets would not be binding.

New Zealand Energy Efficiency and Conservation Strategy

6. In March 2016, the Government announced its decision to replace the NZEECS. The NZEECS sets out the Government's policies, objectives, and targets in relation to the

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promotion of energy efficiency, energy conservation, and the use of renewable sources of energy.

- 7. You may wish to make the following points about the replacement of the NZEECS:
 - a) The replacement NZEECS will complement the energy targets. It will set out policies and actions for Government, businesses, and individuals to help progress New Zealand towards the targets in the next five years.
 - b) It is intended that the draft NZEECS will be released for public consultation before Christmas.

Background

The seismic surveying vessel Amazon Warrior has a 500 meter non-interference zone (NIZ) established by the Chief Executive of MBIE under the Crown Minerals Act 1991. MBIE and other agencies have been monitoring the Amazon Warrior's seismic surveying operation closely. Vessels engaged in protest activity have approached the Amazon Warrior over the previous two weekends. On 9 April 2017, MBIE was advised that Greenpeace vessels allegedly breached the Amazon Warrior's NIZ by 25 meters.

Offences and penalties

Section 101B establishes two main offences which are summarised below:

- 1. First, a person commits an offence if the person intentionally engages in conduct that causes damage to, or interference with, a ship.
 - Penalty: In the case of an individual, imprisonment for a term not exceeding 12 months or a fine not exceeding \$50,000, and, in the case of a body corporate, to a fine not exceeding \$100,000.
- 2. Second, a person commits an offence if they enter a specified non-interference zone without reasonable excuse.

Penalty: The person is liable to a fine not exceeding \$10,000.

Options for prosecution: Arrest or Summons

If either interference or a breach of the NIZ is alleged, the person may be either arrested or summoned to court, as summarised below:

1. Option 1 Arrest.

The Police may arrest a person alleged to have committed an offence. The person would be required to appear at District Court on the next available day.

Comment: This provides little time for preparation of evidence but sends a strong signal and indicates the public interest in the offence.

2. Option 2 - Summons

MBIE and other agencies may gather evidence and then summon the person to District Court on a given day. This decision to summon must be made within twelve months of the offence.

Comment: the public interest in prosecution will reduce over time.

Next steps

Protest vessels are expected to return to port in Napier within the next 12-24 hours.

MBIE have two official Enforcement Officers on stand-by who can be sent to Napier today to continue to monitor the situation.

Decisions to prosecute are usually made after consultation between the Minister of Energy and Resources and the Chief Executive of MBIE.

Annex 1: Section 101B of the Crown Minerals Act 1991

101B Interfering with structure or operation in offshore area

(1)

A person commits an offence if the person intentionally engages in conduct that results in—

(a)

damage to, or interference with, any structure or ship that is in an offshore area and that is, or is to be, used in mining operations or for the processing, storing, preparing for transporting, or transporting of minerals; or

(b)

damage to, or interference with, any equipment on, or attached to, such a structure or ship; or

(c)

interference with any operations or activities being carried out, or any works being executed, on, by means of, or in connection with such a structure or ship.

(2)

A person commits an offence if-

(a)

the person is the master of a ship that, without reasonable excuse, enters a specified noninterference zone for a permitted prospecting, exploration, or mining activity; or

(b)

the person leaves a ship and, without reasonable excuse, enters a specified non-interference zone for a permitted prospecting, exploration, or mining activity.

(3)

In prosecuting an offence against subsection (2), it is not necessary for the prosecution to prove that the person intended to commit the offence.

(4)

A person who commits an offence against subsection (1) is liable on conviction,—

(a)

in the case of an individual, to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 12 months or to a fine not exceeding \$50,000:

CIFI

in the case of a body corporate, to a fine not exceeding \$100,000.

(5)

A person who commits an offence against subsection (2) is liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$10,000.

(6)

For the purposes of subsection (2), the chief executive may specify a non-interference zone by notice published in a fortnightly edition of the *New Zealand Notices to Mariners* (under Part 25 of the Maritime Rules).

(7)

A notice must specify—

(a)

the permitted prospecting, mining, or exploration activity to which the non-interference zone relates; and

(b)

the locality of the activity; and

(c)

the area of the non-interference zone to which the activity relates (which may be up to 500 metres from any point on the outer edge of the structure or ship to which the activity relates or, if there is any equipment attached to the structure or ship, 500 metres from any point on the outer edge of the equipment); and

(d)

the period (which may be up to 3 months) for which the notice has effect.

The chief executive, when determining the area of a non-interference zone for the purposes of a notice, must take into account the nature of the activity, including the size of any structure or ship to which the activity relates and any equipment attached to the structure or ship necessary for the carrying out of the activity.

(9)

No proceedings for an offence against this section may be brought in a New Zealand court in respect of a contravention of this section on board, or by a person leaving, a foreign ship without the consent of the Attorney-General.

People are free to protest at sea but this should be done safely

Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment General Manager James Stevenson-Wallace is urging people protesting the Amazon Warrior seismic survey ship to be cautious and stay safe.

Greenpeace have said they have breached a 500 metre Non-Interference Zone around the Amazon Warrior and have dropped people in the water ahead of the ship, forcing it to take evasive action and alter course.

In 2013 the Parliament made changes to the Crown Minerals Act, making it illegal for protest activity to interfere with seismic survey or other vessels involved in permitted and lawful petroleum work.

"These non-interference provisions are not about removing the right to protest. They are about balancing the right to protest with an operator's right to get on with their work — while promoting the safety of everyone involved," Mr Stevenson-Wallace says.

"Petroleum operations at sea are complex, often very precise and can be at an industrial scale. The vessels carry high-tech equipment, can be large and have limited manoeuvrability.

"People are free to protest oil and gas activity at sea, as they are on land, but this must be done safely. This is as much for protestors as for the crew of the Amazon Warrior."

Mr Stevenson-Wallace says petroleum development has substantial economic benefits for New Zealand, as in Taranaki, where petroleum is currently produced.

"Further oil and gas discoveries could have real benefits for New Zealand. The industry can create more highly-skilled and well-paid jobs, and delivers hundreds of millions of dollars in royalties to the Crown each year. This money is used to pay for services, such as hospitals and schools, for all New Zealanders.

"The Pegasus Basin, where the Amazon is currently surveying off the Wairarapa coast, is particularly prospective for natural gas. If there were a discovery, there is potential for gas to be exported to India and Asia where it could be used to displace coal – the dirtiest fossil fuel – for electricity generation.

"The Government has developed a robust regulatory regime to ensure oil and gas activities are undertaken to the highest standards - which includes minimising and potential impacts on marine mammals, such as whales and dolphins. Any seismic survey vessels operating in our exclusive Economic Zone have to follow the Department of Conservation's Code of Conduct for seismic surveying.

"It is considered one of the most rigorous in the world for protecting marine mammals and requires survey ships to have independent observers on board, watching and listening for mammals. If any mammals are detected within a kilometre radius all activity stops until they leave the area."

MBIE will be looking into alleged breaches of the Crown Minerals Act's non-interference provisions.

MBIE is investigating alleged breaches of the Crown Mineral's Act non-interference provisions. If interference continues the Ministry will consider an appropriate response to ensure the Amazon Warrior can continue its work.

Does the minister believe it is in NZ's economic interest to have this work done in the little-explored Pegasus basin?

Most definitely. Petroleum development has substantial economic benefits for New Zealand already. All of our petroleum comes from Taranaki at present but we have 17 other petroleum basins that are under explored.

Further oil and gas discoveries could have real benefits for New Zealand. The industry can create more highly-skilled and well-paid jobs, and delivers hundreds of millions of dollars in royalties to the Crown each year. This money is used to pay for services, such as hospitals and schools, for all New Zealanders.

Is the minister concerned we're at risk of a Deepwater Horizon-type disaster if oil is found and subsequently extracted?

An oil spill on that that scale is an extremely low probability event. Internationally, there have been significant learnings taken from the Horizon spill. In New Zealand, we strengthened our regulatory regime - including regulating the environmental impacts of activities in our EEZ for the first time (marine consent process through the **Environmental Protection Authority).**

Is the minister concerned newly discovered fossil fuel reserves will contribute to global warming?

While the world is moving to a low-carbon economy, this transition will take time. For example, the International Energy Association forecasts that oil and gas will make up almost half of the world's energy needs out to 2040.

If there were a discovery, there is potential for gas to be exported to India and Asia where it could be used to displace coal – the dirtiest fossil fuel – for electricity generation.

Greenpeace swimmers stop Amazon Warrior seismic blasting, 50 miles out to sea

10 April 2017 - Greenpeace activists have thrown themselves into the sea in front of a huge offshore oil exploration vessel off the New Zealand coast.

Among them is Greenpeace Executive Director, Russel Norman.

The swimmers' position has forced the oil exploration ship to balt its operations and deviate off course.

This drama is taking place 50 nautical miles off the Wairarapa coast where the 125 metre Amazon Warrior, nicknamed "The Beast" is seismic blasting for oil.

The oil exploration is being carried out for Arctic driller Statoil and Chevron, a US oil company part-owned by President Donald Trump.

To find oil, the Amazon Warrior is using seismic cannons to blast the seafloor with sound waves every eight seconds, day and night. It needs to travel in straight lines along a grid to get data about potential oil reserves, and any deviation makes this data unusable.

The blasts it lets off are comparable in sound to an underwater volcano and can cause chronic distress to whales and dolphins in the area.

Statoil and Chevron have permits to drill to extreme depths of up to three kilometres if oil is found – twice as deep as Deepwater Horizon in the Gulf of Mexico, which caused the world's largest and most devastating oil spill in 2010.

The Fossil Fuel President, Donald Trump, has shares in Chevron, and the oil company funded a large part of his presidential inauguration.

25-year-old, Sara is another of the swimmers currently floating in the path of the Amazon Warrior with Russel Norman.

She says she's putting her body on the line because the ship is searching for the very oil that will destroy her future.

"The science is settled that we can't burn the majority of the fossil fuel reserves we know about if we want to keep the Earth's temperature below dangerous levels," she says.

"What this means is that not a single newly discovered oil well anywhere in the world can operate if we want to avoid a climate catastrophe. Right now I'm looking at a ship that's been invited here by the New Zealand Government to do just that.

"I'm young and I'm already experiencing the effects of climate change. Every year the storms get worse, the floods and the droughts are getting more extreme. Just imagine how grim my future looks if we can't stop this.

"It's easy to feel powerless because what we're up against is so big. But everywhere, people are rising up and demanding change. Their actions are having a snowball effect, and in many parts of the world, we're starting to see huge, positive changes."

Greenpeace has been tailing the Amazon Warrior for the past 2 days in its newest boat, Taitu.

The organisation crowdfunded nearly \$100,000 in just a week to buy the 15-metre boat, and ran an online competition to choose its name.

A 2013 Amendment to the Crown Minerals Act, dubbed the 'Anadarko Amendment', was put in place to stop protests at sea around oil exploration. The law change makes it an offence to interfere with or get closer than 500 metres of an offshore ship involved in oil exploration.

From on board Taitu, Greenpeace Executive Director, Dr Russel Norman, says the right to peaceful protest is essential to a healthy democracy and New Zealand has a long and proud tradition of protest at sea.

"Neither the Government nor the oil industry can stifle people across New Zealand peacefully rising up against this mad pursuit of new oil to burn in the midst of what is nothing less than a climate emergency," he says.

"Climate change threatens our homes, health and families. Despite knowing this, our Government is actively subsidising oil companies to look for new oil, putting profits above people's lives - it has become necessary for people to take action.

"In New Zealand we've already seen extreme storms, flooding, drought and fires in the space of a just a few weeks, and it's only April. Climate change makes these weather events more frequent and more intense."

Taitu's trip follows on from a flotilla that included Ngāti Kahungunu's voyaging waka, Te Matau a Māui, which travelled out to the Amazon Warrior to deliver a message on behalf of more than 80 hapū of Te Ikaroa.

Public opposition to oil exploration has seen protests in ports, petitions garnering tens of thousands of signatures, and significant local government and iwi opposition.

Afternoon, an update as of 5pm.

A formal complaint has been received from Schlumberger this afternoon. The complaint seeks onshore support, not offshore deployment at this stage.

GP have indicated an intention to cease activities and return to shore due to likely adverse weather

conditions - there is uncertainty as to whether this will occur.

We are assuming that the most likely return is to Napier, but we are considering Castle Point and Wellington as alternative return destinations/contingency planning

MBIE is putting in place an onshore response - which is an investigative process led by MBIE, with

support from NZ Police and Maritime NZ.

Maritime NZ have agreed to deploy an investigator in response to the Schlumberger complaint specifically looking into the safety practices, and the completeness of their 'commercial vessel' status.

- We are currently a pursuing a Summon-approach (as opposed to an arrest), but will review this depending on GP actions over the next 24 hours. We are working through who would lay charges against (individuals or companies), the MBIE prosecutions team is supporting this process.
- MBIE have secured a search warrant to support further investigations.
- We are actively working with AW to secure footage, still photographs etc to support any further actions.
- We have been informed that a day of lost activity costs the company approximately per day.
- An interagency-offshore operational group met this afternoon to explore possible offshore interventions should the GP interference continue/reoccur – includes Maritime, NZ Defence Force, Police, MBIE. Any offshore response would likely involve the Navy.

Hi All,

 The protestors remained in the survey area over night and have continued to follow the Amazon Warrior remaining outside the NIZ.

At 1148hrs the TAITU advised the Amazon Warrior there "were swimmers" in the water at 4nm

- As we understand the situation the swimmers have not yet breached the NIZ, however the Amazon Warrior had had to take evasion action and has to vary its course 2 degrees per minute to diver their course out of concern for safety to the swimmers. Possibility up to two swimmers at a time
- We do not have a clear indication of intentions of the protestors i.e. when/where they are expected to return to shore.
- We are staying in contact with Schlumberger to get the earliest indications on protesters time of departure from the survey area and direction of travel.
- We have deployed MBIE staff to Napier to gather additional evidence and to ensure we have people on site when the protest vessels return to shore.
- We are anticipate that the protest vessels will seek to shift crew between the vessels before returning to shore to attempt undermine prosecution options.
- Also possible that the Taitu (the old pilot boat) may return directly to Wellington.
- MBIE staff continue to coordinate with police, other agencies (e.g. MNZ) and Schlumberger.
 Maritime NZ have been engaged to confirm the HS&E aspects of the swimmer-situation.
- MBIE is considering search warrant options with police in preparation for the protesters return.
- MBIE are convening the multiagency response group to discuss matters.

Please find information set out below to update you on our current NIZ situation. We have sent in email format for ease of reading as most of you will pick this up on mobile devices. Updates will continue throughout the day via normal text and email channels.

For the Minister of Energy and Resources. 9 April 2017. Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment

Background

The seismic surveying vessel Amazon Warrior has a 500 meter non-interference zone (NIZ) established by the Chief Executive of MBIE under the Crown Minerals Act 1991. MBIE and other agencies have been monitoring the Amazon Warrior's seismic surveying operation closely. Vessels engaged in protest activity have approached the Amazon Warrior over the previous two weekends. On 9 April 2017, MBIE was advised that Greenpeace vessels allegedly breached the Amazon Warrior's NIZ by 25 meters.

Offences and penalties

Section 101B establishes two main offences which are summarised below:

1. First, a person commits an offence if the person intentionally engages in conduct that causes damage to, or interference with, a ship

Penalty: In the case of an individual imprisonment for a term not exceeding 12 months or a fine not exceeding \$50,000, and, in the case of a body corporate, to a fine not exceeding \$100,000.

Second, a person commits an offence if they enter a specified non-interference zone without easonable excuse.

Penalty: The person is liable to a fine not exceeding \$10,000.

Options for prosecution: Arrest or Summons

If either interference or a breach of the NIZ is alleged, the person may be either arrested or summoned to court, as summarised below:

1. Option 1 - Arrest.

The Police may arrest a person alleged to have committed an offence. The person would be required to appear at District Court on the next available day.

Comment: This provides little time for preparation of evidence but sends a strong signal and indicates the public interest in the offence.

2. Option 2 - Summons

MBIE and other agencies may gather evidence and then summon the person to District Court on a given day. This decision to summon must be made within twelve months of the offence. Comment: the public interest in prosecution will reduce over time.

Next steps

- We are continuing to monitor the situation closely and will continue to follow our MBIE escalation plan.
- Protest vessels are expected to return to port in Napier within the next 12-24 hours.
- MBIE have two Enforcement Officers on stand-by who are likely to go to Napier today to continue to monitor the situation.
- Decisions to prosecute are usually made through consultation between the Minister of Energy and Resources and the Chief Executive of MBIE.

Annex 1: Section 101B of the Crown Minerals Act 1991

101B Interfering with structure or operation in offshore area

(1)

A person commits an offence if the person intentionally engages in conduct that results in-

(a)

damage to, or interference with, any structure or ship that is in an offshore area and that is, or is to be, used in mining operations or for the processing, storing, preparing for transporting, or transporting of minerals; or

(b)

damage to, or interference with, any equipment on, or attached to, such a structure or ship; or

(c)

interference with any operations or activities being carried out, or any works being executed, on, by means of, or in connection with such a structure or ship.

(2)

A person commits an offence if-

(a)

the person is the master of a ship that, without reasonable excuse, enters a specified non-interference zone for a permitted prospecting, exploration, or mining activity; or

the person leaves a ship and without reasonable excuse, enters a specified non-interference zone for a permitted prospecting, exploration, or mining activity.

(3)

In prosecuting an offence against subsection (2), it is not necessary for the prosecution to prove that the person intended to commit the offence.

person who commits an offence against subsection (1) is liable on conviction,—

(a)

in the case of an individual, to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 12 months or to a fine not exceeding \$50,000:

(b)

in the case of a body corporate, to a fine not exceeding \$100,000.

(5)

A person who commits an offence against subsection (2) is liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$10,000.

(6)

For the purposes of subsection (2), the chief executive may specify a non-interference zone by notice published in a fortnightly edition of the *New Zealand Notices to Mariners* (under Part 25 of the Maritime Rules).

(7)

A notice must specify—

- the permitted prospecting, mining, or exploration activity to which the non-interference zone relates; and
- (b) the locality of the activity; and
- the area of the non-interference zone to which the activity relates (which may be up to 500 metres from any point on the outer edge of the structure or ship to which the activity relates or if there is any equipment attached to the structure or ship, 500 metres from any point on the outer edge of the equipment); and
- (d) the period (which may be up to 3 months) for which the notice has effect
- The chief executive, when determining the area of a non-interference zone for the purposes of a notice, must take into account the nature of the activity, including the size of any structure or ship to which the activity relates and any equipment attached to the structure or ship necessary for the carrying out of the activity.
- (9)
 No proceedings for an offence against this section may be brought in a New Zealand court in respect of a contravention of this section on board, or by a person leaving, a foreign ship without the consent of the Attorney-General.

Lines as follows:

The royalties from petroleum production go into the general fund, which the Government invests to help build and strengthen the economy for the benefit of all New Zealanders. For the last financial year (2015/16), petroleum companies paid \$203 million in royalties and levies to the Crown.

The oil and gas industry is a major player in economic development in the regions, creating job opportunities for iwl.

We encourage and facilitate engagement between iwi and industry to allow dialogue and exploration of potential opportunities, participation and benefits from oil and gas activity. This has led to specific arrangements with operators, for example in Northland:

Otaraoa hapu (Waltara) with support from Todd Energy, developed a catering business to deliver the Rig Camp Services for Todd's drilling rig. For the hapu, profits have supported the marae and they built capacity to branch out into other projects.

Shell Todd Oil Services (STOS) and Shell New Zealand worked closely with iwi and hapu and contract hem for their services like Environmental Monitoring, Cultural Impact Assessments, monitoring of wahi tapu sites and participation in emergency training.

- Shell and Statoil both trained hapu members to become accredited Marine Mammal Observers (on seismic survey vessels) with the ability to report back to their whanau in an independent capacity.
- We undertake extensive consultation with iwi and hapu. We have a statutory responsibility to consult with iwi and hapu on all new petroleum and minerals permit applications, requests to increase the size of permits or change the types of minerals permitted.
- Through our engagement with iwi, we have built a positive and enduring relationship with iwi that provides a point of contact allowing other issues to be addressed through different government agencies.

MBIE has been carrying out an audit of New Zealand's onshore petroleum wells and carrying out further analysis of the size and nature of risk exposure using New Zealand-specific information we have collected through the audit.

Background

The Amazon Warrior is expected to be in Nelson for fuel and supplies this weekend before departing NZ waters. While it's in port, the vessel could attract protest action. The Non-interference Zone that's been in place around the Amazon Warrior for the past seven months at sea no longer applies while its seismic surveying has ended and it's in port - in this case the vessel is treated the same legally as any other vessel. Any illegal protest activity against the Amazon Warrior would be a matter for the harbourmaster, Maritime NZ, and/or the Police.

Protest action

Reople opposed to oil and gas activity have a right to protest - but it should always be done safely and

While the Amazon Warrior is in port, protestors need to observe a safe distance from the vessel, and respect the rights of crew to get on with their activities without disruption. Any protest that interferes with a vessel at port would be a matter for the harbourmaster and/or Police.

The Amazon Warrior is a large, high-tech vessel. Disrupting its movements, in particular, puts the lives of both protestors and crew in danger.

Seismic surveying

- The Amazon Warrior is a seismic surveying vessel. Seismic surveying involves using a combination of air or water to create an acoustic source to take readings of the geology below the ground.
- The vessel has been carrying out seismic surveys off the Wairarapa coast for the past several months.

Operators have to meet a number of regulatory requirements before carrying out their work. This ensures they work to the highest standards in terms of the environment and safety.

Non-interference provisions

- In 2013, the Government introduced changes to the Crown Minerals Act, including new non-interference provisions to ensure permitted petroleum activities can be carried out without disruption from unlawful interference.
- In this case, the Amazon Warrior has ended its seismic operations and the Non-Interference Zone doesn't apply. However, anyone protesting still should do so legally and at a safe distance from the vessel.

Greenpeace court case

Earlier this year, MBIE laid charges against three Greenpeace protestors for allegedly breaching the noninterference provisions regarding the Amazon Warrior, which was carrying out seismic surveying off the Wairarapa coast for the past several months. The protestors are expected to make their first appearance in the Napier District Court on 28 June 2017.

This is an operational matter and Ministers are not involved.

MBIE has a statutory role to enforce alleged breaches of the Crown Minerals Act. Under the Act, organisations have a responsibility for the actions of their employees and agents, and can be charged, just as individuals can [see section 102]. After considering evidence from our investigation into the alleged offending, we have now laid two charges of intentional interference with the operations of the Amazon Warrior against Greenpeace New Zealand.

MBIE is currently discussing the option of diversion with the three people charged. It is our normal legal process to consider whether diversion is appropriate. This does not necessarily mean diversion will be agreed. As part of any offer of diversion, defendants must take responsibility for their offending, and agree to, and complete, diversion conditions. We haven't yet discussed the diversion conditions so aren't in a position to comment.

The Act's non-interference provisions are about balancing the right to protest with an operator's right to get on with their permitted work.

People are free to protest at sea, just as they are on land, but this should be done at a safe distance. Seismic survey vessels can be large and have very limited manoeuvrability, so the law also helps ensure the safety of everyone involved.

The next court date is 28 August, when Greenpeace New Zealand and the three people charged will be appearing in court.
